A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ANIMAL FUR PRODUCTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that historically,
- 2 animals were hunted and trapped for food, and their pelts were
- 3 used to provide protective clothing. Over time, technology has
- 4 developed making fur less of a necessity and more of a luxury
- 5 item. Fur garments are now typically designed for fashion
- 6 rather than for warmth. Further, more animals are now killed to
- 7 make decorative fur trim than to manufacture full fur garments.
- 8 Due to serious animal welfare concerns, fur farming bans are
- 9 being enacted worldwide, with more and more countries phasing
- 10 out fur farming.
- 11 The legislature further finds that more than one hundred
- 12 million animals are violently killed for their fur every year.
- 13 More than eighty-five per cent of pelts in the world's fur trade
- 14 comes from fur farms. The remaining fifteen per cent of pelts
- 15 are from animals caught in traps in the wild. Animals that are
- 16 bred on fur farms commonly include mink, fox, marten,
- 17 chinchilla, rabbits, and raccoon dogs.



1 The legislature additionally finds that in light of the 2 wide array of faux fur and other alternatives for fashion and apparel, the demand for fur products does not justify the 3 4 unnecessary killing and cruel treatment of animals. Eliminating 5 the sale of fur products in Hawaii will foster a more humane 6 environment in the State. 7 The legislature also finds that fur farming can be damaging 8 to the environment and contributes to water and air pollution. 9 Fur farming often involves the use of toxic chemicals including 10 chromium and formaldehyde. In addition, fur farming consumes 11 significant quantities of energy and water. The amount of 12 energy required to produce a coat made of real fur from ranch-13 raised animal skins is over fifteen times that needed to produce 14 a fake fur garment. For each kilogram of factory-farmed mink 15 fur, one hundred ten kilograms of carbon dioxide is produced. 16 The legislature further finds that existing laws require **17** relatively little oversight of the fur farming and fur trade industries. Compliance with guidelines issued by the American 18 19 Veterinary Medical Association is not mandatory, and fur farms 20 are not monitored by any government agency. Federal laws do, 21 however, prohibit the import or export of dog or cat fur

- 1 products into or from the United States, prohibit the
- 2 introduction of dog or cat fur products into interstate
- 3 commerce, forbid deceptive labeling of fur products, and require
- 4 that products made with real animal fur be labeled as such.
- 5 These laws provide regulation of some types of fur products and
- 6 allow consumers to choose whether to purchase real or faux fur
- 7 garments.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to prohibit the manufacture or
- 9 sale of certain animal fur products in the State and the
- 10 shipment or transport of certain fur products into the State for
- 11 sale or distribution.
- 12 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 13 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
- 14 as follows:
- 15 "CHAPTER
- 16 ANIMAL FUR PRODUCTS
- 17 § -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter:
- 18 "Director" means the director of commerce and consumer
- 19 affairs or the director's designee.
- 20 "Fur" means any animal skin or part thereof with hair,
- 21 fleece, or fur fibers attached thereto, either in its raw or

- 1 processed state; provided that "fur" does not include such skins
- 2 or parts thereof that are converted into leather which in
- 3 processing will have the hair, fleece, or fur fiber completely
- 4 removed; cowhide with hair attached thereto; or lambskin or
- 5 sheepskin with fleece attached thereto.
- 6 "Fur product" means any article of clothing or covering for
- 7 any part of the body, or any fashion accessory, including but
- 8 not limited to handbags, shoes, slippers, hats, earmuffs,
- 9 scarves, shawls, gloves, jewelry, keychains, toys or trinkets,
- 10 or home accessories and décor, that is made in whole or in part
- 11 of fur; provided that "fur product" does not include a dog or
- 12 cat fur product subject to title 19 United States Code section
- 13 1308.
- 14 "Non-profit organization" means any entity organized under
- 15 title 26 United States Code section 501(c)(3) for charitable,
- 16 religious, philanthropic, educational, or similar purposes.
- "Used fur product" means a fur product that a person has
- 18 acquired for the person's own use and subsequently used or worn.
- 19 § -2 Manufacture of animal fur products prohibited;
- 20 exemption. (a) It shall be unlawful to manufacture fur
- 21 products in the State.

- 1 (b) The prohibition in subsection (a) shall not apply to
- 2 the manufacture of fur products manufactured using fur sourced
- 3 exclusively from used fur products.
- 4 § -3 Sale of animal fur products prohibited; exemption.
- 5 (a) It shall be unlawful to sell, offer for sale, display for
- 6 sale, trade, give, donate, or otherwise distribute a fur product
- 7 in the State.
- **8** (b) The prohibition in subsection (a) shall not apply to
- 9 the sale, offer for sale, display for sale, trade, gift,
- 10 donation, or other distribution of:
- 11 (1) Used fur products by a person not normally in the
- 12 business of selling fur products, non-profit
- organization, or second hand store including a pawn
- shop; or
- 15 (2) Fur products manufactured using fur sourced
- 16 exclusively from used fur products.
- 17 § -4 Penalties; administrative fines. (a) Any person
- 18 who violates this chapter or any rule adopted pursuant to this
- 19 chapter shall receive a citation from the director stating the
- 20 violation.

A person who receives a citation from the director

- shall have twenty-four hours from receipt of the citation, or such greater time as deemed reasonable by the director under the
- 7 circumstances, to correct or otherwise remedy the violation
- 8 prior to the imposition of administrative fines.
- 9 (d) A person who receives a citation from the director and 10 who fails to correct or otherwise remedy the violation shall be 11 fined:
- 12 (1) Not more than \$500 for a first violation;
- (2) Not more than \$750 for a second violation within oneyear of the date of the first violation; and
- 15 (3) Not more than \$1,000 for each additional violation

 16 within one year of the date of a second or subsequent

 17 violation.
- (e) The director may recover any costs and fees, includingbut not limited to attorney's fees, for specific enforcementactions pursuant to this chapter.

- 1 § -5 Rules. The director shall adopt rules pursuant to
- 2 chapter 91 necessary for the purposes of this chapter."
- 3 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 5 begun before its effective date.
- 6 SECTION 4. If any provision of this Act, or the
- 7 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
- 8 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
- 9 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
- 10 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 11 of this Act are severable.
- 12 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
