A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEX TRAFFICKING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a 2 form of modern-day slavery. According to a 2018 report 3 published by Arizona State University, it is estimated that one 4 in every eleven male residents of Hawaii are online sex 5 shoppers. When nonresidents are included, the report estimated 6 that 74,362 sex buyers are potentially active in the islands. 7 Moreover, Imua Alliance, a local victim service provider for 8 survivors of sexual servitude, estimates that one hundred fifty 9 establishments participate in the commercial sex trade in 10 Hawaii, placing them at a high risk for sex trafficking.

11 The legislature further finds that Hawaii does not have a 12 dedicated shelter for victims of sex trafficking. This lack of 13 an emergency shelter impedes the State's effectiveness in 14 responding to sexual exploitation by preventing government 15 agencies and victim service providers from establishing a 16 coordinated continuum of care and protection for victims in a 17 centralized location.



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1	The purpose of this Act is to:	
2	(1) Authorize the department of human services to	
3	establish or contract with a victim service provider	
4	to operate and manage a sex trafficking emergency	
5	shelter, subject to available funding; and	
6	(2) Exempt compensation received by a victim service	
7	provider for operating a sex trafficking emergency	
8	shelter from the general excise tax.	
9	SECTION 2. Chapter 237, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
10	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
11	and to read as follows:	
12	" <u>§237-</u> Exemption for victim service providers of sex	
13	trafficking emergency shelters. There shall be exempted from	
14	the measure of all taxes imposed by this chapter any	
15	compensation received by a victim service provider for services	
16	rendered to sex trafficking victims at a sex trafficking	
17	emergency shelter pursuant to section 346"	
18	SECTION 3. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
19	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
20	and to read as follows:	



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1	" <u>§34</u>	6- Sex trafficking emergency shelter. (a) To the
2	<u>extent th</u>	at funding is available, the department may establish
3	<u>or contra</u>	ct with a victim service provider to operate and manage
4	<u>a sex tra</u>	fficking emergency shelter.
5	(b)	To the extent that appropriations are made available,
6	the sex t	rafficking emergency shelter shall provide housing and
7	appropria	te service to victims granted admittance to the
8	shelter.	
9	(c)	The operator of the sex trafficking emergency shelter,
10	in consul	tation with any appropriate governmental agency or
11	nongovern	mental organization, shall be responsible for
12	determini	ng:
13	(1)	If a victim is eligible for residence at the sex
14		trafficking emergency shelter, including the degree of
15		need and course of treatment for each victim; and
16	(2)	When a victim is no longer eligible for residence at
17		the sex trafficking emergency shelter; provided that
18		the term of residence for any victim shall not exceed
19		thirty days.
20	(d)	Any person who enters or remains in or upon the
21	premises	of any sex trafficking emergency shelter authorized by



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1	this section, after being requested to leave by the department
2	or its designee, victim service provider, or a police officer,
3	shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
4	(e) Any compensation received by a victim service provider
5	pursuant to this section for operating or managing a sex
6	trafficking emergency shelter shall be exempt from taxation
7	under chapter 237.
8	(f) Any county mayor, by executive order, may exempt the
9	operator of a sex trafficking emergency shelter established
10	pursuant to this section from real property taxes, water and
11	sewer development fees, rates collected for water supplied to
12	consumers and for the use of sewers, and any other county taxes,
13	charges, or fees; provided that any county may enact ordinances
14	to regulate the exemptions authorized by this section.
15	(g) Any victim service provider contracted pursuant to
16	this section shall submit a financial report to the department
17	each year that the contract is in effect. The report shall
18	include recommendations about improving services for victims.
19	Failure to provide a financial report shall be grounds for
20	termination of the contract.



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1	(h)	This section shall not prohibit the department from
2	<u>establish</u>	ing additional programs for sex trafficking victims.
3	<u>(i)</u>	As used in this section:
4	"Sex	trafficking emergency shelter" means a facility that
5	provides	emergency services for sex trafficking victims,
6	including	but not limited to housing, rehabilitative, medical,
7	mental he	alth, therapeutic, legal, or diagnostic services.
8	"Vic	tim" means:
9	(1)	A person under the age of eighteen who engages in
10		prostitution pursuant to section 712-1200(1)(a);
11	(2)	A victim of sex trafficking pursuant to section 712-
12		1202;
13	(3)	A victim of promoting prostitution pursuant to section
14		712-1203;
15	(4)	A victim of a severe form of trafficking or a victim
16		of trafficking under title 22 United States Code
17		section 7102 et seq.; or
18	(5)	A victim of the crime of sex trafficking of children
19		under title 18 United States Code section 1591.
20	"Vic	tim service provider" means any nonprofit or
21	nongovern	mental organization that provides social services to



sex trafficking victims, including but not limited to housing, 1

rehabilitation, education, vocational, medical, mental health, 2

or substance abuse treatment programs." 3
