

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO EXPAND AND IMPROVE HAWAII'S HOME VISITING PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, positive experiences in early childhood promote 1 healthy socio-emotional and physical and development, a healthy, 2 nurturing home is imperative for families of newborns throughout 3 the State; and 4 5 WHEREAS, home visiting programs provide individually 6 tailored support, resources, and information to expectant 7 parents and families with young children, which is especially 8 important for families at risk of child maltreatment and neglect 9 and other adverse childhood experiences, including living with 10 parents involved in domestic violence, substance abuse, mental 11 health problems, or incarceration; and 12 13

WHEREAS, home visiting services can reduce the risk of child abuse and developmental delays by reducing risk factors, fostering family functioning, promoting infant mental health and development, enhancing positive parenting skills, and linking parents to community resources, including childcare, housing, employment, health and mental health services, early childhood education, family literacy, and social services; and

22 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Healthy Start program was pioneered in 23 Hawaii in 1985 and became a model for the national Healthy 24 Families American program, and the Hawaii programs were 25 certified as Healthy Families American programs during the 26 2000s; and

28 WHEREAS, the Healthy Families America-Hawaii program, run 29 by the Department of Health, was the State's primary home 30 visiting child abuse prevention program, serving around 2,400 31 high risk families annually, with an excellent track record 32 consistently showing a ninety-nine percent non-abuse rate among 33 children of families served; and



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1 2 WHEREAS, the Healthy Families America-Hawai'i program was dismantled in 2008 due to budget restrictions, leaving only Hilo 3 4 and Wai'anae sites; and 5 WHEREAS, a Hawai'i home visiting program was established 6 within the Department of Health for hospital-based screening and 7 8 home visiting services for newborns' families, by Act 91, Regular Session of Hawaii 2013; and 9 10 WHEREAS, a study of the Healthy Families America-Hawai'i 11 program in the 2014 Journal of Family Violence showed that among 12 4,466 O'ahu families screened as high risk, children of families 13 14 not receiving services were hospitalized four times more 15 frequently than families receiving services, affirming that the 16 services were effective among the highest risk families; and 17 18 WHEREAS, in 2018, the Department of Health successfully 19 obtained competitive funding from the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services 20 Administration for a Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home 21 Visiting program that included the two existing Healthy Families 22 America-Hawai'i sites, Parents as Teachers services, and Home 23 24 Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters services, two initiatives that are evidence-based models targeting specific 25 outcomes including cognitive development and school readiness, 26 27 intervention with developmental delays, and prevention of child 28 abuse; and 29 30 WHEREAS, while intake criteria for the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting program includes low income, 31 history of child welfare, substance abuse, developmental delays, 32 low educational status, smoking, and being in the military, it 33 does not include the Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths 34 35 tools; and 36 WHEREAS, conditions for many families in Hawai'i have become 37 38 more stressful since 2008, with forty-eight percent of families 39 living below or near the poverty level per a recent Aloha United Way Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed report, and more 40 families are living in extremely stressful financial conditions 41



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including lack of housing which makes safe child rearing often 1 2 impossible; and 3 WHEREAS, Department of Health data from the former 4 5 statewide program showed that between ten and twelve percent of families, or around 1,377 families, had very high-risk 6 assessments, meaning a score of forty and above on the parent 7 8 survey, similar to four or more adverse childhood experiences 9 (ACEs); and 10 WHEREAS, such data correlates well with data from ACE 11 studies that estimate that about twelve percent of families with 12 ACE scores of four and above experience high levels of negative 13 outcomes related to health, including high rates of drug use, 14 HIV/AIDS, depression and attempted suicide, and poor work 15 16 attendance; and 17 WHEREAS, the ACE study showed that without interventions, 18 children of parents with multiple ACEs tend to experience the 19 same problems thereby creating an intergenerational cycle of 20 trauma, and that there remains a need for services that can 21 identify and effectively serve families at highest risk for 22 child abuse and neglect who have experienced multiple ACEs; and 23 24 WHEREAS, services that are specifically designed to reduce 25 ACE risk factors and avert abuse and neglect can reduce 26 27 intergenerational trauma and the social impact of this trauma related to mental health and attempted suicide, substance 28 dependence, anti-social and criminal behavior, and related 29 30 costs, which recent state budgets total nearly \$1,000,000,000 annually for Hawai'i; and 31 32 WHEREAS, the ACE risk reduction services can augment the 33 Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting program, 34 potentially forming two levels of needed services, including 35 comprehensive services for lower and moderate risk families and 36 37 intensive evidence-based risk reduction services for families at very high risk for child abuse and neglect; now, therefore, 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 40

41 Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of
42 2020, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Health is



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1 urged to continue expanding and improving its home visiting 2 program, including reinstatement of a network of evidence based 3 home visiting services for families at highest risk for child 4 abuse and neglect; and

6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 7 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health 8 and the Executive Director of the Hawaii Family Support 9 Institute at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.
