A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAL AUTONOMY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it is crucial to be
prepared to effectively address inevitable large-scale disease
outbreaks, such as COVID-19, the official name of the 2019
strand of the coronavirus that has spread worldwide, which can
significantly impact the people of Hawaii.

6 The legislature recognizes that immunization programs are 7 intended to reduce the risk of infection by working with the 8 body's natural defenses to develop immunity to certain diseases. 9 A highly vaccinated population has helped eliminate diseases 10 such as polio and helped prevent the spread of other 11 communicable threats such as the human papillomavirus, measles, 12 and hepatitis.

While vaccines are safe and effective for the general public, they may carry a risk for a small number of individuals. Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the department of health to conduct a study relating to the development and disbursement of vaccinations to prepare Hawaii

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1	for modern disease outbreaks, determine when exemptions to		
2	mandatory vaccinations may be appropriate, and submit a report		
3	of its findings to the legislature.		
4	SECTION 2. (a) The department of health shall conduct a		
5	study regarding the development and disbursement of vaccinations		
6	for modern disease outbreaks and various procedures associated		
7	with medi	cally authorized exemptions from required vaccinations.	
8	The study	shall include:	
9	(1)	The department's plans to prepare for a COVID-19-type	
10		outbreak in Hawaii, including how to appropriately	
11		vaccinate an island community against modern diseases	
12		that are prone to cause outbreaks;	
13	(2)	An analysis of how other states are preparing for a	
14		COVID-19-type outbreak;	
15	(3)	An analysis of current vaccination rates;	
16	(4)	An analysis of unintended health reactions to	
17		vaccines;	
18	(5)	An analysis of how other states respond to unintended	
19		health reactions to vaccines;	
20	(6)	How the State can ensure the maximum protection of its	
21		population against common chronic pathogens;	

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1	(7)	How the State can ensure the maximum protection of its	
2		population against an acute outbreak of a COVID-19-	
3		type outbreak; and	
4	(8)	How to minimize risk to those who may have unintended	
5		health reactions to vaccines and when exemptions from	
6		the mandatory vaccines may be appropriate.	
7	(b)	The department of health may partner with federal	
8	partners	or universities to conduct relevant research for this	
9	study.		
10	(c)	The department of health shall submit a report of its	
11	findings	and recommendations, including any proposed	
12	legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior		
13	to the convening of the regular session of 2021.		
14	SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
