A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO GREEN FEES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that each year, Hawaii's
- 2 reefs, oceans, beaches, and forests provide billions of dollars
- 3 in value to the economy, supporting the well-being of our
- 4 communities and visitors alike. Hawaii cannot disentangle its
- 5 environment from its economy. Therefore, residents and visitors
- 6 understand the value and importance of Hawaii's natural
- 7 resources. Inseparable from the culture of Hawaii, Hawaii's
- 8 environment is integral to the experiences of residents and
- 9 visitors.
- 10 The legislature also finds that although these natural
- 11 resources are critical for the visitor industry and resident
- 12 communities, Hawaii's total natural resources management funding
- 13 constitutes a major unfunded liability that poses a significant
- 14 risk to the business climate and the economic resiliency of the
- 15 State.
- 16 The legislature further finds that the State's vital
- 17 ecosystems and the resources they harbor continue to decline,



due to lack of adequate investment in proven and effective 1 2 conservation approaches. Data demonstrates growing concern that 3 the lack of adequate plans to address the multitude of issues 4 contributes to the continued decline to Hawaii's environment. 5 Ten million visitors enjoyed the benefits of Hawaii's ecosystem and natural environment in 2019, and the number of 6 7 visitors is expected to rise in the future. Increased demand on 8 Hawaii's natural resources requires innovative conservation 9 plans and programs focused on reversing the decline in ecosystems and the associated risks for Hawaii's visitor 10 11 industry and communities; such as the innovative financing 12 mechanism of green fees and other assessments to address funding 13 natural resource management and climate change mitigation. 14 By prioritizing the protection of Hawaii's ocean, forest, 15 and freshwater ecosystems and following the benchmarks set forth **16** in the Aloha+ Challenge natural resource management goals, the 17 legislature seeks to better understand how the governor's 18 administration, state departments and agencies, and their 19 private partners are working together to set forth plans to 20 accomplish climate change goals of the State.

1	The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for a study				
2	to identify the current plans, programs, funding sequences and				
3	plans, and allocations of state revenue in place to achieve the				
4	Aloha+ Challenge natural resource management goals.				
5	SECTION 2. (a) The office of planning shall conduct a				
6	study that includes but is not limited to the following:				
7	(1)	Iden	tification of:		
8		(A)	Current plans and programs established to meet		
9			the Aloha+ Challenge natural resource management		
10			2030 goals;		
11		(B)	Investments focused on protecting Hawaii's ocean,		
12			forest, and freshwater ecosystems to ensure the		
13			perpetuation of the resources and resilience to		
14			climate change;		
15		(C)	Current sources of funding; and		
16		(D)	Priority areas where natural resources are in		
17			extreme threat;		
18	(2)	An a	nalysis and breakdown of Hawaii's conservation		
19		funding gap that exists in current natural resource			
20		mana	gement funding relative to meeting the needs and		
21		pric	orities identified in the Aloha+ Challenge natural		

		resource management 2030 goars and the extent to which
2		Hawaii's unfunded conservation liabilities will
3		increase based on the current rate of funding;
4	(3)	An analysis and review of the current utilization and
5		effectiveness of natural resource management funding
6		throughout state departments and agencies;
7	(4)	An examination of all existing tax and fee structures
8		that exist to support natural resource management
9		efforts, including all sources of funding and
10		allocation of the funds to address the Aloha+
11		Challenge natural resource management 2030 goals;
12	(5)	An examination of all existing tax and fee structures
13		placed on residents and visitors, including an
14		estimated per resident and per visitor annual
15		contributions;
16	(6)	An analysis and recommendations on the existing
17		funding structures and the advantages or disadvantages
18		of increasing, decreasing, or reallocating existing
19		taxes and fees relative to addressing the funding
20		needs to achieve the Aloha+ Challenge natural resource
21		management 2030 goals;

1	(7)	An analysis of all innovative financing mechanisms		
2		that will ensure the most effective management of		
3		funds and result in use of revenues collected for the		
4		specific purposes of this Act, such as green fees and		
5		other assessments to address funding natural resource		
6		management and climate change mitigation;		
7	(8)	Identification of potential short-term and long-term		
8		impacts on Hawaii's tourism industry, including		
9		possible market impacts and economic and workforce		
10		considerations; and		
11	(9)	Development of a seven-year achievement plan with the		
12		recommendation of funding sources to begin no later		
13		than July 1, 2022, including proposed funding sources		
14		benchmarks, indicators, and mandatory impact		
15		reporting.		
16	(b)	The office of planning, in consultation with the		
17	Hawaii tourism authority, department of business, economic			
18	development, and tourism, and department of land and natural			
19	resources, shall engage with stakeholders and industry leaders,			
20	including but not limited to:			

(1) The director of finance;

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- 1 (2) The director of taxation;
- 2 (3) Representatives of other relevant state agencies;
- 3 (4) Representatives of business or industry groups whose
- 4 respective members would be affected by the
- 5 implementation of the plan;
- **6** (5) Representatives of non-governmental organizations
- 7 having an interest in climate change issues and
- 8 natural resource protection; or
- 9 (6) Other relevant parties necessary to assist in
- 10 fulfilling the Aloha+ Challenge natural resource
- management 2030 goals.
- 12 (c) The office of planning shall submit an interim report
- 13 to the legislature of its progress, participants, findings,
- 14 recommendations, and timeline for completion of the plan no
- 15 later than December 31, 2020.
- 16 (d) The office of planning shall submit a final report to
- 17 the legislature of its progress, participants, findings, and
- 18 recommendations, including the implementation plan to achieve
- 19 the Aloha+ Challenge natural resource management 2030 goals, no
- 20 later than October 31, 2021.

- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for a
- 4 study to be conducted by the office of planning pursuant to
- 5 section 2 of this Act.
- 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 7 planning for the purposes of this Act; provided that no funds
- 8 shall be made available under this Act unless the office of
- 9 planning obtains matching funds from the private sector for at
- 10 least fifty per cent of the cost of the study.
- 11 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on December 31,
- **12** 2033.
