HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII STATE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO CONDUCT A STUDY ON MISSING AND MURDERED NATIVE HAWAIIAN WOMEN AND GIRLS AND TO SUBMIT A REPORT ON THE STUDY TO THE LEGISLATURE.

WHEREAS, indigenous women and girls are victims of violence 1 at far greater rates than any other population in the United 2 3 States; and 4 5 WHEREAS, women and children in Hawaii are facing a widespread epidemic of violence and sex trafficking; and 6 7 WHEREAS, First Nations in Canada organized a mass movement 8 to expose the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women 9 10 and girls, which led to a national report and declaration of a national emergency; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, the Urban Indian Health Institute published the report "Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls: A 14 snapshot of data from 71 urban cities in the United States" in 15 2018 to document the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous 16 women and girls in the United States; and 17 18 WHEREAS, this report did not include Hawaii nor any 19 information on Native Hawaiian women and girls; and 20 21 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian women as a group are more 22 23 economically vulnerable than Native Hawaiian men, earning seventy cents for every dollar a man makes, and seventy-nine 24 cents for every dollar a Native Hawaiian man makes; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, historical trauma has increased the vulnerability of Native Hawaiian women and girls to sex trafficking and other 28 forms of violent crimes; and 29 30

WHEREAS, harmful colonial stereotypes have resulted in the 1 sexual fetishization of Native Hawaiian women; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian women, girls, and Native Hawaiian 5 members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer community disproportionately experience factors that put them at 6 high risk of being victims of sex trafficking and being involved 7 8 with the sex industry; and 9 WHEREAS, State government agencies are required by various 10 federal and state laws to tackle sex trafficking and collect 11 data; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs published the 14 report "Haumea: Transforming the Health of Native Hawaiian 15 Women and Empowering Wahine Well-Being" in 2018, and noted there 16 was no data specific to the human trafficking of Native Hawaiian 17 18 women and girls; and 19 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of 20 21 Women, in partnership with Arizona State University, surveyed sex trafficking victims and found that in 2018, seventy-seven 22 percent were Native Hawaiian, and then subsequently found that 23 24 sixty-four percent were Native Hawaiian in 2019; and 25 WHEREAS, from 2017 to 2019, one out of every three child 26 sex trafficking victims reported to the Child Welfare Services 27 child sex trafficking hotline were Native Hawaiian, and ninety-28 29 five percent were girls; and 30 WHEREAS, family members must often rely on alert mechanisms 31 for missing children, including physical message boards at 32 stores and social media outlets; and 33 34 35 WHEREAS, the State should be listening to Native Hawaiians and identifying ways to increase reporting on missing and 36 37 murdered Native Hawaiian women and girls; and 38 WHEREAS, nine states have passed legislation to address the 39 missing and murdered indigenous women and girl crisis; now, 40 therefore, 41 42
