A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE KUPUNA CAREGIVERS PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that as of July 1, 2018,
the United States Census Bureau estimated that 18.4 per cent of
Hawaii's population was sixty-five years or older, and with
projections of an increase to 19.4 per cent in 2020 and 23 per
cent by 2030, caring for Hawaii's kupuna is a high priority of
the legislature.

7 The legislature finds that currently there are 154,000 8 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii who are taking care of their 9 parents, spouse, or other relatives who need extra care. Familv 10 careqivers play a crucial role in the State's health care system 11 by providing long-term care to the elderly, all unpaid. 12 However, it is imperative to ensure that the caregivers take 13 care of themselves and have the necessary support and services 14 to sustain their own health as well as the health of the family 15 member for whom they are caring.

16 To address this issue, the kupuna caregivers program was 17 established on July 6, 2017, and aims to provide working

1 caregivers with additional resources to cover a variety of 2 support services such as adult day care, assisted 3 transportation, homemaker services, and many more important 4 services to qualified kupuna. The program ensures that 5 caregivers continue earning their own retirement benefits, which 6 helps businesses retain experienced workers and provides peace 7 of mind that loved kupuna are well cared for while careqivers 8 remain in the workforce. This program allows caregivers who are 9 juggling their own employment with their caregiving 10 responsibilities to simultaneously take care of their kupuna and 11 themselves.

12 Since the establishment of the kupuna caregivers program, 13 the executive office on aging has reportedly received hundreds 14 of calls from Hawaii residents wishing to receive the benefits 15 of the program. While the creation of the program was an 16 important first step, the legislature believes that the program 17 requires additional fourth year funding to have the impact it 18 needs. With the high volume of residents showing interest in 19 the program, the current funding needs to be increased in order 20 to better serve the people of Hawaii.

21 The purpose of this Act is to:

1 (1)Reduce the amount of hours per week an individual must 2 be employed to be a qualified caregiver under the 3 kupuna caregivers program from thirty to twenty; and 4 (2) Appropriate funds for the implementation of the kupuna 5 caregivers program. 6 SECTION 2. Section 349-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended by amending the definition of "qualified caregiver" to 8 read as follows: 9 ""Qualified caregiver" means an individual who meets the 10 following requirements: 11 Provides care for a care recipient; and (1) 12 Is employed at least [thirty] twenty hours per week by (2) 13 one or more employers." 14 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much 16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for proper 17 implementation of the kupuna caregivers program. 18 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the executive 19 office on aging for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 20 21 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
