A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that because of Hawaii's 2 high cost of living and food prices, many low-income individuals 3 and families struggle to purchase food. The supplemental 4 nutrition assistance program, formerly known as the food stamp 5 program, is a crucial means of providing necessary assistance in 6 the purchasing of food for some of Hawaii's most disadvantaged 7 In September 2016, 173,669 people in Hawaii 8 participated in the supplemental nutrition assistance program, 9 which is 5.1 per cent less participation than in September 2015. 10 While Hawaii secures over \$500,000,000 annually in supplemental 11 nutrition assistance program moneys, a 2014 report by the United 12 States Department of Agriculture ranked Hawaii thirty-fourth 13 among states in the percentage of eligible individuals that 14 participate in the supplemental nutrition assistance program. 15 The legislature also finds that if additional eligible 16 individuals participated in the supplemental nutrition

1 Additionally, Moody's Analytics estimates that every 2 dollar given in supplemental nutrition assistance program funds 3 can generate one dollar and seventy cents in the local economy. 4 The legislature further finds that many individuals who are 5 eligible to participate in the supplemental nutrition assistance 6 program do not participate because they are unaware of the 7 supplemental nutrition assistance program's existence or of 8 their eligibility. Authorizing health care providers, non-9 profit organizations, businesses, and faith-based organizations 10 to distribute supplemental nutrition assistance program 11 applications to those in need may increase participation in the 12 supplemental nutrition assistance program. Furthermore, 13 authorizing health care providers to report to the department of 14 human services an aggregate collection of data about state 15 supplemental nutrition assistance program participation would 16 allow the department of human services to aid policy makers in 17 establishing plans to maximize federal funding and increase 18 access to nutritious foods. Each of these outcomes would result 19 in the State having more supplemental nutrition assistance program participants, which in turn would result in heightened 20

- 2 money flowing into the State's economy.

- 7 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
- 9 designated and to read as follows:
- 10 "§346- Supplemental nutrition assistance program
- 11 participation. Health care providers, non-profit organizations,
- 12 businesses, and faith-based organizations may distribute
- 13 supplemental nutrition assistance program applications to
- 14 prospective applicants."
- 15 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2059.
