A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BULLYING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. Section 302A-101, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately
3	inserted	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>"</u> Bu	llying" means any intentional verbal, physical,
5	written,	or electronically transmitted act or conduct that:
6	(1)	Is done by a public school student, a public school
7		volunteer or employee, or a department volunteer or
8		employee to insult, taunt, or challenge another public
9		school student, public school volunteer or employee,
10		or department volunteer or employee;
11	(2)	Is severe, pervasive, or persistent, as determined by
12		a reasonable person under the circumstances; and
13	(3)	Has any of the following effects, as determined by a
14		reasonable person under the circumstances:
15		(A) Places the recipient in reasonable fear of:



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1	<u>(i)</u>	Substantial harm to the recipient's
2		emotional, psychological, or physical well-
3		being;
4	<u>(ii)</u>	Substantial damage to the recipient's
5		property;
6	<u>(iii)</u>	Substantial harm to the emotional,
7		psychological, or physical well-being of a
8		person other than the recipient; or
9.	<u>(iv)</u>	Substantial damage to the property of a
10		person other than the recipient;
11	(B) Inci	tes, solicits, or coerces an individual or
12	grou	p of individuals to cause or place the
13	reci	pient in reasonable fear of:
14	<u>(i)</u>	Substantial harm to the recipient's
15		emotional, psychological, or physical well-
16		being;
17	<u>(ii)</u>	Substantial damage to the recipient's
18		property;
19	<u>(iii)</u>	Substantial harm to the emotional,
20		psychological, or physical well-being of a
21		person other than the recipient; or



1	(iv) Substantial damage to the property of a
2	person other than the recipient; or
3	(C) Creates an intimidating, threatening, or abusive
4	educational environment for the recipient.
5	"Electronically transmitted act or conduct" means an act or
6	conduct that involves the transmission of electronic data,
7	including but not limited to words, drawings, pictures, video,
8	or audio files, through a computer, computer network system,
9	other network system, cellular phone, or other similar
10	electronic device that has the capability of sending and
11	receiving data.
12	"Harassment" means the act of bullying, annoying, or
13	alarming a public school student, a public school volunteer or
14	employee, or a department volunteer or employee by engaging in
15	conduct that includes but is not limited to:
16	(1) Striking, shoving, kicking, or otherwise touching a
17	person in an offensive manner or subjecting such
18	person to offensive physical contact;
19	(2) Insulting, taunting, or challenging another person in
20	a manner likely to provoke a violent response;



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1	(3)	Making verbal or non-verbal expressions that cause
2		another person to feel uncomfortable, pressured,
3		threatened, or in danger:
4		(A) Because of reasons that include but are not
5		limited to the person's race, color, national
6		origin, ancestry, sex, including gender identity
7		and expression, religion, disability, or sexual
8		orientation;
9		(B) That creates an intimidating, hostile, or
10		offensive educational environment, or interferes
11		with the education of a student; or
12		(C) Otherwise adversely affects the educational
13		opportunity of a student or students;
14	(4)	Name calling, making rude gestures, insults, or
15		teasing which causes another person to feel
16		humiliated, intimidated, threatened, or embarrassed;
17	(5)	Making a telephone call without purpose of legitimate
18		communication;
19	(6)	Making repeated communications anonymously, at
20		extremely inconvenient hours, or in offensively coarse
21		language on campus or other department of education



1		premises, on department of education transportation,
2		or during a department of education sponsored activity
3		or event on or off school property;
4	(7)	Causing fear to prevent another person from gaining
5		legitimate access to or use of school buildings,
6		facilities, services, or grounds including restroom
7		facilities; or
8	(8)	Physically harming, physically restraining,
9		threatening, or stalking another person."
10	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by	y adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
12	to read as	s follows:

14	§3022	A- Bullying prevention and response action plan.
15	(a) The b	ooard shall develop a bullying prevention and response
16	action pla	an to inform public school students, public school
17	employees	and volunteers, and department employees and
18	volunteers	s of policies and procedures for:
19	(1)	Prevention of and education regarding bullying,
20		harassment, and retaliation in the department and in
21		public schools;



1	(2)	Reporting bullying and harassment to the department,
2		board, or law enforcement agencies, as appropriate;
3	(3)	Reporting bullying or harassment to the parents of the
4		public school students who committed or were affected
5		by bullying or harassment;
6	(4)	Investigation of alleged bullying or harassment by the
7		department if the alleged bullying or harassment
8		occurred in a public school or by the board if the
9		alleged bullying or harassment occurred in the
10		department;
11	(5)	Preservation and documentation of evidence of bullying
12		and harassment in the department or public schools;
13	(6)	Mediation, non-punitive response, or other alternative
14		dispute resolution for conduct occurring between
15		public school students, employees, or volunteers of
16		equal power; provided that no public school student,
17		employee, or volunteer shall be required to accept
18		mediation, non-punitive response, or other alternative
19		dispute resolution in lieu of reporting to law
20		enforcement agencies if the act or conduct may
21		reasonably constitute bullying or harassment;

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1	report on	the bullying prevention and response action plan,
2	including	any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later
3	than twen	ty days prior to the convening of each regular session
4	of the le	gislature, beginning with the regular session of 2020.
5	The repor	t shall redact any names or other identifying
6	informati	on that would identify any individual involved in an
7	alleged i	ncidence of bullying or harassment. For each alleged
8	incident	of bullying or harassment, the report shall include:
9	(1)	A brief description of each act or conduct included in
10		the incident;
11	(2)	The date or date range that the incident occurred;
12	(3)	The date the incident was reported to the department
13		or board;
14	(4)	The status of the investigation by the department or
15		board into the incident, as of the date of the report;
16	(5)	The disposition of the investigation, as of the date
17		of the report;
18	(6)	The number of days elapsed between the date the
19		incident was reported to the department or board and
20		the implementation of its response, if any;



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1	(7)	Identification of the public school associated with
2		the incident;
3	(8)	The disposition of any incident that was not
4		identified as resolved in the prior annual report to
5		the legislature; and
6	(9)	Any other information the board or department deems
7		pertinent; provided that in no case shall the report
8		include any name, identifying number, or other
9		identifying information of any individual involved in
10		an incident of alleged bullying or harassment that
11		will identify the affected parties.
12	SECT	ION 3. Act 214, Session Laws of Hawaii 2011, is
13	repealed.
