# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACCESS TO LEARNING.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I. INTRODUCTION
2	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to build the
3	infrastructure and develop the resources necessary to achieve
4	the objective of providing the capacity to serve fifty per cent
5	of all otherwise unserved children who are three to four years
6	of age, or will not be at least five years of age on or before
7	July 31 of the current school year, with access to learning by
8	the year 2025, and providing the capacity to serve one hundred
9	per cent of those children within the same age group with access
10	to learning by the year 2030.
11	This Act is part of the State's early childhood plan to
12	provide access to child care and early learning opportunities to
13	all newborn to five-year-old children in the State.
14	PART II. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
15	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by adding two new sections to subpart C of part IV to be
17	appropriately designated and to read as follows:

1	" <u>§302A−</u>	Standardized assessment for students entering
2	kindergarten.	(a) The board of education shall adopt a
3	student assessme	ent model pursuant to section 302A-1101(a) to
4	assess all stude	ents entering kindergarten.
5	(b) Within	the first two weeks of each school year, the
6	department shall	assess all kindergarten students with the
7	student assessme	ent model.
8	(c) The de	partment shall share information from the
9	student assessme	ent model with the department of human services
10	and the early le	earning coordinator in the same manner as the
11	information gath	ered in section 302A
12	§302A-	Prior early learning programs attendance
13	disclosure. (a)	At least one parent or guardian of each child
14	entering kinderg	arten shall disclose to the department the name
15	and address of t	the early learning program that the child
16	attended during	the previous academic year. The department may
17	also require the	e disclosure of any other information not
18	otherwise prohib	pited by law that would assist the department,
19	the department o	of human services, and the early learning
20	coordinator in d	leveloping, assessing, and implementing
21	strategies to me	eet the early learning needs of children in the

- 1 State. The department and the executive office on early
- 2 learning shall use the information to determine the levels of
- 3 prekindergarten attendance and need for child care in geographic
- 4 regions of the State and identify the highest priority regions
- 5 requiring prekindergarten programs and child care to meet the
- 6 needs of unserved or underserved eligible children and shall
- 7 provide the information to the department of human services and
- 8 the early learning coordinator.
- 9 (b) The department may include a request for the
- 10 information required by subsection (a) on a kindergarten
- 11 enrollment form or any other appropriate form."
- 12 SECTION 3. Section 302L-1.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
- "(b) The board shall consist of the following voting
- 15 members:
- 16 (1) A representative of center-based program providers or
- the representative's designee;
- 18 (2) A representative of family child care program
- 19 providers;
- 20 (3) A representative of family-child interaction learning
- 21 program providers;

1	(4)	A representative of philanthropic organizations that
2		support early learning or the representative's
3		designee;
4	(5)	A representative from a head start provider agency;
5	(6)	A representative from the Hawaii Early Intervention
6		Coordinating Council;
7	(7)	A parent representative;
8	(8)	A representative from the Hawaii chapter of the
9		American Academy of Pediatrics;
10	(9)	A representative of home-visiting program providers;
11	(10)	A representative of Hawaiian medium early learning
12		providers; and
13	(11)	A representative of the Hawaii Council of Mayors, or
14		the representative's designee.
15	The	superintendent of education, director of human
16	services,	director of health, early learning coordinator, and
17	president	of the University of Hawaii shall serve as ex officio
18	nonvoting	members of the board.
19	The	board shall invite the chief executive officer of
20	Kamehameh	a Schools and the executive director of the Hawaii

1 2	Association	of	Independent	Schools,	or	their	designees,	to	serve
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- 2 as voting members of the board.
- 3 (c) Except for the early learning coordinator,
- 4 superintendent of education, directors of state departments,
- 5 president of the University of Hawaii, chief executive officer
- 6 of Kamehameha Schools, and the executive director of the Hawaii
- 7 Association of Independent Schools, or their designees, the
- 8 members of the board shall serve staggered terms as follows:
- 9 (1) The representative of center-based program providers
- shall serve a two-year term;
- 11 (2) The representative of family child care program
- 12 providers shall serve a three-year term;
- 13 (3) The representative of family-child interaction
- 14 learning program providers shall serve a three-year
- 15 term;
- 16 (4) The representative of philanthropic organizations that
- 17 support early learning shall serve a two-year term;
- 18 (5) The representative from a head start provider agency
- shall serve a three-year term;
- 20 (6) The representative from the Hawaii Early Intervention
- 21 Coordinating Council shall serve a three-year term;

1 (7) The parent representative shall serve a two-year term; 2 (8) The representative from the Hawaii chapter of the 3 American Academy of Pediatrics shall serve a two-year 4 term; 5 The representative of home-visiting program providers (9) 6 shall serve a three-year term; 7 (10)The representative of Hawaiian medium early learning 8 providers shall serve a two-year term; and 9 (11)The representative of the Hawaii Council of Mayors **10** shall serve a three-year term." 11 SECTION 4. Section 302L-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 amended to read as follows: 13 "§302L-5 Early learning trust fund. (a) There is 14 established within the state treasury the early learning trust 15 fund, to be administered by the executive office on early 16 learning, into which shall be deposited all moneys received by 17 the office in the form of: 18 (1) Fees; 19 (2) Grants; 20 (3) Donations;

1 (4) Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund; 2 and 3 (5) Revenues regardless of their source, 4 and earnings on moneys in the fund. Moneys in the fund shall be 5 used for the early learning system. Expenditures from the fund 6 may be made by the office without appropriation or allotment. 7 (b) The office shall submit an annual report to the 8 legislature, no later than August 31, on the sources of moneys 9 deposited into the fund and expenditures of the moneys in the **10** fund." 11 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general **12** revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 13 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the 14 executive office on early learning to support early learning 15 programs in accordance with this Act. 16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the executive **17** office on early learning for the purposes of this Act. 18 PART III. DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES 19 SECTION 6. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is **20** amended by adding three new sections to part VIII to be 21 appropriately designated and to read as follows:

1	"§346- Preschool open doors trust fund. (a) There is
2	established within the state treasury the preschool open doors
3	trust fund, to be administered by the department's child care
4	assistance program, into which shall be deposited all moneys
5	received by the department's child care assistance program in
6	the form of:
7	<u>(1)</u> <u>Fees;</u>
8	(2) Grants;
9	(3) Donations;
10	(4) Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund;
11	and
12	(5) Revenues regardless of their source,
13	and earnings on moneys in the fund. Moneys in the fund shall be
14	used for the preschool open doors program. Expenditures from
15	the fund may be made by the department without appropriation or
16	allotment.
17	(b) The department shall submit an annual report to the
18	legislature, no later than August 31, on the sources of moneys
19	deposited into the fund and expenditures of moneys in the fund.
20	§346- Preschool grant program; special fund;
21	established. (a) There is established within the state

1	treasury the preschool grant special fund, into which shall be
2	deposited:
3	(1) Donations to the special fund; and
4	(2) Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund;
5	(3) Revenues regardless of their source; and
6	(4) Earnings on moneys in the fund.
7	(b) The department shall expend moneys in the special fund
8	to award grants to private entities for the establishment of new
9	preschools or expansion of existing preschools at the private
10	entity's place of business. Expenditures from the fund may be
11	made by the department without appropriation or allotment.
12	(c) Any grant issued pursuant to this section shall be
13	exempt from chapters 103D and 103F. The department shall adopt
14	rules pursuant to chapter 91 to effectuate the grant program.
15	(d) The department shall submit an annual report to the
16	legislature, no later than August 31, on the sources of moneys
17	deposited into the fund and expenditures of moneys in the fund.
18	§346- Prior early learning program information. (a)
19	The department shall establish or augment an existing database
20	to collect and analyze information it receives from the
21	department of education pursuant to section 302A- and any

- 1 other information the department may collect on all children in
- 2 the State who are three to four years old and children who will
- 3 not be at least five years of age on or before July 31 of the
- 4 current school year. The department, along with the early
- 5 learning coordinator, shall use the information to determine the
- 6 levels of prekindergarten attendance and need for child care in
- 7 geographic regions of the State and identify the highest
- 8 priority regions requiring prekindergarten programs and child
- 9 care to meet the needs of unserved or underserved eligible
- 10 children.
- 11 (b) Pursuant to section 27-7, the department shall share
- 12 with the early learning coordinator the information that it
- 13 receives from the department of education pursuant to section
- 14 302A- and any other information the department may collect on
- 15 all children in the State who are three to four years old and
- 16 children who will not be at least five years of age on or before
- 17 July 31 of the current school year."
- 18 SECTION 7. Section 346-181, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
- 20 "(b) Subject to the availability of funds, the program
- 21 shall serve [four-year-old] children $[\tau]$  who are three to four

1 years of age, or will not be at least five years of age on or 2 before July 31 of the current school year, with priority 3 extended to: 4 (1) Children who are not eligible to attend public school 5 kindergarten in the calendar year in which they turn 6 five years of age because their birth date occurs 7 after the kindergarten eligibility date pursuant to 8 section 302A-411; and 9 (2) Underserved or at-risk children, as defined by rules **10** adopted by the department. 11 (c) Enrollment in the program shall be voluntary. A **12** parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the program [shall] 13 may share in the costs of the program through a copayment 14 according to a sliding fee scale that is based on need pursuant to rules adopted by the department." 15 16 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general **17** revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 19 permanent full-time ( .0 FTE) positions for the **20** preschool open doors program.

- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 2 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the
- 6 department of human services to expand its information
- 7 technology system for the purpose of managing the information
- 8 collected pursuant to 302A- , Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general
- 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 13 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the
- 14 department of human services to contract for and operate
- 15 preschool and child care programs without regard to chapters
- 16 103D and 103F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to carry out the
- 17 purposes of this Act.
- 18 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 19 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 20 SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much

- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for
- 2 deposit into the preschool grant special fund.
- 3 PART IV. OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR
- 4 SECTION 12. Chapter 26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 6 to read as follows:
- 7 "PART . EARLY LEARNING
- 8 §26- Position of early learning coordinator;
- 9 established; benchmarks; duties. (a) There is established
- 10 within the office of the governor an early learning coordinator
- 11 position. The governor, without regard to chapter 76, shall
- 12 appoint the early learning coordinator for a term of six years,
- 13 subject to the advice and consent of the Senate. The term
- 14 limitation in section 26-34 shall not apply to the early
- 15 learning coordinator position. The early learning coordinator
- 16 may be removed from office by:
- 17 (1) The governor subject to the advice and consent of the
- 18 senate; or
- 19 (2) A majority vote of the senate.
- 20 (b) The salary of the early learning coordinator shall be
- 21 fixed by the governor. The early learning coordinator shall be

- 1 a member of the state employees' retirement system and shall be
- 2 included under the operations of the federal social security
- 3 program or any other state or federal employee benefit program
- 4 generally applicable to officers and employees of the State.
- 5 (c) The early learning coordinator may employ and retain
- 6 officers and employees as may be necessary to carry out the
- 7 duties of the early learning coordinator. The officers and
- 8 employees may be hired without regard to chapter 76, shall serve
- 9 at the pleasure of the early learning coordinator, and shall be
- 10 included in any benefit program generally applicable to officers
- 11 and employees of the State.
- 12 (d) The early learning coordinator shall ensure access to
- 13 learning through preschool programs that meet or exceed the
- 14 following benchmarks:
- 15 (1) Fifty per cent of all otherwise unserved children who
- are three to four years of age, or will not be at
- least five years of age on or before July 31 of the
- 18 current school year, shall be enrolled in a preschool
- program by December 31, 2025; and
- 20 (2) One hundred per cent of all children who are three to
- four years of age, or will not be at least five years

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1		of age on or before July 31 of the current school
2		year, shall be enrolled in a preschool program by
3		December 31, 2030.
4	The early	learning coordinator shall submit an annual report to
5	the legis	lature, no later than August 31 of each year, on the
6	progress	toward achieving the benchmarks until all children who
7	are three	to four years of age, or will not be at least five
8	years of	age on or before July 31 of the current school year,
9	are enrol	led in a preschool program.
10	(e)	The early learning coordinator shall:
11	(1)	Ensure safe, healthy, quality, and affordable child
12		care and school readiness opportunities so that
13		parents do not need to choose between employment and
14		child care;
15	(2)	Build upon, expand, and modify existing access to
16		child care and school readiness programs, including
17		but not limited to the preschool open doors and other
18		child care programs;
19	(3)	Develop and implement strategies and programs that can
20		offset the cost of child care and school readiness

programs for high priority workforce needs;

1	(4)	Ensure that all child care and early learning services
2		delivered shall be approved and regulated by the
3		department and the executive office on early learning;
4	(5)	Create a flexible, expandable, and focused funding and
5		budgeting approach that will encourage public and
6		private partnerships to implement school readiness
7		programs;
8	(6)	Create a smooth and coordinated transition of school
9		readiness programs between child care and kindergarten
10		in department of education, charter, private, and
11		homeschool environments;
12	(7)	Facilitate the location of public and private venues
13		for child care and school readiness programs,
14		including but not limited to public facilities such as
15		schools, libraries, the university of Hawaii system,
16		and other state facilities; and
17	(8)	Create:
18		(A) An ongoing information collection and analysis
19		function that is independent of the agencies; and
20		(B) Programs and private sector delivery systems that
21		can pose the essential information and policy

1 questions, monitor the progress of the 2 implementation of this part, and generate timely 3 detailed reports to the extent allowable by law. 4 §26-Access to learning trust fund. (a) There is 5 established within the state treasury the access to learning 6 trust fund, to be administered by the early learning 7 coordinator, into which shall be deposited all moneys received 8 by the early learning coordinator in the form of: 9 (1) Fees; **10** (2) Grants; 11 (3) Donations; 12 Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund; (4) 13 and 14 Revenues regardless of their source, and earnings on moneys in the fund. Moneys in the fund shall be 15 16 used to fulfill the duties of the early learning coordinator. **17** Expenditures from the fund may be made by the early learning 18 coordinator without appropriation or allotment. 19 Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the governor **20** may authorize expenditures from the trust fund of any donation, 21 grant, beguest, and devise of money from any private

- 1 institution, person, firm, or corporation for the purposes of
- 2 funding or augmenting the salaries of the early learning
- 3 coordinator and any officers and employees of the early learning
- 4 coordinator. If all or any portion of any salary of the early
- 5 learning coordinator or any officer or employee of the early
- 6 learning coordinator is funded pursuant to this subsection, the
- 7 report pursuant to subsection (c) shall include information
- 8 detailing the use of any funds authorized under this subsection.
- 9 (c) The early learning coordinator shall submit an annual
- 10 report to the legislature, no later than August 31, on the
- 11 sources of moneys deposited into the fund and expenditures of
- 12 moneys in the fund."
- 13 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
- 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 15 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the
- 16 early learning coordinator position and officers and employees
- 17 of the early learning coordinator.
- 18 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
- 19 governor for the purposes of this Act.
- 20 PART V. HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE IMMERSION

1	SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
3	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the
4	purpose of assisting the Imiloa astronomy center to build two or
5	more classrooms for Hawaiian language immersion pre-kindergarten
6	programs that shall be used to establish a pathway for the
7	development of other Hawaiian language immersion classes.
8	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the university of
9	Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
10	PART VI. LIBRARIES
11	SECTION 15. Chapter 312, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by adding a new section to be appropriated designated
13	and to read as follows:
14	"§312- Early learning classrooms and services on public
15	library property; authorized. The state librarian, in
16	consultation with the early learning coordinator, may establish
17	early learning classrooms and contract for early learning
18	services at any library under the state librarian's
19	jurisdiction. The planning, constructing, equipping, and
20	operating of early learning classrooms and the contracting of

- 1 early learning services shall not be subject to chapters 103D or
- **2** 103F."
- 3 SECTION 16. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for
- 6 the purpose of building two or more early learning services
- 7 classrooms on property under the jurisdiction of the public
- 8 library system.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 PART VII. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS
- 12 SECTION 17. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 13 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 18. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

#### Report Title:

DHS; DOE; Preschool Open Doors Program; Executive Office on Early Learning; Appropriation

#### Description:

Requires the parents or guardians of public school kindergarten students to the disclose information on the child's prior child care program or prekindergarten attendance, if any, for the purpose of determining areas with the highest need for prekindergarten and child care programs. Requires Department of Education to assess kindergarten students. Establishes the preschool open doors trust fund and requires annual reporting. Expands Preschool Open Doors Program eligibility from 4-year-old children to all children who are 3 to 4 years old or will not be at least five years old on or before July 31 of the current school year. Requires annual reporting regarding the revenues and expenditures of the early learning trust fund. Establishes program for Department of Human Services to award grants for preschools. Appropriates funds and authorizes positions for the preschool open doors program. Appropriates funds for the Department of Human Services to expand its information technology system for the purpose of managing information on prekindergarten attendance and child care need and to contract for and operate preschool and child care programs. Establishes the Early Learning Coordinator position within the Office of the Governor. Establishes the goal of providing all children who are 3 to 4 years old, or will not be at least five years old on or before July 31 of the current school year, with enrollment in a preschool program by the year 2030 and assigns that responsibility to the Early Learning Coordinator. Appropriates funds to the Imiloa Astronomy Center for building classrooms for Hawaiian language immersion pre-kindergarten programs. Appropriates funds for building early learning services classrooms on public library property. Appropriates funds. (HB2543 HD1 PROPOSED)

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
