## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that when Act 387, 1 Session Laws of Hawaii 1989, was enacted and codified as section 2 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, it was meant to be the state 3 counterpart to section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 4 5 1973, as amended, to provide a state remedy for disability discrimination and an alternative in situations where federal 6 remedies are also available. Additionally, section 368-1.5, 7 Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides those with disabilities 8 9 non-discriminatory access to state financially assisted 10 activities and programs regardless of whether that program or 11 activity also receives federal financial assistance.

12 The legislature further finds that the intent of section 13 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, was originally, and is now, to 14 give the Hawaii civil rights commission jurisdiction over 15 disability discrimination claims, even if protections under 16 section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, as amended, are 17 available.

Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to clarify the intent 1 of the legislature in enacting section 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised 2 Statutes, in light of the Hawaii Supreme Court's decision in 3 Hawaii Tech. Acad. v. L.E., 141 Haw. 147, 407 P.3d 103 (2017), 4 which held that the legislature did not intend the Hawaii civil 5 rights commission to have jurisdiction over disability 6 discrimination claims under section 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised 7 Statutes, if protections under section 504 of the Rehabilitation 8 Act, as amended, are applicable. To address possible concerns 9 regarding potential duplication of services under the 10 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, P.L. 101-476, as 11 amended, and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and their 12 respective appeals processes, this Act excludes cases within the 13 14 scope of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act from the Hawaii civil rights commission's jurisdiction under section 15 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 16

17 SECTION 2. Section 368-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is18 amended to read as follows:

19 "§368-1.5 Programs and activities receiving state
20 financial assistance. (a) No otherwise qualified individual in
21 the State shall, [solely] by reason of [his or her] the

(b) As used in this section[, the term "disability"]:
<u>"Disability"</u> means the state of having a physical or mental
impairment [which] that substantially limits one or more major
life activities, having a record of such an impairment, or being
regarded as having such an impairment.

II <u>"Program or activity receiving state financial assistance"</u>
I2 <u>includes a program or activity that receives federal and state</u>
I3 financial assistance.

"State financial assistance" means grants, purchase-of-14 service contracts, or any other arrangement by which the State 15 provides or otherwise makes available assistance in the form of 16 funds to an entity for the purpose of rendering services on 17 behalf of the State. It does not include procurement contracts, 18 state insurance or quaranty contracts, licenses, tax credits, or 19 loan guarantees to private businesses of general concern that do 20 21 not render services on behalf of the State."

SECTION 3. Section 368-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 2 The commission shall have jurisdiction over the 3 "(a) subject of discriminatory practices made unlawful by part I of 4 5 chapter 489, chapter 515, part I of chapter 378, and this chapter [-]; provided that the commission shall not have 6 jurisdiction over claims within the scope of the Individuals 7 with Disabilities Education Act, P.L. 101-476, as amended. Any 8 9 individual claiming to be aggrieved by an alleged unlawful discriminatory practice may file with the commission's executive 10 director a complaint in writing that shall state the name and 11 address of the person or party alleged to have committed the 12 unlawful discriminatory practice complained of, set forth the 13 particulars thereof, and contain other information as may be 14 required by the commission. The attorney general, or the 15 commission upon its own initiative may, in like manner, make and 16 17 file a complaint." 18 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 19

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SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
