#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii State 2 Constitution established partial public financing of campaigns 3 for public offices of the State and its political subdivisions. 4 Candidate public financing programs are voluntary programs in 5 which public funds are provided to candidates who agree to limit their campaign spending. The primary purpose of these programs 6 is to reduce the role of large amounts of private money raised 7 8 in political campaigns and the obligations that are or can 9 appear to be associated with these contributions. With the 10 influence of dark money on political campaigns, the role of 11 public financing is becoming more crucial than ever.

12 The legislature also believes that the amount of money 13 available to candidates choosing to seek public financing should 14 be increased to better keep up with the increasing cost of 15 campaigns.

16 The legislature further finds that the money in the Hawaii
17 election campaign fund is the source of funding for the State's



partial public financing of campaigns. Currently, this fund
 only receives moneys through legislative appropriations and
 through persons who designate a portion of their income tax
 liability to the fund. However, the amount of money in the fund
 is insufficient to finance a significant number of candidates.

6 The legislature believes that increasing the fees for the 7 filing of nomination papers for public office for those 8 candidates choosing to raise private money and not participating 9 in the public financing program, and in turn dedicating those 10 moneys to the Hawaii election campaign fund, can increase the 11 amount of moneys available to public financing program 12 candidates, while encouraging a reduction in the amount of 13 private money and the appearance of conflicts of interest 14 overall.

15 The legislature also finds that cost should not be a
16 barrier to run for public office. Therefore, retaining the
17 ability to file nomination papers at significantly reduced cost
18 for public financing candidates, and without any fee for
19 indigent candidates, is important to ensure full participation
20 in the political process.



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1 However, the amount of money in the Hawaii election 2 campaign fund is limited. Therefore, to ensure that the maximum number of credible and serious candidates are able to receive 3 4 funds, candidates seeking public funds should demonstrate a 5 serious level of interest and collect a reasonable number of 6 signatures to prevent funds from being diluted by candidates 7 seeking only quick name recognition for themselves or their 8 endeavors, but are not serious about seeking elected office. 9 Additionally, the legislature finds that the date of the 10 primary election was recently advanced approximately one month 11 from September to August. However, the deadline to file 12 nomination papers to run for office was not similarly adjusted. 13 A deadline to file nomination papers that is closer to an 14 election limits the exposure of candidates to the public. By 15 restoring the deadline to file nomination papers to 16 approximately three months prior to the primary election, the 17 public will have additional time to learn about the candidates 18 running to represent them.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to encourageparticipation in democracy from the electorate by:



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1	(1)	Requiring a portion of the fee for filing nomination
2		papers to be placed into the Hawaii election campaign
3		fund for the public financing of elections;
4	(2)	Increasing the amount of money available to candidates
5		participating in the partial public financing program
6		by increasing expenditure limit upon which it is
7		based;
8	(3)	Changing the amount of signatures required to file
9		nomination papers; and
10	(4)	Changing the deadline to file nomination papers to the
11		first Tuesday in May.
12	SECT:	ION 2. Section 11-421, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
14	"(b)	The fund shall consist of:
15	(1)	Moneys deposited pursuant to section 12-6;
16	[ <del>(1)</del> ]	(2) All moneys collected from persons who have
17		designated a portion of their income tax liability to
18		the fund as provided in section 235-102.5(a);
19	[ <del>(2)</del> ]	(3) Any general fund appropriations; and
20	[ <del>(3)</del> ]	(4) Other moneys collected pursuant to this part."



1	SECTION 3. Section 11-423, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
3	"(d) From January 1 of the year of any primary, special,
4	or general election, the aggregate expenditures for each
5	election by a candidate who voluntarily agrees to limit campaign
6	expenditures, inclusive of all expenditures made or authorized
7	by the candidate alone, all treasurers, the candidate committee,
8	and noncandidate committees on the candidate's behalf, shall not
9	exceed the following <u>base</u> amounts expressed, respectively
10	multiplied by the number of voters in the last preceding general
11	election registered to vote in each respective voting district:
12	(1) For the office of governor\$2.50;
13	(2) For the office of lieutenant governor\$1.40;
14	(3) For the office of mayor\$2.00;
15	(4) For the offices of state senator, state
16	representative, county council member, and prosecuting
17	attorney\$1.40; and
18	(5) For all other offices20 cents $[-,]$
19	provided that, beginning in 2021 and each year thereafter, the
20	base amounts allowable under this subsection shall increase by
21	per cent per year, compounded annually."



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1 SECTION 4. Section 12-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: "§12-5 Nomination papers: number of signers. (a) 3 Nomination papers for candidates for members of Congress, 4 5 qovernor, and lieutenant qovernor shall be signed by not less 6 than [twenty-five] seventy-five registered voters of the State 7 or of the Congressional district from which the candidates are running in the case of candidates for the United States House of 8 9 Representatives [-]; provided that nomination papers for candidates for members of Congress, governor, and lieutenant 10 11 governor who voluntarily agree to limit their campaign expenditures pursuant to chapter 11, part XIII, subpart J, shall 12 13 be signed by not less than three hundred registered voters of 14 the State or of the Congressional district from which the 15 candidates are running in the case of candidates for the United 16 States House of Representatives. 17 Nomination papers for candidates for either branch of (b)

18 the legislature and for county office <u>other than the office of</u> 19 <u>the mayor</u> shall be signed by not less than [fifteen] <u>twenty-five</u> 20 registered voters of the district or county or subdivision 21 thereof for which the person nominated is a candidate [-];



1	provided that nomination papers for candidates for either branch
2	of the legislature and for county office other than mayor who
3	voluntarily agrees to limit their campaign expenditures pursuant
4	to chapter 11, part XIII, subpart J, shall be signed by not less
5	than one hundred registered voters of the district or county or
6	subdivision thereof for which the person nominated is a
7	candidate.
8	(c) Nomination papers for candidates for the respective
9	office of the mayor for each county shall be signed by not less
10	than fifty registered voters of the county for which the person
11	nominated is a candidate; provided that nomination papers for
12	candidates for mayors who voluntarily agrees to limit their
13	campaign expenditures pursuant to chapter 11, part XIII, subpart
14	J, shall be signed by not less than two hundred registered
15	voters of the county for which the person nominated is a
16	candidate.
17	[ <del>(c)</del> ] <u>(d)</u> Nomination papers for candidates for members of
18	the board of trustees of the office of Hawaiian affairs shall be

19 signed by not less than twenty-five persons registered to vote.



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1 (e) No signatures shall be required on nomination [-(d)]2 papers for candidates filing to run in a special primary or 3 special election to fill a vacancy." 4 SECTION 5. Section 12-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended as follows: 6 1. By amending subsection (a) to read: 7 "(a) For members of Congress, state offices, county 8 offices, and the board of trustees for the office of Hawaiian 9 affairs, nomination papers shall be filed with the chief 10 election officer, or clerk in case of county offices, [not] no 11 later than 4:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in [June.] May. 12 However, in the event of a special primary or special election, 13 the filing deadline shall be determined in the proclamation that 14 is issued calling for the election as provided for by state law 15 or county charter. A state candidate from the counties of 16 Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai may file the declaration of candidacy 17 with the respective clerk. The clerk shall transmit to the 18 office of the chief election officer the state candidate's 19 declaration of candidacy without delay." 20 2. By amending subsection (c) to read:

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1	"[+](c)[+] There shall be deposited with each nomination
2	paper a filing fee on account of the expenses attending the
3	holding of the primary, special primary, or special election,
4	one-half of which shall be paid into the Hawaii election
5	campaign fund established pursuant to section 11-421, and one-
6	half of which shall be paid into the treasury of the State, or
7	county, as the case may be, as a realization:
8	(1) For United States senators and United States
9	representatives[ <del>\$75;</del> ] <u>\$3,000;</u>
10	(2) For governor and lieutenant governor[ <del>\$750;</del> ] <u>\$3,000;</u>
11	(3) For mayor[ <del>\$500;</del> ] <u>\$2,000;</u> and
12	(4) For all other offices[ <del>\$250.</del> ] <u>\$1,000.</u> "
13	3. By amending subsection (e) to read:
14	"(e) Upon the showing of a certified copy of an affidavit
15	which has been filed with the campaign spending commission
16	pursuant to section 11-423 by a candidate who has voluntarily
17	agreed to abide by spending limits, the chief election officer
18	or clerk shall discount the filing fee of the candidate by the
19	following amounts:
20	(1) For the office of governor and lieutenant governor
21	[ <del>\$675;</del> ] <u>\$2,700;</u>



(2) For the office of mayor--[\$450;] \$1,800; and
 (3) For all other offices--[\$225.] \$900."
 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

#### Report Title:

Elections; Hawaii Election Campaign Fund; Filing of Nomination Papers; Signatures; Fees; Deadline

#### Description:

Requires nomination paper filing fees to be deposited into the Hawaii election campaign fund. Increases the amount of public funds available to candidates who agree to expenditure limits. Adjusts the signature requirement and fee amount for nomination papers. Amends the deadline to file nomination papers to the first Tuesday in May.

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
