A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness is one
- 2 of the most pressing problems in Hawaii, which requires a
- 3 robust, comprehensive, long-term solution to address Hawaii's
- 4 affordable housing and homelessness crisis. One important
- 5 component of the solution is ensuring that low-income kupuna are
- 6 not forced into homelessness through a combination of fixed
- 7 incomes and rapidly rising rents. Therefore, a rent subsidy
- 8 program targeted toward assisting kupuna in this situation is
- 9 necessary.
- 10 Over the last fifty years, the number of cost-burdened
- 11 renters, those paying more than thirty per cent of their income
- 12 for rent, has significantly increased. Today, almost half of
- 13 renters in the State pay more than thirty per cent of their
- 14 income for rent. High housing costs have driven more and more
- 15 Hawaii residents into homelessness and now Hawaii has the
- 16 highest homelessness rate in the nation.

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- 1 The legislature finds that by making smart investments in
- 2 homelessness and housing, using data-driven practices, and
- 3 improving coordination, Hawaii has gradually begun to turn the
- 4 tide in the homelessness crisis. In 2017, Hawaii's homelessness
- 5 rate went down for the first time in years, a trend that
- 6 continued in 2018. During the regular session of 2018, the
- 7 legislature made unprecedented levels of investment in low-
- 8 income housing and homelessness, appropriating \$200,000,000 for
- 9 the rental housing revolving fund, \$30,000,000 for ohana zones,
- 10 and \$13,500,000 for proven-effective and promising homelessness
- 11 programs.
- 12 To turn back fifty years of growth in Hawaii's housing and
- 13 homelessness crisis, investments of this scale must be made
- 14 consistently in the coming years. Hawaii must prioritize
- 15 programs that are the most cost-effective and target the most
- 16 vulnerable populations, such as the State's kupuna. The latest
- 17 Homeless Service Utilization Report (2017) found that there are
- 18 1,386 homeless elders in Hawaii. Many more elders face
- 19 homelessness as rents skyrocket. Due to the fixed incomes of
- 20 elders, a long-term rental assistance program is needed.

1	The purpose of this Act is to establish the long-term
2	rental assistance pilot program for kupuna.
3	SECTION 2. (a) There is established the long-term rental
4	assistance pilot program to be administered by the Hawaii public
5	housing authority. The Hawaii public housing authority shall
6	enter into memoranda of agreement with the counties to implement
7	this Act. The Hawaii public housing authority and the counties
8	shall:
9	(1) Provide long-term rental assistance to individuals who
10	are over sixty years of age and are homeless or at
11	imminent risk of becoming homeless;
12	(2) Ensure that individuals participating in the program
13	will not pay more than fifty per cent of their income
14	for rent; and
15	(3) Provide housing counseling and landlord assistance to
16	assist elders in obtaining or retaining permanent
17	housing.

The Hawaii public housing authority may work with the

executive office on aging to merge the long-term rental

assistance pilot program with existing programs if, in the

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- 1 opinion of the Hawaii public housing authority, it is more
- 2 efficient to do so.
- 3 (c) The Hawaii public housing authority may establish
- 4 rules and qualification standards for participants of the long-
- 5 term rental assistance pilot program.
- 6 (d) The Hawaii public housing authority shall require the
- 7 long-term rental assistance program participants to participate
- 8 in the Continuum of Care's Coordinated Entry System for homeless
- 9 services.
- 10 (e) The Hawaii public housing authority shall require the
- 11 provider of the long-term assistance pilot program to input data
- 12 into the United States Department of Housing and Urban
- 13 Development's Homeless Management Information System.
- 14 (f) The Hawaii public housing authority shall submit a
- 15 report to the legislature of its findings and recommendations,
- 16 including any proposed legislation, regarding the long-term
- 17 rental assistance pilot program no later than one month prior to
- 18 the convening of the regular sessions of 2020, 2021, 2022, and
- **19** 2023.
- 20 (g) The long-term rental assistance pilot program shall
- 21 cease to exist on June 30, 2022.

- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 5 2020-2021 for the long-term rental assistance pilot program.
- 6 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
- 7 public housing authority for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
