## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A WORKING GROUP TO EXAMINE THE FEASIBILITY AND ECONOMIC IMPACT OF CREATING A HEALTH POLICY INSTITUTE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT MANOA.

1 WHEREAS, good health is critical to an individual's 2 wellbeing and a community's overall welfare; however, nearly a 3 third of all adults in the United States and a quarter of adults 4 in Hawaii are obese and many more suffer from other types of 5 chronic ailments; and

7 WHEREAS, preventable chronic conditions such as obesity
8 result in further health complications such as diabetes,
9 cardiovascular disease, and cancer that lead to increased and
10 avoidable health care spending; and

12 WHEREAS, as a consequence of the high prevalence of these 13 types of chronic conditions, the United States spent \$3.6 14 trillion on health care in 2018, which amounts to \$11,172 per 15 person and 17.7 percent of the nation's gross domestic product; 16 and

18 WHEREAS, although Hawaii's spending on health care is 19 \$7,299 per person, which is among the lowest in the country, and 20 the State consistently ranks among the top states in the country 21 for life expectancy, the cost of health care in Hawaii continues 22 to grow at an unsustainable rate, threatening the livelihoods of 23 families and the viability of businesses; and 24

25 WHEREAS, concerns about the soaring cost of health care led 26 to the creation of an All-Payer Claims Database, through Act 27 139, Session Laws of Hawaii 2016, which aggregates statewide 28 health care spending data to help policymakers understand the 29 drivers of soaring health care costs in Hawaii; and



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WHEREAS, the Legislature also established the Health 1 Analytics Program within the Department of Human Services' Med-2 QUEST Division through Act 55, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, to 3 leverage federal funds to further the goals and objectives of 4 5 the All-Payer Claims Database; and 6 WHEREAS, now, with much of the groundwork laid, the time 7 8 has come to begin utilizing this trove of information by 9 analyzing data, digesting information, and transforming results into informed policy decisions; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, one such way to accomplish this would be through the creation of a Health Policy Institute that would bring 13 together key stakeholders, provide an open forum for data-driven 14 15 discussions, and generate innovative policy proposals; and 16 WHEREAS, the University of Hawaii at Manoa's College of 17 Social Sciences has a proven track record of bringing together 18 subject matter experts to help translate academic research into 19 feasible and effective policy solutions; and 20 21 WHEREAS, in particular, the Collect of Social Sciences' 22 Pacific Health Informatics and Data Center and Office for 23 Evaluation and Needs Assessments Services have long histories of 24 using data-driven methods and analyses to generate translational 25 26 research; now, therefore, 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 28 Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 29 2020, the Senate concurring, that a working group be convened to 30 examine the feasibility and economic impact of creating a Health 31 Policy Institute at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; and 32 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group's work is 35 requested to include but not be limited to: 36 37 (1)The scope of health policy concerns in Hawaii and how these concerns may be addressed through the creation 38 39 of a Health Policy Institute; 40 A study of health policy institute models from other 41 (2) states or nations; 42
