A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness is one
 of the most pressing problems in Hawai'i, which requires a
 robust, comprehensive, long-term solution to address Hawai'i's
 affordable housing and homelessness crisis.

5 Over the last fifty years in Hawai'i, the number of cost-6 burdened renters, those paying more than thirty per cent of 7 their income for rent, went from less than a quarter of the 8 population to over half. High housing costs have driven more 9 and more Hawai'i residents into homelessness. Hawai'i has the 10 highest homelessness rate in the nation.

11 The legislature further finds that by making smart 12 investments in homelessness and housing, using data-driven 13 practices, and improving coordination, Hawai'i has gradually 14 begun to turn the tide in the homelessness crisis. In 2017, 15 Hawai'i's homelessness rate went down for the first time in 16 years, a trend that continued in 2018. During the Regular



Session of 2018, the legislature made unprecedented levels of
 investment in low-income housing and homelessness, appropriating
 \$200,000,000 for the rental housing revolving fund, \$30,000,000
 for ohana zones, and \$13,500,000 for proven-effective and
 promising homelessness programs.

6 To turn back the fifty years of growth in Hawai'i's housing and homelessness crisis, investments of this scale must be made 7 8 consistently in the coming years. Hawai'i must prioritize programs that are the most cost-effective and target the most 9 10 vulnerable populations, such as outreach, rapid re-housing, 11 housing first, family assessment centers, law-enforcement assisted diversion, and the coordinated statewide homelessness 12 13 initiative. The State also needs to experiment with innovative 14 approaches to addressing homelessness, such as:

15 (1) Providing shallow, short-term rent subsidies to
16 families whose income levels are not sufficient to pay
17 their rent; and

18 (2) Providing shallow, long-term rent subsidies to kupuna
19 on fixed incomes who face the threat of homelessness
20 due to rapidly rising rents.



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The purpose of this Act is to fund core homelessness
 services and establish new pilot programs to address the State's
 housing and homelessness crisis.

4 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$16,500,000 or so 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and 7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 8 year 2020-2021 for the department of human services and 9 department of health to fund and administer the outreach 10 program, rapid re-housing program, housing first program, family 11 assessment centers, law enforcement assisted diversion program, 12 and coordinated statewide homelessness initiative.

13 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 14 of human services and department of health for the purposes of 15 this Act.

16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$800,000 or so much 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the 19 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the department of human services to establish and 21 administer a short-term rental assistance pilot program to:

17	SECTION	15. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues of	the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much
19	thereof as m	may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
20	same sum or	so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year



2020-2021 for the executive office of aging, to establish and 1 2 administer a long-term rental assistance pilot program to: 3 Provide long-term rental assistance to individuals who (1)4 are over the age of sixty who are homeless or at 5 imminent risk of becoming homeless; Ensure that individuals participating in the program 6 (2) 7 will not pay more than fifty per cent of their income 8 for rent; and 9 (3) Provide housing counseling and landlord assistance to 10 assist elders to obtain and retain permanent housing. 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 12 of health for the purposes of this Act. 13 SECTION 6. (a) The department of health may merge the 14 long-term rental assistance program established pursuant to 15 section 5 of this Act with other existing programs, if in the 16 opinion of the department of health, it is efficient to do so. 17 (b) The department of health may establish rules and 18 qualification standards for beneficiaries of the long-term 19 rental assistance program. 20
