A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHILDREN AND FAMILY OF INCARCERATED INDIVIDUALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the National 2 Resource Center on Children and Families of the Incarcerated 3 reports that an estimated 2,700,000 children nationwide have at least one parent who is incarcerated. Studies conducted by the 4 5 National Fatherhood Initiative show that in terms of negative 6 impacts on children, incarceration may be worse than the death 7 of a parent or the divorce of parents. Moreover, it is 8 evidenced that children of incarcerated parents are more likely 9 to become incarcerated themselves as teenagers or adults, thus 10 continuing the cycle of incarceration that becomes generational in some families, and sadly, a reality for many in the State of 11 12 Hawaii.

13 The legislature further finds that the children of 14 incarcerated parents are some of the nation's most vulnerable 15 and marginalized populations. Parental incarceration is noted 16 as being a strong risk factor and determinant for many adverse 17 outcomes for children, including antisocial and violent



behavior, mental health problems, failure to graduate from school, and unemployment. Parental incarceration is nationally recognized under "adverse childhood experiences" by Kaiser Permanente, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and is distinguished from other adverse childhood experiences by the unique combination of trauma, shame, and stigma.

Over the past ten years, Hawaii organizations that serve 8 9 children and families affected by parental incarceration have developed a myriad of services aimed at this population; 10 11 however, there continue to be major gaps in service, particularly because funding for these programs has never been 12 established as a priority. One reason is that data on children 13 of incarcerated parents has not been available historically. 14 The absence of data has meant there was insufficient data 15 available to illustrate and justify the extent of the problem in 16 17 Hawaii. This is especially true for service providers who are 18 trying to access federal funding that is programmed to assist children and families and break the cycle of incarceration. 19 In January 2014, the legislature's keiki caucus established 20

21 the family reunification working group to explore the issues



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1 surrounding children and families impacted by incarceration. 2 The group comprised representatives from several organizations 3 and service providers, including Blueprint for Change, Hawaii Prisoners Resource Center, dba Holomua Center, the Office of 4 Hawaiian Affairs, ALU LIKE, Inc., Queen Lili'uokalani Children's 5 6 Center, Keiki O Ka 'Āina Learning Centers, Family Programs Hawai'i, Adult Friends for Youth, Community Alliance on Prisons, 7 TJ Mahoney/Ka Hale Hoʻāla Hou No Nā Wāhine, Chaminade 8 University's Native Hawaiian Program, and Makana o Ke Akua Clean 9 10 and Sober Living. It also included parents of children who have been affected by incarceration. The group established two 11 immediate priorities to work on, a database of children in 12 Hawaii impacted by incarceration, and a one-stop resource center 13 14 for these children and their families. During the 2015 legislative session, a bill was passed requiring the department 15 16 of public safety to begin collecting data at the point of intake on the number of minor children under the age of eighteen from 17 18 each incarcerated parent. Based on this data, in Hawaii there 19 are approximately four thousand children a year affected by 20 parental incarceration.



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Furthermore, the legislature finds that the prison 1 environment can be frightening and traumatizing for children, 2 both in the attitudes and behaviors of prison staff and the 3 harshness of the physical setting of visitation sites. Visits 4 can include long waits, body frisks, rude treatment, and 5 exposure to crowded visiting rooms having no activities for 6 children. Those conditions do not encourage frequent visits 7 between incarcerated parents and their children. Studies 8 suggest the maintenance of family ties and parent-child 9 relationships is linked to post-release success, lower rates of 10 recidivism, and fewer parole violations; therefore, visitation 11 should be encouraged. 12

To address problems with visitation and family support, the 13 keiki caucus introduced, and the legislature adopted, two 14 concurrent resolutions during the regular session of 2019, House 15 Concurrent Resolution No. 205 and Senate Concurrent Resolution 16 No. 7. These resolutions requested the department of human 17 services, in consultation with the department of public safety, 18 to work with the family reunification working group and other 19 stakeholders to develop a plan to establish children-friendly 20 and family-friendly visitation centers at all state correctional 21

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1 facilities to ensure the well-being of children of incarcerated 2 parents and their families. A working group was convened in 3 August 2019 and after several meetings the group developed a 4 proposal calling for the establishment of a pilot visitation and 5 family resource project to be located at Waiawa correctional 6 facility, in Waipahu on Oahu.

7 The working group found that there are working models that 8 could be emulated and referenced for effectiveness and 9 applicability. One successful example is the visitation center 10 program established in California by the non-profit organization 11 Friends Outside that is funded by the California Department of 12 Corrections and Rehabilitation under legislative mandate. The 13 primary purpose of those centers is to remove barriers and 14 facilitate family visitation to strengthen and reunify families 15 with an emphasis on the well-being of the child. The California 16 centers are located on prison grounds but outside the prison 17 walls, and staffed with employees trained to educate children of 18 their parents' incarceration through age-appropriate means, 19 inform children and families on prison and jail policies to 20 ensure they work with their incarcerated loved ones to abide by 21 and uphold state rules and regulations, connect children and



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1 families with resources in the community, and facilitate incarcerated parent-child relationships by addressing trauma 2 during the period of incarceration. The California centers 3 serve as a one-stop shop for the children and families, which 4 5 also helps to alleviate demands on the corrections department. 6 The legislature finds that the establishment of family 7 visitation and resource centers is in the best interest and 8 well-being of the child and as studies suggest, may have many 9 benefits for the incarcerated parent and other family members, 10 the community, and the State. 11 The purpose of this Act is to: 12 (1) Acknowledge adverse experiences faced by children of 13 incarcerated parents; Encourage continued efforts and engagement between the 14 (2) department of human services, department of public 15 16 safety, the family reunification working group, and 17 other community stakeholders to find ways to improve visitation at State correctional facilities; 18 Require the establishment of a pilot visitation and 19 (3) family resource center located at Waiawa correctional 20 facility that shall be operated by a non-profit 21



1 organization contracted by the department of human
2 services and include trauma-informed professionals who
3 shall serve as liaisons and hookele for families
4 affected by incarceration; and

5 (4) Appropriate funds for work necessary to establish,
6 develop, and implement the pilot visitation and family
7 resource center.

SECTION 2. The department of human services shall continue 8 to lead a working group to address visitation and support needs 9 of children and families of incarcerated individuals pursuant to 10 House Concurrent Resolution No. 205 and Senate Concurrent 11 Resolution No. 7 (2019). Beginning August 1, 2020, the 12 department of human services shall work together with the 13 department of public safety, the family reunification working 14 group, and other entities serving children and families affected 15 by parental incarceration to establish a pilot visitation and 16 family resource center at Waiawa correctional facility on Oahu. 17 18 The visitation and family resource center shall be operated by a non-profit organization contracted by the department of human 19 services and in cooperation with the department of human 20 services, department of public safety, and other community 21

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stakeholders. The pilot visitation and family resource center
 shall include trauma-informed professionals who shall serve as
 liaisons and hookele for families affected by incarceration.

4 The working group shall be exempt from chapter 92, Hawaii5 Revised Statutes.

6 The working group shall submit a report of its findings and 7 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 8 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 9 the regular session of 2021.

10 The working group shall cease to exist on January 31, 2021; 11 provided that the department of human services may continue the 12 work of the working group beyond January 31, 2021, if the 13 department deems it necessary.

SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the establishment of a pilot visitation and family resource center at Waiawa correctional facility on Oahu.

19 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of20 human services for the purposes of this Act.

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SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the
establishment of a pilot visitation and family resource center
at Waiawa correctional facility on Oahu.
The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of

7 public safety for the purposes of this Act.

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8 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
