A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

	PART I
SECT	ION 1. Section 11-410, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
amended as	s follows:
1. 1	By amending subsection (a) to read:
"(a)	The commission may make a decision or issue an order

Constitution established partial public financing of campaigns 20 21 for public offices of the State and its political subdivisions.

1 Candidate public financing programs are voluntary programs in which public funds are provided to candidates who agree to limit 2 their campaign spending. The primary purpose of these programs 3 4 is to reduce the role of large amounts of private money raised 5 in political campaigns and the obligations that are or can 6 appear to be associated with these contributions. With the 7 influence of dark money on political campaigns, the role of public financing is becoming more crucial than ever. 8

9 The legislature also believes that the amount of money
10 available to candidates choosing to seek public financing should
11 be increased to better keep up with the increasing cost of
12 campaigns.

The legislature further finds that the money in the Hawaii 13 election campaign fund is the source of funding for the State's 14 15 partial public financing of campaigns. Currently, this fund only receives moneys through legislative appropriations and 16 through persons who designate a portion of their income tax 17 liability to the fund. However, the amount of money in the fund 18 is insufficient to finance a significant number of candidates. 19 The legislature believes that increasing the fees for the 20

filing of nomination papers for public office for those

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1 candidates choosing to raise private money and not participating 2 in the public financing program, and in turn dedicating those 3 moneys to the Hawaii election campaign fund, can increase the 4 amount of moneys available to public financing program 5 candidates, while encouraging a reduction in the amount of 6 private money and the appearance of conflicts of interest 7 overall.

8 The legislature also finds that cost should not be a 9 barrier to run for public office. Therefore, retaining the 10 ability to file nomination papers at a significantly reduced 11 cost for public financing candidates, and without any fee for 12 indigent candidates, is important to ensure full participation 13 in the political process.

14 However, the amount of money in the Hawaii election campaign fund is limited. Therefore, to ensure that the maximum 15 number of credible and serious candidates are able to receive 16 17 funds, candidates seeking public funds should demonstrate a serious level of interest and collect a reasonable number of 18 19 signatures to prevent funds from being diluted by candidates 20 seeking only quick name recognition for themselves or their endeavors, but are not serious about seeking elected office. 21

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1	Addi	tionally, the legislature finds that the date of the
2	primary e	lection was recently advanced approximately one month
3	from Sept	ember to August. However, the deadline to file
4	nominatio	n papers to run for office was not similarly adjusted.
5	A deadlin	e to file nomination papers that is closer to an
6	election	limits the exposure of candidates to the public. By
7	restoring	the deadline to file nomination papers to
8	approxima	tely three months before the primary election, the
9	public wi	ll have additional time to learn about the candidates
10	running t	o represent them.
11	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this part is to encourage
12	participa	tion in democracy from the electorate by:
13	(1)	Requiring a portion of the fee for filing nomination
14		papers to be placed into the Hawaii election campaign
15		fund for the public financing of elections;
16	(2)	Increasing the amount of money available to candidates
17		participating in the partial public financing program
18		by increasing the expenditure limit upon which it is
19		based;
20	(3)	Changing the amount of signatures required to file
21		nomination papers; and



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1	(4) Changing the deadline to file nomination papers to the
2	first Tuesday in May.
3	SECTION 3. Section 11-421, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
5	"(b) The fund shall consist of:
6	(1) Moneys deposited pursuant to section 12-6;
7	$\left[\frac{(1)}{(2)}\right]$ All moneys collected from persons who have
8	designated a portion of their income tax liability to
9	the fund as provided in section 235-102.5(a);
10	$\left[\frac{(2)}{(3)}\right]$ Any general fund appropriations; and
11	[-(3)] (4) Other moneys collected pursuant to this part."
12	SECTION 4. Section 11-423, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
14	"(d) From January 1 of the year of any primary, special,
15	or general election, the aggregate expenditures for each
16	election by a candidate who voluntarily agrees to limit campaign
17	expenditures, inclusive of all expenditures made or authorized
18	by the candidate alone, all treasurers, the candidate committee,
19	and noncandidate committees on the candidate's behalf, shall not
20	exceed the following <u>base</u> amounts expressed, respectively



1	multiplied by the number of voters in the last preceding general
2	election registered to vote in each respective voting district:
3	(1) For the office of governor\$2.50;
4	(2) For the office of lieutenant governor\$1.40;
5	(3) For the office of mayor\$2.00;

10	provided that, beginning January 1, 2022, and each year

13	SECTION 5. Section 12-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended to read as follows:
15	"§12-5 Nomination papers: number of signers. (a)
16	Nomination papers for candidates for members of Congress,
17	governor, and lieutenant governor shall be signed by not less
18	than [twenty-five] <u>seventy-five</u> registered voters of the State
19	or of the Congressional district from which the candidates are
20	running in the case of candidates for the United States House of
21	Representatives $[-]$; provided that nomination papers for



1	candidates for members of Congress, governor, and lieutenant
2	governor who voluntarily agree to limit their campaign
3	expenditures pursuant to chapter 11, part XIII, subpart J, shall
4	be signed by not less than three hundred registered voters of
5	the State or of the Congressional district from which the
6	candidates are running in the case of candidates for the United
7	States House of Representatives.
8	(b) Nomination papers for candidates for either branch of
9	the legislature and for county office, other than the office of
10	<u>the mayor,</u> shall be signed by not less than [fifteen]
11	twenty-five registered voters of the district or county or
12	subdivision thereof for which the person nominated is a
13	candidate $[-]$; provided that nomination papers for candidates for
14	either branch of the legislature and for county office, other
15	than the office of the mayor, who voluntarily agree to limit
16	their campaign expenditures pursuant to chapter 11, part XIII,
17	subpart J, shall be signed by not less than one hundred
18	registered voters of the district or county or subdivision
19	thereof for which the person nominated is a candidate.
20	(c) Nomination papers for candidates for the respective
21	office of the mayor for each county shall be signed by not less



1	than fifty registered voters of the county for which the person
2	nominated is a candidate; provided that nomination papers for
3	candidates for the respective office of the mayor for each
4	county who voluntarily agree to limit their campaign
5	expenditures pursuant to chapter 11, part XIII, subpart J, shall
6	be signed by not less than two hundred registered voters of the
7	county for which the person nominated is a candidate.
8	$\left[\frac{(c)}{(c)}\right]$ (d) Nomination papers for candidates for members of
9	the board of trustees of the office of Hawaiian affairs shall be
10	signed by not less than twenty-five persons registered to vote.
11	[(d)] <u>(e)</u> No signatures shall be required on nomination
12	papers for candidates filing to run in a special primary or
13	special election to fill a vacancy."
14	SECTION 6. Section 12-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended as follows:
16	1. By amending subsection (a) to read:
17	"(a) For members of Congress, state offices, county
18	offices, and the board of trustees for the office of Hawaiian
19	affairs, nomination papers shall be filed with the chief
20	election officer, or clerk in case of county offices, [not] <u>no</u>
21	later than 4:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in [June.] <u>May.</u>

1	However, in the event of a special primary or special election,
2	the filing deadline shall be determined in the proclamation that
3	is issued calling for the election as provided for by state law
4	or county charter. A state candidate from the counties of

7	office of the chief election officer the state candidate's

21	3. By amending subsection (e) to read:



1	"(e) Upon the showing of a certified copy of an affidavit
2	which has been filed with the campaign spending commission
3	pursuant to section 11-423 by a candidate who has voluntarily
4	agreed to abide by spending limits, the chief election officer
5	or clerk shall discount the filing fee of the candidate by the
6	following amounts:
7	(1) For the office of governor and lieutenant governor
8	[\$675;] <u>\$2,700;</u>
9	(2) For the office of mayor[\$450;] <u>\$1,800;</u> and
10	(3) For all other offices[\$225.] <u>\$900.</u> "
11	PART III
12	SECTION 7. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
13	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
14	begun before its effective date.
15	SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050;
18	provided that sections 2 through 6 shall take effect on January
19	1, 2022.



Report Title: Elections; Fines; Noncandidate Committees; Independent Expenditures; Partial Public Financing; Nomination Papers

Description:

Amends the assessment of administrative fines for persons and certain noncandidate committees making only independent expenditures that violate Hawaii's campaign finance laws. Allows the Campaign Spending Commission to order that payment of a fine assessed against a noncandidate committee, or any portion thereof, be paid from the personal funds of an officer of the noncandidate committee. Requires nomination paper filing fees to be deposited into the Hawaii election campaign fund. Increases the amount of public funds available to candidates who agree to expenditure limits beginning 1/1/2022. Increases the number of signatures and fees required to file nomination papers. Amends the deadline to file nomination papers to the first Tuesday in May. Takes effect on 7/1/2050. (HD1)
