A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VETERANS SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that the Hawaii Marriage SECTION 1. 2 Equality Act of 2013 legalized same-sex marriages in the State. 3 Veterans and their family members have certain burial rights in 4 designated national and state veterans cemeteries. However, prior to 2013, same-sex couples' relationships were not 5 recognized by the State as spousal relationships for the 6 purposes of veterans burial rights. Currently under state law, 7 8 if a veteran same-sex partner died prior to the effective date of the Hawaii Marriage Equality Act, the veteran's surviving 9 10 spouse is not able to be interred with the deceased partner.

11 The legislature further finds that there are forms of 12 relief that have been afforded to same-sex partners wishing to 13 be buried in veterans cemeteries. There is the case of Nancy 14 Lynchild, who was married to her same-sex partner veteran Lt. 15 Col. Linda Campbell in Canada in 2010. Lynchild died in 2012, 16 before the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the federal Defense of 17 Marriage Act was unconstitutional. At the time of Lynchild's

1 death, the marriage wasn't recognized by the federal government; nevertheless, Campbell requested permission from the Secretary 2 of Veterans Affairs for Lynchild to be buried at the Willamette 3 4 National Cemetery. Although Lynchild did not fall into any of 5 the categories of persons explicitly listed as being eligible to 6 be buried in a national cemetery, the Secretary granted a waiver 7 to allow her to be interred at the national cemetery and cited that it was based in part on evidence of a committed 8 9 relationship between Lynchild and an eligible veteran. Under 10 state law, the director of the office of veterans services does 11 not have the same discretion as the Secretary of Veterans 12 Affairs to grant a waiver to a same-sex couple who were not 13 allowed to marry but are now seeking to be interred together at 14 a state veterans cemetery.

15 The purpose of this Act is to allow for interment of a 16 surviving, unmarried, same-sex partner of a deceased veteran at 17 any state veterans cemetery if the surviving partner provides 18 written evidence that the couple would have married but for a 19 state law prohibiting same-sex marriage.

20 SECTION 2. Section 363-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

"(b) The determination of eligibility for burial within
any state veterans cemetery shall be in accordance with current
Veterans Affairs and National Cemeteries Administration
Regulations[-]; provided that a surviving, unmarried, same-sex
partner of a deceased veteran may be interred at any state
veterans cemetery if the surviving partner provides a written
formal request for waiver and evidence to the Secretary of
Veterans Affairs that the couple would have married but for a
state law prohibiting same-sex marriage, including a joint bank
account, an affidavit, a rental agreement, or other case
evidence deemed appropriate by the Secretary of Veterans
Affairs. After review of the waiver request, the Secretary of
Veterans Affairs shall have the authority to adjudicate and to
respond accordingly to the requestor including approval of
internment."
SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2050;
provided that a surviving, unmarried, same-sex partner of a
deceased veteran may apply for interment at any state veterans
cemetery at any time after the effective date of this Act if the
