RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 196, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by adding a new section to part V to be appropriately		
3	designated and to read as follows:		
4	" <u>§196-</u> Household appliances; retailers; rebates. (a)		
5	All retailers of household appliances doing business in the		
6	State shall conspicuously display signage or text on household		
7	appliances in a font size no smaller than one-half inch which		
8	informs consumers of the following:		
9	(1) Available energy efficiency rebates; and		
10	(2) Hawaii-specific energy costs for operation.		
11	(b) The Hawaii state energy office, in collaboration with		
12	the public benefits fee administrator, shall notify all		
13	retailers subject to this section of the requirements of this		
14	section."		
15	SECTION 2. Section 269-123, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
16	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:		



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1	"(b)	The public benefits fee administrator's duties and
2	responsib	ilities shall be established by the public utilities
3	commissio	n by rule or order, and may include:
4	(1)	Identifying, developing, administering, promoting,
5		implementing, and evaluating programs, methods, and
6		technologies that support energy-efficiency and
7		demand-side management programs;
8	(2)	Encouraging the continuance or improvement of
9		efficiencies made in the production, delivery, and use
10		of energy-efficiency and demand-side management
11		programs and services;
12	(3)	Using the energy-efficiency expertise and capabilities
13		that have developed or may develop in the State and
14		consulting with state agency experts;
15	(4)	Promoting program initiatives, incentives, and market
16		strategies that address the needs of persons facing
17		the most significant barriers to participation;
18	(5)	Promoting coordinated program delivery, including
19		coordination with electric public utilities regarding
20		the delivery of low-income home energy assistance,



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1		other demand-side management or energy-efficiency
2		programs, and any utility programs;
3	(6)	Consideration of innovative approaches to delivering
4		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services,
5		including strategies to encourage third-party
6		financing and customer contributions to the cost of
7		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services;
8	(7)	Submitting, to the public utilities commission for
9		review and approval, a multi-year budget and planning
10		cycle that promotes program improvement, program
11		stability, and maturation of programs and delivery
12	,	resources; and
13	(8)	Educating and training appliance manufacturers,
14		distributors, and retailers of appliances [covered]:
15		(A) Covered under part VI of chapter 196 about the
16		appliance efficiency standards established under
17		that part <u>; and</u>
18		(B) Covered under section 196- about the energy
19		efficiency and energy cost information required
20		to be displayed under that section,
21		to improve compliance[-] with those laws."



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SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on October 1, 2020.
