### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MARIJUANA.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that converting the
  penalty for possession of small amounts of marijuana into noncriminal violations is more beneficial to the State and its
  people than the current criminal treatment of these offenses.
- 5 The legislature further finds that state funds are better spent
- 6 on community programs and rehabilitation rather than overly
- 7 punitive and costly incarceration of nonviolent, low-risk drug
- 8 offenders.

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- 9 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 10 (1) Establish the alcohol and drug abuse division special
  11 fund within the department of health where fines from
  12 non-criminal marijuana violations shall be deposited
  13 and used for public education and awareness programs
  14 aimed at reducing the use of harmful drugs; and
  - (2) Decriminalize the possession and distribution of small amounts of marijuana by reclassifying these offenses as non-criminal violations, while retaining criminal

1	classification of certain specific, higher-level
2	marijuana offenses, such as those relating to
3	commercial promotion and cultivation, those involving
4	minors, and those involving the medical cannabis
5	licensing and dispensary system.
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
8	and to read as follows:
9	"§321- Alcohol and drug abuse division special fund;
10	deposits; expenditures. (a) There is established within the
11	state treasury the alcohol and drug abuse division special fund
12	to be administered by the department of health. Fines collected
13	for violation of sections 712-1245 (1)(d), 712-1246 (1)(b), 712-
14	1246.5 (1)(b), 712-1247 (1)(i), 712-1248 (1)(e), and 712-1249
15	(1)(b) shall be deposited into the alcohol and drug abuse
16	division special fund.
17	(b) Monies in the special fund shall be expended by the
18	department of health for public education and awareness programs
19	aimed at reducing the use of harmful drugs. Expenditures from
20	the special fund shall not require a specific legislative

3	(c) The department of health shall submit a report to the
4	legislature concerning the status of the special fund, including
5	the amount of monies deposited into and expended from the
6	special fund, and the sources of receipts and uses of
7	expenditures, no later than twenty days prior to the convening
8	of each regular session."

This Act does not affect rights and duties that 12 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were 13 begun before its effective date. 14 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
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SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

### Description:

Establishes the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division Special Fund (Special Fund) within the Department of Health. Reclassifies specific low-level marijuana offenses as non-criminal violations subject to a fine, which shall be deposited into the Special Fund for public education and awareness programs aimed at reducing the use of harmful drugs.
