### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SAFETY HELMETS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The department of health advocated in its
 Hawai'i Injury Prevention Plan for 2012-2017 for a universal
 moped and motorcycle helmet law to increase traffic safety. The
 plan cited a study that concluded that helmets reduced the risk
 of death by forty-two per cent and the risk of head injury by
 sixty-nine per cent for riders involved in an accident.

7 On June 4, 1967, Hawaii enacted a universal helmet law 8 which required all riders to wear a helmet. A review of 9 motorcycle-related fatality data found that while the Hawaii 10 universal helmet law was operative, the State experienced the 11 lowest amount of motorcycle deaths. However, the universal 12 helmet law was repealed in 1977, and after the repeal of the 13 law, fatalities rose.

14 Between 2007 and 2011, motorcycle deaths were the sixth
15 leading cause of fatal unintentional injuries in Hawaii. During
16 that same period, fifteen bicyclists died.

# H.B. NO.2450

1	The department of transportation published and distributed
2	the 2013-2018 Hawaii Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), with
3	its mission to "save lives and reduce injuries on Hawaii's
4	roadways through strategic partnerships and implementation of
5	the SHSP". The SHSP noted that between 2008-2012, only forty-
6	six of the one hundred fifty-seven motorcycle, scooter, and
7	moped drivers that died were wearing helmets. The SHSP also
8	cited the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's
9	findings, which state that from 2008-2012, an average of nine
10	additional lives per year may have been saved in Hawaii if
11	helmets had been used. One of the strategies recommended by the
12	SHSP to reduce motorcycle, scooter, and moped deaths is to enact
13	a universal helmet law to increase helmet usage.
14	The legislature finds that a universal safety helmet law

15 will increase traffic safety in Hawaii.

16 The purpose of this Act is to require all operators and 17 riders of motorcycles, motor scooters, mopeds, and bicycles to 18 wear protective or safety helmets.

19 SECTION 2. Section 286-81, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is20 amended to read as follows:

19	(2)	Lease or rent a motorcycle or motor scooter to another
20		person unless the person furnishes:

10	contrary, a safety helmet shall not be required for any person

14	(2) Is powered by an electric motor;
15	(3) Has a full body enclosed cab; and
16	(4) Has a seat belt assembly or a child restraint system
17	for the driver and passenger;
18	and the operator and passenger uses the seat belt or child
19	restraint system pursuant to sections 291-11.5 and 291-11.6."

SECTION 3. Section 291C-150, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by amending subsections (a) through (c) to read as
 follows:

4 "(a) No person [under sixteen years of age] shall operate 5 a bicycle upon a street, bikeway, or any other public property 6 unless that person is wearing a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet that has been tested by a nationally recognized 7 agency such as the National Highway Traffic Safety 8 9 Administration, the National Safety Council, or the Children's 10 Safety Network, and is designed to fit the user and protect 11 against head trauma. This requirement also applies to a person who rides upon a bicycle while in a restraining seat that is 12 13 attached to the bicycle or who rides in a trailer towed by the 14 bicycle.

(b) A person who provides bicycles for hire shall not rent a bicycle to any person unless every person [who is under age sixteen] is wearing a bicycle helmet, as required in subsection (a), while operating the rented bicycle, occupying a restraining seat that is attached to the rented bicycle, or riding in a trailer towed by the rented bicycle.
