A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO YOUTH SERVICES PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§352D- Vocational training programs; commercial
5	enterprise; revolving fund; operations. (a) There is
6	created the office of youth services revolving fund to be
7	administered by the office of youth services. All moneys
8	collected from the sale of goods and services by individual
9	vocational programs that engage in commercial enterprise,
LO	as established under section 32D-4(5) shall be deposited
L1	into the office of youth services revolving fund. The
L2	moneys in the revolving fund shall be used for the purposes
L3	of vocational programs within the office of youth services
L4	as determined by the office of youth services
L5	(b) The administrators for each individual vocational
L6	program except those at a youth correctional facility shall
L7	determine the prices at which all goods and services are
L 8	sold. The prices shall be as near to the prevailing market

- 1 prices for similar goods and services as practicable.
- 2 (c) The vocational programs may market goods and
- 3 services to both the public and private sectors.
- 4 (d) The administrator for each individual vocational
- 5 program shall ensure that the quality of goods and services
- 6 produced is comparable to similar goods and services
- 7 available from the private sector. For sales to the State
- 8 or the counties, the quality of the goods or services shall
- 9 be consistent with the specifications for the goods or
- 10 services requested."
- 11 SECTION 2. Section 352D-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended to read as follows:
- 13 "§352D-4 Establishment; purpose. There is
- 14 established within the department of human services for
- 15 administrative purposes only the office of youth services.
- 16 The office of youth services is established to provide
- 17 services and programs for youth at risk under one umbrella
- 18 agency in order to facilitate optimum service delivery, to
- 19 prevent delinquency, and to reduce the incidence of
- 20 recidivism among juveniles through the provision of
- 21 prevention, rehabilitation, and treatment services. The
- 22 office shall also be responsible for program planning and
- 23 development, intake/assessment, oversight, as well as

consultation, technical assistance, and staff training 1 relating to the delivery of services. The office shall provide a continuum of services as 3 follows: An integrated intake/assessment and case 5 (1)management system; 6 (2) The necessary educational, vocational, social 7 counseling and mental health services; provided 8 that the department of education shall be the only provider of standards-based education 10 services for all youth adults at risk and young 11 12 adults identified with special education needs or 13 actively receiving special education services, in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities 14 Education Act (20 U.S.C. section 1400 et seq.) 15 and all applicable federal and state educational 16 17 requirements; Community-based shelter and residential (3) 18 facilities; 19 Oversight of youth services; and 20 (4)21 (5) Other programs which encourage the development of positive self-images and useful skills in such 22 youth [-] and young adults, including commercial 23

enterprise programs for young adults. 1 The executive director of the office of youth services shall submit annual reports to the legislature no later 4 than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, reporting the services or programs funded pursuant 5 to this section, the number of youth served by each service 6 or program, and the results of the services or programs 8 funded. To this end, on July 1, 1991, this office shall assume 9 the responsibilities for juvenile corrections functions, 10 which were temporarily placed in the department of 11 corrections pursuant to Act 338 of 1987. 12 These functions 13 shall include, but not be limited to, all responsibilities, under chapter 352, for the Hawaii youth correctional 14 facilities." 15 16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the office of youth services revolving fund the sum of \$ 17 18 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-19 2020, to carry out the purposes of this Act. SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is 20 bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is 21 underscored. 22

Description:

Permits individual non-justice vocational programs within the purview of the Office of Youth Services to engage in commercial enterprises, including the sales of goods and services, for self-sustainability purposes.

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH SERVICES TITLE:

PROGRAMS.

PURPOSE: To establish self-funded commercial

> enterprise vocational programs within OYS for young adults (between the ages of eighteen and twenty-four) at risk as defined in section 352D-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prepare young adults at risk with the necessary job skills to become productive and employed members of the community. Individual vocational programs will be allowed to sell the goods and services produced by the program in order to be self-

sustaining. The establishment of the commercial enterprise vocational programs shall not affect the provision of services

by the Department of Education.

To create the Office of Youth Services Revolving Fund within OYS, for the receipt of income and payment of expenses generated from and by the commercial enterprise

vocational programs.

MEANS: Add a new section to chapter 352D, Hawaii

Revised Statutes, and amend section 352D-4.

JUSTIFICATION: Over 15,000 young adults ages eighteen through twenty-four years old in Hawaii are neither employed nor in school, resulting in a lifetime state expenditure of \$6.5 billion

in lost wages and costs.

This measure will fulfill the OYS requirement under 352D-4 to provide vocational training services for at risk youth and young adults in a self-sustaining

fashion.

This proposal also supports the Connect 2 Careers partnership, which is formed to

build, measure, and scale high-quality workbased learning experiences that align with local, county, and state economic and labor market needs. This measure will enhance the rigor and relevance of work-based learning as students engage in comprehensive, realworld immersive experiences.

The new section of chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statues, will allow OYS to expand and support the career programs to allow for the sale of products and services and deposit these funds back into the Offices of Youth Services Revolving Fund. This is a crucial component of being able to sustain, support, and expand the vocational programs that are geared toward improving the employment and productive status of at risk young adults.

The goal is not to compete with commercial business, and at this scale it will not. The goal is to provide an opportunity for self-sustainability, accountability, and entrepreneurship for our emerging young adults.

In addition, the State will save money by authorizing OYS to fund its own vocational programs through commercial enterprise.

Act 169, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, consists of a similar law on behalf of the Department of Education that authorizes individual departments, career pathways, or programs to engage in commercial enterprise by the sale of goods and services produced by or for the program in order to generate funding for the program.

Impact on the public: There is a positive impact for the public in that it lessens the funding that will be required for OYS programming, while creating skilled young adults who can enter the workforce and become self-sufficient. The agricultural vocational programs also add to the State's

plan to become more self-reliant and provide our citizens with locally produced products.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
There is no foreseeable impact on other
agencies. The only impact is on OYS for
needing to manage the accounting for the
Office of Youth Services Revolving Fund. On
the other hand, it will save OYS money and
will create stability for the vocational
programs.
