## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS TO PREPARE AN ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT FOR THE SHORELINE STABILIZATION PROJECT AT THE PUULOA RANGE TRAINING FACILITY AND URGING THE MARINE CORPS TO CONSIDER ALTERNATIVE APPROACHES TO COASTLINE MANAGEMENT.

1 WHEREAS, shoreline hardening is a coastline management 2 approach that uses seawalls, jetties, or other human-made 3 structures to prevent and mitigate coastal erosion; and 4 WHEREAS, although increasingly common, shoreline hardening 5 is controversial because of the damage it can cause to coastal 6 7 infrastructure, ecosystems, and the environment; and 8 9 WHEREAS, a report from the University of Hawaii found that using shoreline hardening on some Oahu coasts could cause beach 10 narrowing, beach loss, and amplified erosion on adjacent 11 beaches, leaving the areas inaccessible for recreational use or 12 13 cultural practices; and 14 15 WHEREAS, a study by the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center showed that shoreline hardening also significantly 16 reduces populations of fish, crabs, and other aquatic life; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, a shoreline hardening project carried out in 2013 at Iroquois Point on the island of Oahu killed nearly ninety 20 21 percent of the shoreline's vegetation and caused amplified erosion all along the adjacent coast; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps has recently 25 proposed to use shoreline hardening at Puuloa Range Training Facility on the island of Oahu in support of its Shoreline 26 27 Stabilization Project; and

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1 WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps argues that 2 shoreline hardening is necessary to mitigate costal erosion and protect impact berms and other range structures at Puuloa Range 3 Training Facility; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps has not prepared an 6 environmental impact statement for the project, instead issuing 7 a less-comprehensive environmental assessment; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the 2019 environmental assessment for the 10 Shoreline Stabilization Project does not consider the potential 11 12 loss of beach access, damage to historic buildings, and other significant environmental and cultural interests that may be 13 14 negatively impacted by shoreline hardening; and 15 WHEREAS, the environmental assessment for the project also 16 fails to take into account the potential damage that prolonged 17 18 impact driving could have on the area's karst system, water 19 table, and coral reef; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the environmental assessment does not provide an adequate analysis of alternative, less damaging, approaches to 22 coastline and resource management or discuss the possibility of 23 relocating the Puuloa Range Training Facility; and 24 25 WHEREAS, communities in Ewa Beach who will be affected by 26 the project say they were not provided adequate notice or an 27 28 opportunity to be heard on the issue; now, therefore, 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 30 Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 31 2020, the Senate concurring, that the United States Marine Corps 32 is requested to prepare an environmental impact statement for . 33 the Shoreline Stabilization Project at the Puuloa Range Training 34 Facility; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Marine Corps 37 is urged to consider alternative approaches to coastline 38 39 management and the possibility of moving the training facility to vacant land owned by the Department of the Navy on the island 40 of Oahu; and. 41



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Marine Corps is urged to provide relevant communities with adequate notice of and opportunities to be heard on any actions taken in furtherance of the Shoreline Stabilization Project that may affect those communities or community members; and

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 8 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Secretary of the 9 Navy, Commandant of the United States Marine Corps, members of 10 Hawaii's congressional delegation, Commander of Joint Base Pearl 11 Harbor-Hickam, Commanding Officer of United States Marine Corps 12 Base Hawaii, and Honolulu City Council member for District 1.
