A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DISTRICT HEALTH OFFICERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of
- 2 health has long recognized that the district health officer in
- 3 each of the three neighbor island counties should be a licensed
- 4 physician; ideally, a physician with experience in both
- 5 community medicine and public health. However, at some point,
- 6 the role of Hawaii county's acting district health officer was
- 7 filled by a non-physician.

- 8 The legislature further finds that when the department's
- 9 response to public health issues in Hawaii county is compared to
- 10 its response in Maui county, it is evident that the issues were
- 11 addressed more proficiently, and with greater community
- 12 satisfaction, in Maui county. This disparity is illustrated by
- 13 the department's respective responses in each county to two
- 14 major public health crises: the 2002 dengue fever outbreak and
- 15 the recent outbreak of rat lungworm disease. In both instances,
- 16 the legislature believes that the department's engagement with
- 17 community members was much more effective in Maui county.

1 The legislature finds that the Maui county district health 2 officer's visit to Hawaii county during its dengue fever 3 outbreak was much appreciated by Hawaii county residents, 4 because the physician was able to communicate valuable 5 information to the community. The legislature cannot ignore the 6 fact that Hawaii county residents felt devalued and even 7 disrespected by the department's lack of a community-based 8 physician. This was reflected in their highly critical audits 9 of the department's response to disease outbreaks. As a result, **10** members of the Hawaii county council petitioned the legislature 11 to require that all district health officers be physicians. 12 It is evident to the legislature that communities benefit **13** from the "boots on the ground" approach of physicians who serve 14 as district health officers. A physician's knowledge and 15 experience facilitate the position's day-to-day responsibilities 16 and allow the officer to serve as a dedicated community **17** resource.


- 1 The legislature concludes that requiring experience as an
- 2 on-site, community-based physician to serve as a district health
- 3 officer is critical to the department of health's ability to
- 4 provide community support and education and to address the
- 5 communities' needs and concerns in the face of public health
- 6 issues.
- 7 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to codify the long-
- 8 standing practice of having licensed physicians in the roles of
- 9 district health officers.
- 10 SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately
- 12 designated and to read as follows:
- 13 "§321- District health officer; physician. Each
- 14 district health officer of the department of health shall be a
- 15 physician licensed under part I of chapter 453. To the extent
- 16 practicable, the physician shall have experience in public
- 17 health, primary care, emergency services, epidemiology, or
- 18 tropical medicine."
- 19 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 20 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2019,
- 21 provided that any incumbent district health officer who is



- 1 employed by the department of health on the effective date of
- 2 this Act and who does not meet the Act's requirements shall
- 3 remain in that position until replaced by the department of
- 4 health or until December 31, 2019, whichever occurs sooner.
