A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness
- 2 continues to be one of the State's most significant and
- 3 challenging social problems. According to the 2018 Hawaii
- 4 statewide homeless point-in-time count conducted in January
- 5 2018, there are 6,530 homeless individuals in the State, an
- 6 overall decrease of 9.6 per cent from 2017. However, the costs
- 7 of caring for this population have continued to grow. Homeless
- 8 persons face a wide range of issues, including general health
- 9 issues, mental illness, and substance abuse. These issues
- 10 affecting homeless persons also impact the general population
- 11 through the costs of social and health care services. In 2016,
- 12 homeless persons in the State made more than twenty thousand
- 13 hospital visits. Medical visits by the homeless cost state
- 14 hospitals \$214,000,000 in 2016, up drastically from \$70,500,000
- 15 in 2010. Treating these homeless individuals is sometimes
- 16 uncompensated; one hospital alone incurred \$10,500,000 in
- 17 uncompensated costs in 2015.

1	The legislature also finds that mobile clinics are							
2	increasing in popularity across the nation as governments try to							
3	find ways to address the health care needs of the homeless							
4	population. In places such as Dallas, Texas; Denver, Colorado;							
5	San Jose, California; and Seattle, Washington, mobile clinics							
6	offer a variety of free health care services for local homeless							
7	populations, resulting in significant cost savings when compared							
8	to emergency room visits. One estimate from 2016 found that							
9	each dollar spent on mobile clinics saved twelve dollars in							
10	other costs.							
11	The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for							
12	purchasing, staffing, and operating two mobile clinics to serve							
13	persons residing in ohana zones.							
14	SECTION 2. For purposes of this Act, "ohana zone" means a							
15	place:							
16	(1) That has a program to address basic needs of							
17	individuals experiencing homelessness; and							
18	(2) Where wrap-around services, social and health care							

services, transportation, and other services may be

offered with the goals of alleviating poverty and

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1	transitioning individuals experiencing ho	melessness					
2	into affordable housing.						
3	SECTION 3. (a) There is appropriated out of	the general					
4	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$	or so much					
5	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the						
6	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year						
7	2020-2021 to purchase, staff, and operate two mobile clinics to						
8	serve persons residing in ohana zones; provided that:						
9	(1) No funds appropriated pursuant to this se	ction shall					
10	be made available unless matching funds a	re found on a					
11	dollar-for-dollar basis to the amount app	ropriated by					
12	the State;						
13	(2) The staff may include one primary care pr	ovider, one					
14	nurse, one pharmacist, one psychiatrist,	one clinical					
15	psychologist, and other staff as needed,	including a					
16	social worker, an outreach worker, and st	udents					
17	pursuing a degree in medicine or nursing;						
18	(3) The mobile clinics may provide, at minimu	m, the					
19	following services:						
20	(A) Non-emergency medical services for c	hronic,					
21	acute, and episodic conditions;						

1		(B)	Testing for sexually transmitted disease, human
2			immunodeficiency virus, and hepatitis;
3		(C)	Family planning;
4		(D)	Child and family services;
5		(E)	Behavioral health and substance abuse services;
6		(F)	Mental health services;
7		(G)	Dental care;
8		(H)	Referral services;
9	9	(I)	Shower and laundry services;
10		(J)	Clean clothing;
11		(K)	Health insurance enrollment;
12		(L)	Pharmacy services;
13		(M)	Street medicine; provided that for the purposes
14			of this subparagraph, "street medicine" means the
15			practice of directly delivering health care and
16			related services to persons found on the streets,
17			in parks, along river banks, on beaches, and in
18			abandoned buildings; and
19		(N)	Other assistance services;

1 (4	The	department	of	human	services	shall	identify	and
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- secure other sources of funding, including federal
- funding, to provide for matching funds;
- 4 provided further that the department of human services shall
- 5 procure the mobile clinic services pursuant to chapter 103F,
- 6 Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 7 (b) Subject to the availability of funds, the director of
- 8 human services may designate other political subdivisions or
- 9 private organizations to participate in the program established
- 10 pursuant to this Act; provided that funds provided to any other
- 11 political subdivision or private organization may be by a grant
- 12 or grant-in-aid as required pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii
- 13 Revised Statutes.
- 14 (c) The sums appropriated shall be expended by the
- 15 department of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2059.
