A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO YOUTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

Ţ	PART 1
2	SECTION 1. The National Center for Housing and Child
3	Welfare reports that there are between one million and seven
4	million homeless youth who have run away or have been asked to
5	leave their homes. According to the National Runaway Safeline,
6	it is estimated that on any given night, there are approximately
7	1.3 million homeless youth living unsupervised on the streets,
. 8	in abandoned buildings, with friends, or with strangers.
9	Homeless youth lack parental, foster, or institutional care and
10	are thus prone to be at a higher risk for physical abuse, sexual
11	exploitation, mental health disabilities, substance abuse, and
12	death.
13	The legislature finds that Hawaii is not immune to the
14	seriousness and prevalence of youth homelessness. A 2016
15	National Conference of State Legislatures article, "Homeless and
16	Runaway Youth", indicates that studies have shown that forty-six
17	per cent of runaway and homeless youth reported being physically

- 1 abused, thirty-eight per cent reported being emotionally abused,
- 2 and seventeen per cent reported being forced into unwanted
- 3 sexual activity by a family or household member. Furthermore,
- 4 seventy-five per cent of homeless or runaway youth have dropped
- 5 out or will drop out of school. The legislature recognizes the
- 6 necessity of establishing safe places that offer shelter,
- 7 programs, and support to at-risk youth.
- 8 The purpose of this part is to:
- 9 (1) Require the office of youth services to coordinate a
 10 three-year safe places for youth pilot program, which
 11 will coordinate a network of safe places that youth
 12 can access and obtain advice, guidance, access to
 13 programs, and services; and
- (2) Establish and appropriate funds for a safe places for
 youth pilot program coordinator position and
 residential options for the pilot program.
- SECTION 2. (a) The office of youth services shall
 coordinate a three-year safe places for youth pilot program in
 partnership with private organizations. The primary objective
 of the pilot program shall be to coordinate a comprehensive
 network of safe places that youth can access for safety and

- 1 where they can obtain advice, guidance, programs, and services.
- 2 All youth shall be eligible for services at the safe places.
- 3 The requirements to consent to emergency shelter and related
- 4 services, as set forth in section 346-17.6, Hawaii Revised
- 5 Statutes, shall apply to services provided under the safe places
- 6 for youth pilot program.
- 7 (b) There is established the position of a safe places for
- 8 youth pilot program coordinator. The coordinator shall:
- 9 (1) Coordinate the safe places for youth network;
- 10 (2) Partner with an entity to maintain an updated listing
- of safe places statewide;
- 12 (3) Provide ongoing training for organizations designated
- as safe places for youth, including training in
- emergency response and trauma;
- 15 (4) Partner with the department of education, state
- student council, peer education programs, private
- schools, and other youth services organizations to
- build awareness of the safe places for youth network;

- 20 (5) Convene an annual meeting of safe places for youth
- 21 organizations and other interested parties to identify

1		emerging needs, provide feedback on program
2		effectiveness, and provide an opportunity to recommend
3		improvements to the pilot program.
4	(c)	The safe places for youth pilot program shall provide
5	access to	and linkage with services and programs needed by
6	youth, in	cluding:
7	(1)	Domestic violence prevention or reduction;
8	(2)	Violence and trauma recovery and support;
9	(3)	Human trafficking resources and prevention;
10	(4)	Suicide prevention;
11	(5)	Resources targeted at teenagers, including teen
12		pregnancy prevention;
13	(6)	Tobacco cessation;
14	(7)	Alcohol and substance abuse support;
15	(8)	Assistance for youth to achieve their educational and
16		vocational goals; and
17	(9)	Other relationship-building and life skills.
18	(d)	The office of youth services shall submit a report to
19	the legis	lature of its findings and recommendations, including
20	any propos	sed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the
21	convening	of the regular sessions of 2021 and 2022. The reports

- 1 shall include a recommendation on whether the pilot program
- 2 should be continued, modified, or terminated.
- 3 (e) The safe places for youth pilot program shall cease to
- 4 exist on June 30, 2022.
- 5 (f) For the purposes of this section:
- 6 "Safe places" means physical and virtual places of safety
- 7 for youth.
- 8 "Youth" means any person less than eighteen years of age.
- 9 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$70,000 or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 12 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 13 2020-2021 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) safe places for
- 14 youth pilot program coordinator position and for residential
- 15 options for the pilot program.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of human services for the purposes of this part.
- 18 PART II
- 19 SECTION 4. The legislature finds that offenses known as
- 20 "status offenses", which include conduct such as truancy that
- 21 would not be criminal except when committed by a minor, are

- 1 linked to a strong need for social services to address the root
- 2 causes of the commission of juvenile status offenses. The
- 3 general response to status offenders is involvement with the
- 4 criminal justice system, even though research has shown that
- 5 incarceration and other forms of secure detention have a severe
- 6 negative impact on youth and do not resolve the issues that led
- 7 to the offense. Innovative programs have and continue to be
- 8 developed to better address status offense conduct and divert
- 9 youth from entering the criminal justice system.
- 10 The purpose of this part is to:
- 11 (1) Require the office of youth services to examine and
 12 report on options to reduce the use of status offense
 13 laws and increase the use of diversion programs and
 14 services for youth involved in status offense-type
 15 conduct; and
- 16 (2) Appropriate funds for the office of youth services to
 17 implement, through a three-year contract with a
 18 community services provider, a status offense
 19 diversion program.
- 20 SECTION 5. The office of youth services shall examine
 21 options to reduce the use of status offense laws and increase

- 1 the use of diversion programs and services for youth involved in
- 2 status offense-type conduct. The office of youth services shall
- 3 submit a report to the legislature of its findings and
- 4 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, no later
- 5 than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions
- 6 of 2021 and 2022.
- 7 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$130,000 or so much
- 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 11 2020-2021 for the office of youth services to implement, through
- 12 a three-year contract with a community services provider, a
- 13 status offense diversion program.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 15 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Description:

Establishes and appropriates funds for a safe places for youth pilot program. Requires and appropriates funds for the office of youth services to reduce the use of status offense laws and implement a status offense diversion program. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1)

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
