A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VACANCIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 17-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
amended to read as follows:

3 "§17-2 United States representative. (a) When a vacancy 4 occurs in the representation of this State in the United States 5 House of Representatives, the chief election officer shall issue a proclamation, not later than fourteen days after the vacancy 6 7 occurs, for an election to fill the vacancy [-,] by special 8 election to be conducted by ranked choice voting. The 9 proclamation shall be issued not later than on the sixtieth day 10 prior to the election to fill the vacancy and shall contain the 11 date, time, and places where the special election is to be held, 12 the time within which nomination papers shall be filed, the time 13 for transmitting to county clerks the notice designating the 14 offices for which candidates are to be elected, the time for 15 transmitting to county clerks lists of candidates to be voted 16 for at the special election, a statement that votes shall be 17 cast and tabulated using ranked choice voting and include an



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1	explanatio	on of ranked choice voting, and [such] any other matter
2	as provide	ed for in section 11-91 [and which] <u>that</u> are not
3	inconsist	ent with this section. The special election shall be
4	conducted	and the results ascertained so far as practicable, in
5	accordance	e with this title.
6	(b)	The following procedures shall be used to determine
7	the winne	r of the special election conducted by ranked choice
8	voting:	
9	(1)	Tabulation of votes shall proceed in rounds;
10	(2)	In each round, the number of votes for each continuing
11		candidate shall be counted, with each continuing
12		ballot counting as one vote for its highest-ranked
13		continuing candidate for that round;
14	(3)	Inactive ballots shall not be counted for any
15		continuing candidate; and
16	(4)	The round shall end with one of two potential
17		outcomes:
18		(A) If there are two or fewer continuing candidates,
19		the candidate with the most votes is declared the
20		winner of the election; or

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1	(B) If there are more than two continuing candidates,				
2	the last-place candidate is defeated and a new				
3	round begins.				
4	A tie under this section between candidates for the most votes				
5	in the final round or a tie between last-place candidates in any				
6	round shall be decided by lot, and the candidate chosen by lot				
7	shall be defeated. The office of elections may modify a ranked-				
8	choice voting ballot and tabulation; provided that the number of				
9	allowable rankings may be limited to no fewer than six and two				
10	or more candidates may be defeated simultaneously by batch				
11	elimination in any round of tabulation.				
12	(c) For the purposes of this section:				
13	"Batch elimination" means the simultaneous defeat of				
14	multiple candidates for whom it is mathematically impossible to				
15	be elected.				
16	"Continuing ballot" means a ballot that is not an inactive				
17	ballot.				
18	"Highest continuing ranking" means the highest ranking on a				
19	voter's ballot for a continuing candidate.				
20	"Inactive ballot" means a ballot that does not rank any				
21	continuing candidate, contains an overvote at the highest				



1	continuing ranking, or contains two or more sequential skipped
2	rankings before its highest continuing ranking.
3	"Last-place candidate" means the candidate with the fewest
4	votes in a round of ranked-choice voting tabulation.
5	"Mathematically impossible to be elected", with respect to
6	a candidate, means that:
7	(1) The candidate cannot be elected because the
8	candidate's vote total in a round of the ranked-choic
9	voting tabulation plus all votes that could possibly
10	be transferred to the candidate in future rounds from
11	candidates with fewer votes or an equal number of
12	votes would not be enough to surpass the candidate
13	with the next-higher vote total in the round; or
14	(2) The candidate has a lower vote total than a candidate
15	described in paragraph (1).
16	"Overvote" means a circumstance in which a voter has ranke
17	more than one candidate at the same ranking.
18	"Ranked choice voting" means the method of casting and
19	tabulating votes in which voters rank candidates in order of
20	preference, tabulation proceeds in sequential rounds in which



last-place candidates are defeated, and the candidate with the
most votes in the final round is elected.
"Ranking" means the number assigned on a ballot by a voter
to a candidate to express the voter's preference for that
candidate, in which number one is the highest ranking, number
two is the next-highest ranking, and so on.
"Round" means an instance of the sequence of voting
tabulation steps established in subsection (b).
"Skipped ranking" means a circumstance in which a voter has
left a ranking blank and ranks a candidate at a subsequent
ranking."
SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
begun before its effective date.
SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Description:

Requires vacancies in the office of United States Representative to be filled by special election that is conducted using ranked choice voting. (SD2)

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
