A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the GoFarm Hawaii
3	program is critical to growing, creating, and commercializing
4	local farms that are capable of meeting Hawaii's food
5	sustainability goals. Currently, approximately eighty-five per
6	cent of the State's food is imported. This leaves the State
7	vulnerable to shipping disruptions and natural disasters. The
8	Hawaii emergency management agency estimates that, in the event
9	of port closures, food supplies would be exhausted in five to
10	seven days.
11	The food import industry also represents billions of
12	dollars each year that are leaving the State's economy. In
13	2014, local consumers spent approximately \$4,100,000,000 on
14	food. Approximately eighty-five per cent, or \$3,500,000,000, of
15	this was spent on imported foods. In contrast, only twelve per
16	cent of farms in the State make more than \$50,000 annually, and
17	only seven per cent reach more than \$100,000 in annual sales.

1 The GoFarm Hawaii program was developed by the University 2 of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human resources to 3 assist local farmers in growing and commercializing their 4 production. In 2019, the program provided business consulting, 5 training, and technical assistance to more than three hundred seventy-five existing and aspiring farmers. GoFarm Hawaii also 6 7 helped more than sixty farmers apply for loans, leases, and 8 grants and to develop business plans and value-added products. 9 GoFarm Hawaii has also established beginning farmer 10 training programs to assist new commercial farmers: two 11 programs on the island of Oahu and one each on the islands of 12 Maui, Kauai, and Hawaii. The certificate-based program includes 13 education and mentoring in agricultural production and business. 14 In the last three years, more than one hundred thirty students 15 have graduated from the beginning farmer training program. Of 16 these, almost fifty per cent started new farm businesses and 17 fourteen per cent found employment with existing operations in the agricultural industry. The courses have been highly 18 19 successful, and the demand for enrollment often exceeds 20 availability. In 2019, seventy-two aspiring farmers applied for 21 twenty-four Oahu-based openings.

1	The	legislature further finds that funding for the Gorarm
2	Hawaii pr	ogram comes exclusively from government and private
3	grants.	To manage the program at existing levels, operating
4	costs for	fiscal year 2020-2021 are estimated at \$1,400,000,
5	with \$400	,000 of that amount anticipated to be received from
6	private g	rants.
7	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this part is to:
8	(1)	Appropriate funds for the GoFarm Hawaii program to
9		provide business consulting, technical assistance, and
10		beginning farmer training on at least four islands;
11		and
12	(2)	Require the GoFarm Hawaii program to provide the
13		chairperson of the board of agriculture with reports
14		on the program's annual goals, outputs, and outcomes.
15	SECT	ION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
16	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
17	much ther	reof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for
18	the GoFar	m Hawaii program to provide business consulting,
19	technical	assistance, and beginning farmer training on at least

1	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
2	Hawaii for the purposes of this part.
3	SECTION 3. The GoFarm Hawaii program shall provide the
4	chairperson of the board of agriculture with:
5	(1) An annual report no later than of the
6	program's goals for the chairperson's review; and
7	(2) A semi-annual report no later than
8	outlining the program's outputs and outcomes.
9	PART II
10	SECTION 4. The legislature acknowledges that new and
11	aspiring farmers face a myriad of challenges, including
12	acquiring adequate production and business knowledge and skills
13	and accessing the tools necessary to evaluate their resources
14	and develop feasible farming and business plans. However, the
15	State lacks qualified farming method teachers and funding for
16	beginning farmer training. Further, although the United States
17	Department of Agriculture provides funding for beginning
18	farmers, this funding is limited and unreliable.
19	The legislature believes that the future of the State's
20	farming industry, food supply, and agriculture is reliant upon
21	increasing and diversifying the number of new farmers in the

- 1 State; introducing regenerative farming methods into the State;
- 2 enhancing the long-term viability of farm businesses; utilizing
- 3 and building upon existing beginning farmer training methods;
- 4 providing opportunities for potential farmers who are socially
- 5 or financially disadvantaged; and increasing support for
- 6 beginning farmers who already own or manage a farm, and have
- 7 farmed for five years or less.
- 8 Accordingly, the purpose of this part is to establish the
- 9 beginning farmer training program to be administered by the
- 10 University of Hawaii West Oahu sustainable community food
- 11 systems program.
- 12 SECTION 5. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately
- 14 designated and to read as follows:
- 15 "§141- Beginning farmer training program; established.
- 16 (a) There is established the beginning farmer training program
- 17 to be administered by the University of Hawaii West Oahu
- 18 sustainable community food systems program in conjunction with
- 19 qualified farmer training providers.
- 20 (b) The University of Hawaii shall:

1	(1)	Collaborate and consult with, and provide funding,
2		information, and educational resources to, qualified
3		<pre>farmer training providers;</pre>
4	(2)	Implement strategies to increase the number of new
5		farmers in the State, with a focus on recruiting low-
6		income persons, disabled persons, and military
7		veterans;
8	(3)	Assist qualified farmer training providers seeking
9		federal and county funding to expand their training
10		offerings;
11	(4)	Evaluate the effectiveness of the beginning farmer
12		training program;
13	(5)	Subject to the availability of funding, distribute
14		funding to as many training programs as is practical
15		to achieve the purpose of the beginning farmer
16		training program; and
17	(6)	Retain records of all activities and costs related to
18		the implementation of the beginning farmer training
19	•	program.
20	(c)	A beginning farmer shall be eligible for training for
21	a maximum	of one year; provided that the beginning farmer:

1	(1)	Qualifies for Hawaii resident tuition or provides
2		proof that the beginning farmer has been farming for
3		no more than five years;
4	(2)	Maintains satisfactory academic progress; and
5	(3)	Demonstrates an interest in pursuing a career in the
6		State's agricultural industry.
7	(d)	Subject to the availability of funding, the University
8	of Hawaii	may enter into contracts with qualified farmer
9	training	providers on a first come, first served basis to
10	effectuat	e the purpose of this section; provided that:
11	(1)	No contract shall be more than \$100,000 per year per
12		<pre>provider;</pre>
13	(2)	The term of any contract shall be no longer than one
14		year; and
15	(3)	No qualified farmer training provider may receive more
16		than \$300,000 in aggregate for services procured
17		pursuant to this section during any five-year period.
18	(e)	Training services procured pursuant to subsection (d)
19	may inclu	de the following topics:
20	(1)	The proper methods of:

1		(A) Planting, tending, cultivating, and harvesting
2		various types of crops; and
3		(B) Raising livestock or poultry;
4	(2)	Soil health;
5	(3)	Agricultural business operations, including workforce
6		issues, regulatory compliance, and general operations;
7		and
8	(4)	An industry analysis of the agricultural industry and
9		related markets.
10	<u>(f)</u>	A qualified farmer training provider providing
11	services	pursuant to this section shall make available for
12	inspectio	n and examination by the University of Hawaii during
13	regular b	ousiness hours all related training materials, sites,
14	and facil	ities.
15	(g)	The University of Hawaii West Oahu sustainable
16	community	food systems program shall submit a report to the
17	legislatu	re no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
18	each regu	lar session. The report shall include at a minimum:
19	(1)	The number of beginning farmers enrolled in the
20		beginning farmer training program during the preceding
21		vear:

1	(2)	A description of each qualified farming training
2		<pre>provider;</pre>
3	(3)	An assessment of the ability of program participants
4		to complete project objectives and work tasks; and
5	(4)	An evaluation of the results achieved by the program,
6		to be written, to the extent possible, in measurable
7		and quantifiable terms.
8	(h)	As used in this section:
9	<u>"Beg</u>	inning farmer" means a person who has been farming for
10	no more t	han five years and is eighteen years of age or older.
11	"Qua	lified farmer training provider" means a nonprofit
12	organizat	ion with more than two years of experience offering
13	farmer tr	aining programs and that is engaged in the growth,
14	cultivati	on, or raising of crops, livestock, poultry, poultry
15	products,	or dairy products; provided that this term shall not
16	include f	acilities primarily engaged in processing agricultural
17	products.	n -
18	SECT	ION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
19	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much
20	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to
21	establish	and implement the beginning farmer training program,

- 1 including payment of administration costs, staff salaries, and
- 2 expenses for contracting with outside entities.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 4 Hawaii for the purposes of this part.

- 6 SECTION 7. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2150;
- 8 provided that section 5 of this Act shall be repealed on
- **9** June 30, 2025.

Establishes a five-year beginning farmer training program to be administered by the University of Hawaii West Oahu sustainable community food systems program. Appropriates funds for the GoFarm Hawaii program and the beginning farmer training program. Effective 7/1/2150. Repeals the beginning farmer training program on 6/30/2025. (HD1)
