A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATEWIDE INTEROPERABLE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to formally
- 2 establish the statewide interoperable communications executive
- 3 committee and technical subcommittee, and the position of
- 4 statewide interoperability communications coordinator as a
- 5 position exempt from section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 6 SECTION 2. Chapter 128A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 8 to read as follows:
- 9 "PART . STATEWIDE PUBLIC SAFETY INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS
- 10 §128A- Statewide interoperable communications executive
- 11 committee. There is established within the department of
- 12 defense for administrative purposes the statewide interoperable
- 13 communications executive committee.
- 14 §128A- Duties of the statewide interoperable
- 15 communications executive committee. (a) The statewide

10		systems;
11	(3)	Develop plans and strategies to promote statewide
12		public safety communications interoperability using

16	(4)	Develop plans and strategies for the coordination of
17		state, county, and, where possible, federal emergency
18		alerts and warnings with public safety answering
19		points and public safety responder communications

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	(5)	Review and adopt plans and recommendations to improve
2		or promote increased interoperability between public
3		safety responders and other governmental or non-
4		governmental stakeholders that support responses to
5		emergencies.
6	(b)	The members of the statewide interoperable
7	communica	tions executive committee shall consist of the
8	following	:
9	(1)	The adjutant general or the adjutant general's
10		designee, who shall serve as the chair of the
11		committee;
12	(2)	The attorney general or the attorney general's
13		designee;
14	(3)	The deputy director of the law enforcement division of
15		the department of public safety or the deputy
16		director's designee;
17	(4)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
18		resources or the chairperson's designee;
19	(5)	The state chief information officer or the chief
20		information officer's designee;

1	(6)	The director of transportation or the director's
2		designee;
3	(7)	The director of health or the director's designee;
4	(8)	The chairperson of the enhanced 911 board or the
5		chairperson's designee; and
6	(9)	Four members at the executive or senior personnel
7		level from the first responder or emergency management
8		agencies from each of the four counties, to be
9		selected by the respective heads of the first
10	·	responder or emergency management agencies of each
11		county.
12	(c)	Members of the statewide interoperable communications
13	executive	committee shall receive no compensation but shall be
14	reimburse	d for travel and other reasonable and necessary
15	expenses	incurred in carrying out their duties relating to the

3	representatives from any governmental agency whose duties
4	include management, planning, and operation of public safety
5	communications systems and networks, including government land
6	mobile radio and broadband networks and networks related to
7	emergency communications centers and public answering points.
8	(c) The statewide interoperable communications coordinator
9	shall serve as the chairperson of the statewide interoperable
10	communications technical subcommittee.
11	(d) The respective lead radio communication engineer or
12	manager for the State and counties, or their designees, shall
13	serve on the statewide interoperable communications technical
14	subcommittee as subject matter experts for their respective
15	radio communication systems and networks.
16	(e) The respective lead information security manager for

14		sharing;
15	(4)	Coordinate governing body activities to maximize
16		integration and collaboration across the emergency
17		communications landscape;
18	(5)	Coordinate ongoing assessments of the applicability of
19		new technical developments in communications
20		technologies for state and county public safety radio

communication systems and networks;

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T	(6)	Serve as the single point of contact for the federal
2		government and industry on issues concerning statewide
3		interoperable communications;
4	(7)	Coordinate guidance, input, and recommendations from
5		state, county, and federal agencies on the statewide
6		communications interoperability plan and lead the
7		development, implementation, and regular updating of
8		the statewide communications interoperability plan;
9	(8)	Facilitate communications among responders during
10		emergencies when responding to planned and unplanned
11		events;
12	(9)	Coordinate closely with the state single point of
13		contact on issues related to the implementation of the
14		Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network in the
15		State;
16	(10)	Coordinate interoperability activities with public
17		safety answering points; operators of state, county
18		and federal communications systems; and emergency
19		management coordinators;
20	(11)	Manage communications unit program training and

exercises provided by federal and state agencies, and

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1		work with public safety agencies to assist with any
2		credentialing or recognition of their communications
3		personnel; and
4	(12)	Serve as the state representative to the National
5		Council of Statewide Interoperability Coordinators."
6	SECT	ION 3. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
8	"(b)	The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
9	comprise	all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
10	establish	ed and embrace all personal services performed for the
11	State, ex	cept the following:
12	(1)	Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii
13		National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii
14		National Guard that are required by state or federal
15		laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to
16		be filled from those commissioned or enlisted
17		personnel;
18	(2)	Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
19		the director of human resources development has
20		certified that the service is special or unique or is
21		essential to the public interest and that, because of

1		circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
2		to perform the service cannot be obtained through
3		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
4		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
5	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply

7		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
8		civil service procedures would result in delay or
9		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
10		decree;
11	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
12		or any committee thereof;
13	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
14		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
15		Washington Place;
16	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
17	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
18		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
19		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
20		confirmed by the senate;

(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries

(9) One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court who shall have the powers and duties of a court officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court, and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for the judicial council; one deputy administrative director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each associate justice of the supreme court and each judge of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for each judge of the circuit court, two additional law clerks for the civil administrative judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the

8	(16)	Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
9		each department head appointed under or in the manner
10		provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State
11		Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants
12		either in charge of the highways, harbors, and
13		airports divisions or other functions within the
14		department of transportation as may be assigned by the
15		director of transportation, with the approval of the
16		governor; four additional deputies in the department
17		of health, each in charge of one of the following:
18		behavioral health, environmental health, hospitals,
19		and health resources administration, including other
20		functions within the department as may be assigned by
21		the director of health, with the approval of the

1		governor; an administrative assistant to the state
2		librarian; and an administrative assistant to the
3		superintendent of education;
4	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
5		other law; provided that:
6		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
7		expire three years after its enactment unless
8		affirmatively extended by an act of the
9		legislature; and
10		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
11		shall be included in the position classification
12		plan;
13	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
14		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
15		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
16		shortage or in special projects;
17	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
18		president of the University of Hawaii;
19	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
20		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
21		distribution, collection, and counting of meal

1		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
2		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
3	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
4		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
5		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
6		workforce in any housing project maintained or
7		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
8		tenant hire program;
9	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
10		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
11		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
12		live in the areas they serve;
13	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
14		who are certified by the state vocational
15		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
16		safely the duties of the positions;
17	(24)	The sheriff;
18	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
19		judiciary;
20	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
21		education programs;

1	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
2		business, economic development, and tourism, all
3		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
4		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;

8		services, the division administrator, finance officer,

- 8 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 9 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 10 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
