A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Senate Bill No. 1 2407, C.D. 1, passed during the regular session of 2018, would 2 have allowed the use of medical cannabis to treat opioid use, 3 substance use, and withdrawal symptoms resulting from the 4 treatment of those conditions. However, the measure was vetoed 5 by the governor, because the department of health adopted an 6 administrative rule that sets forth an evidence-based petition 7 process to add a condition to the list of debilitating 8 conditions for which medical cannabis can be used. 9

The legislature further finds that in vetoing Senate Bill 10 No. 2407, C.D. 1, the governor has allowed an administrative 11 rule to supersede the legislature's policy-making power. When 12 the legislature authorized the department of health to create an 13 administrative process to add any other medical condition as a 14 debilitating medical condition, the legislature did not intend 15 to waive its legislative power to amend the statute to prescribe 16 17 other medical conditions that might qualify as debilitating



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1 medical conditions. Accordingly, the legislature finds that 2 opioid use and substance use disorders and associated withdrawal 3 symptoms may be successfully treated with the use of medical 4 cannabis.

5 The purpose of this Act is to add two more medical 6 conditions as debilitating medical conditions that qualify for 7 the medical use of cannabis:

8 (1) Opioid use and substance use disorders, or withdrawal
9 symptoms resulting from the treatment of these
10 conditions; and

11 (2) A medical condition that is normally treated with a 12 prescription medication that could lead to physical or 13 psychological dependence, but can be treated more 14 effectively and safely through the medical use of 15 marijuana, as determined by a physician or advanced 16 practice registered nurse.

17 SECTION 2. Section 329-121, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by amending the definition of "debilitating medical 19 condition" to read as follows:

20 ""Debilitating medical condition" means:



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1	(1)	Cancer, glaucoma, lupus, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis,
2		rheumatoid arthritis, positive status for human
3		immunodeficiency virus, acquired immune deficiency
4		syndrome, or the treatment of these conditions;
5	(2)	A chronic or debilitating disease or medical condition
6		or its treatment that produces one or more of the
7		following:
8		(A) Cachexia or wasting syndrome;
9		(B) Severe pain;
10		(C) Severe nausea;
11		(D) Seizures, including those characteristic of
12		epilepsy;
13		(E) Severe and persistent muscle spasms, including
14		those characteristic of multiple sclerosis or
15		Crohn's disease; or
16		(F) Post-traumatic stress disorder; [or]
17	(3)	Opioid use or other substance use disorders, or
18	ι,	withdrawal symptoms resulting from the treatment of
19		those conditions;
20	(4)	A medical condition that is normally treated with a
21		prescription medication that could lead to physical or

10	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
11	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
12	begun before its effective date.
13	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
14	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
15	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
