A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii keiki:
- healthy and ready to learn program (Hawaii keiki program) is 2
- designed to improve access to, and the quality of, school-based 3
- health services available to Hawaii's public school students by 4
- 5 coordinating and expanding existing efforts of community
- 6 partners and resources. This partnership program with the
- 7 University of Hawaii at Manoa school of nursing and dental
- 8 hygiene supports the department of education in achieving
- 9 student, school, and system success by providing school health
- 10 nursing and primary care services to public schools in five
- 11 complex areas.
- In 2015, the legislature appropriated general funds to 12
- 13 improve access to, and increase the quality of, health services
- 14 available to Hawaii's public school students.
- 15 appropriation led to the expansion of the Hawaii keiki program,
- 16 with five advanced practice registered nurses and five
- registered nurses serving seven complex areas across three **17**



- 1 islands. During this time, the Hawaii keiki program also
- 2 established five school-based health centers.
- 3 The legislature further finds that the department of
- 4 education is working with other state agencies, partnering
- 5 organizations, and families to improve attendance, behavior, and
- 6 course marks by partnering to coordinate wraparound services
- 7 that address non-school factors that impede student success.
- 8 Furthermore, through the Hawaii keiki program collaboration, the
- 9 departments of health and human services have identified the
- 10 extent of services provided within each department targeted at
- 11 public school children and the need to coordinate internal
- 12 departmental activity and cross-departmental efforts to develop
- 13 sustainable school-based health services.
- 14 The legislature additionally finds that chronic
- 15 absenteeism, poor health, and delayed or limited access to
- 16 health care and preventive services continue to hinder academic
- 17 success and meeting the needs of the whole child. The
- 18 legislature acknowledges that the Hawaii keiki program is an
- 19 effective means by which to continue collaboration between
- 20 health, human services, and education policymakers and providers
- 21 to achieve sustainable, comprehensive school-based health

1	services	in the State to improve the academic and health
2	outcomes	of Hawaii's public school students. Working with each
3	complex a	rea superintendent and school principals, the Hawaii
4	keiki pro	gram builds and enhances school-based health services
5	that refl	ect the specific needs of the individual complex area
6	according	to student demographics, staffing, available support
7	services,	and access to health care within the community,
8	including	:
9	(1)	Providing comprehensive screening for physical and
10		behavioral health conditions;
11	(2)	Providing referrals to primary and behavioral health
12		care and patient-centered medical home services;
13	(3)	Preventing and controlling communicable diseases and
14		other health problems;
15	(4)	Providing emergency care for illness or injury; and
16	(5)	Collaborating with community partners, including
17		federally qualified health centers, the Hawaii chapter
18		of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Hui for
19		Excellence in Education Coalition, and other key
20		stakeholders to develop and implement a comprehensive

plan to implement school-based health.

1	The legislature also finds that the expected cost to
2	continue and expand the Hawaii keiki program to include students
3	from pre-kindergarten through high school in the fifteen
4	department of education complex areas statewide; expand the
5	program to allow the Hawaii state public charter school
6	commission to launch the program in two public charter schools
7	serving disadvantaged keiki; provide access to preventive oral
8	health services and establish a pilot oral health screening and
9	preventative services program on a neighbor island; enhance data
10	collection, sharing, analysis, and reporting; and engage in
11	interdepartmental school health coordination, is \$4,000,000
12	annually, in addition to a one-time allocation of \$500,000 for
13	an evidence-based vision screening tool. These funds will
14	additionally establish school health services coordinator roles
15	in the department of health and the MedQUEST division of the
16	department of human services.
17	The purpose of this Act is to:

- 18 (1) Statutorily establish the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program and special fund; and **19**
- (2) Appropriate funds to expand and sustain the program; **20** 21 establish school health service coordinators in the

1	departments of health and human services to increase
2	coordination and facilitate departmental and
3	interdepartmental activities related to comprehensive
4	school-based health services; and for an evidence-
5	based vision screening and eye assessment tool
6	appropriate for children in kindergarten through grade
7	twelve as part of the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready
8	to learn program.
9	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by adding two new sections to part II to be
11	appropriately designated and to read as follows:
12	"§302A-A Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program.
13	(a) There is established within the department the Hawaii
14	keiki: healthy and ready to learn program to provide school-
15	based health services. The department shall convene the program
16	in collaboration with the department of health, department of
17	human services, University of Hawaii at Manoa school of nursing
18	and dental hygiene, community service providers, and other
19	health care and education stakeholders to increase access to and
20	reimbursement for school-based wellness and health services.

2		health nursing branch of the department of health
3		pursuant to a memorandum of understanding between the
4		department, department of health, and the Hawaii

6		federally qualified health center and rural health

8		participating complex of schools; and
9	(2)	The Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program
10		shall be precluded from providing services at any
11		school where a school-based clinic established
12		pursuant to a memorandum of understanding or contract
13		between a federally qualified health center or rural
14		health clinic and the department exists or may exist
15		in the future; provided that precluded services shall
16		include any service that duplicates any service that
17		is either provided or offered at a school-based
18		clinic.
19	(b)	The program shall be funded through appropriations to
20	the Hawai	i keiki: healthy and ready to learn program special

3	(1)	Private funding sources, including federal grants and
4		private, nonprofit, and not-for-profit organizations
5		to support the continuation and expansion of school-
6		based health services in the department; and
7	(2)	Federal reimbursement for school-based health
8		services.
9	(c)	The program shall work to address the adverse effects
10	of the fo	llowing situations experienced by students, including
11	but not 1	imited to:
12	(1)	Poverty;
13	(2)	Unstable housing conditions, including homelessness;
14	(3)	Poor parental health; and
15	(4)	Racial or ethnic minority status,
16	and shall	be evaluated based on its success in addressing such
17	adverse e	ffects.

- 1 shall deduct five per cent of all receipts of all other special
- 2 funds, which deduction shall be transferred to the general fund
- 3 of the State and become general realizations of the State. All
- 4 officers of the State and other persons having power to allocate
- 5 or disburse any special funds shall cooperate with the director
- 6 in effecting these transfers. To determine the proper revenue
- 7 base upon which the central service assessment is to be
- 8 calculated, the director shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter
- 9 91 for the purpose of suspending or limiting the application of
- 10 the central service assessment of any fund. No later than

- 19 medication; provided that:

1	(1)	If the student receiving the medication is a minor, a
2		parent or guardian requests and authorizes the
3		administration of medication;
4	(2)	The medication has been prescribed by a licensed
5		physician[7] as defined in section 334-1, <u>a licensed</u>
6		advanced practice registered nurse subject to the
7	·	scope of section 457-2.7, or by a practitioner with
8		prescriptive authority;
9	(3)	The administration of the medication is with the
10		approval of the department of health[+] or the Hawaii
11		keiki: healthy and ready to learn program under
12		section 302A-A; and
13	(4)	The administration of the medication is necessary for
14		the health of the student and for the student's
15		attendance at school."

18	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
19	same sum	or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
20	2020-2021	for a school health services coordinator within the
21	departmen	t of health.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 7 2020-2021 for a school health services coordinator within the
- 8 department of human services.
- 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 10 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 13 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 14 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 15 2020-2021 for an evidence-based vision screening and eye
- 16 assessment tool appropriate for children in kindergarten through
- 17 grade twelve as part of the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to
- 18 learn program.
- 19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 20 of education for the purposes of this Act.

- 1 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
- 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 5 2020-2021 to be deposited into the Hawaii keiki: healthy and
- 6 ready to learn program special fund.
- 7 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii keiki:
- 8 healthy and ready to learn program special fund the sum of
- 9 \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 10 2019-2020 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
- 11 necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to implement, expand, and
- 12 sustain the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program;
- 13 provided that no funds shall be released unless the program has
- 14 demonstrated success in addressing the adverse effects of
- 15 section 302A-A(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 10. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 19 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 20 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 21 the new sections in this Act.

- 1 SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2052.
