A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREARMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that a "ghost gun" is a 2 firearm that is assembled without serial numbers or other 3 identification markings. A person may assemble a ghost gun from 4 a prepackaged kit requiring only minimal expertise and thus 5 bypass background checks, registration, and other legal 6 requirements. The legislature also finds that the State's lack 7 of laws addressing ghost guns allows persons who would normally 8 be prohibited from owning or possessing firearms under state law 9 to obtain firearms. The ease with which ghost guns may be 10 obtained defeats the intent of the State's otherwise strict 11 firearm permitting and registration laws. It is these laws that 12 have helped Hawaii to achieve the lowest gun violence death rate 13 in the nation. 14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to: Prohibit the purchase, manufacture, or obtaining of 15 (1)

3	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 134, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
4	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated					
5	and to read as follows:					
6	"§134- Manufacturing or purchasing firearm parts to					
7	assemble a firearm without a serial number; penalty. (a) A					
8	person wh	o is not licensed to manufacture a firearm under				
9	section 134-31, or who is not a dealer licensed by the United					
10	States Department of Justice, shall not, for the purpose of					
11	assembling a firearm, purchase, produce with a three-dimensional					
12	printer,	or otherwise obtain separately, or as part of a kit:				
13	(1)	A firearm receiver that is not imprinted with a serial				
14		number registered with a federally licensed				
15		manufacturer;				
16	(2)	A firearm receiver that has not been provided a serial				
17		number in accordance with section 134-3(c); or				
18	(3)	Any combination of parts from which a firearm without				
19		a serial number may be readily assembled and rendered				
20		functional.				
21	(b)	Violation of this section is a class C felony."				

- 1 SECTION 3. Section 134-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding three new definitions to be appropriately
- 3 inserted and to read as follows:
- 4 ""Assembly" means the fabrication of a firearm or the
- 5 fitting together of component parts to construct a firearm.
- 6 "Firearm receiver" means the part of a firearm that
- 7 provides housing for the firearm's internal components, such as
- 8 a hammer, bolt, breechblock, action, or firing mechanism. The
- 9 term includes any object or part that is not a firearm frame or
- 10 receiver in finished form, but that is designed or intended to
- 11 be used for that purpose, and may readily be made into a firearm
- 12 frame or receiver through milling or other means.
- "Ghost gun" means a firearm that is assembled without a
- 14 serial number or other identification marking."
- 15 SECTION 4. Section 134-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by amending subsections (a) through (d) to read as
- 17 follows:
- 18 "(a) Every resident or person arriving in the State who
- 19 brings or by any other manner causes to be brought into the
- 20 State a firearm of any description, whether usable or unusable,
- 21 serviceable or unserviceable, modern or antique, shall register



1	the	firearm	within	five	davs	after	arrival	Ωf	the	person	or	of
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- 2 the firearm, whichever arrives later, with the chief of police
- 3 of the county of the person's place of business or, if there is
- 4 no place of business, the person's residence or, if there is
- 5 neither a place of business nor residence, the person's place of
- 6 sojourn. A nonresident alien may bring firearms not otherwise
- 7 prohibited by law into the State for a continuous period not to
- 8 exceed ninety days; provided that the person meets the
- 9 registration requirement of this section and the person
- 10 possesses:
- 11 (1) A valid Hawaii hunting license procured under chapter 12 183D, part II, or a commercial or private shooting
- preserve permit issued pursuant to section 183D-34;
- 14 (2) A written document indicating the person has been
- invited to the State to shoot on private land; or
- 16 (3) Written notification from a firing range or target
- shooting business indicating that the person will
- actually engage in target shooting.
- 19 The nonresident alien shall be limited to a nontransferable
- 20 registration of not more than ten firearms for the purpose of
- 21 the above activities.

1 Every person registering a firearm under this subsection 2 shall be fingerprinted and photographed by the police department 3 of the county of registration; provided that this requirement shall be waived where fingerprints and photographs are already 4 5 on file with the police department. The police department shall 6 perform an inquiry on the person by using the International 7 Justice and Public Safety Network, including the United States 8 Immigration and Customs Enforcement query, the National Crime 9 Information Center, and the National Instant Criminal Background 10 Check System, pursuant to section 846-2.7 before any 11 determination to register a firearm is made. Any person 12 attempting to register a firearm, a firearm receiver, or the 13 parts used to assemble a firearm, and who is found to be 14 disqualified from ownership, possession, or control of firearms 15 or ammunition under section 134-7, shall surrender or dispose of 16 all firearms and ammunition pursuant to section 134-7.3. 17 (b) Every person who acquires a firearm pursuant to 18 section 134-2 shall register the firearm in the manner 19 prescribed by this section within five days of acquisition. 20 registration of all firearms shall be on forms prescribed by the 21 attorney general, which shall be uniform throughout the State,

- 1 and shall include the following information: name of the
- 2 manufacturer and importer; model; type of action; caliber or
- 3 gauge; serial number; and source from which receipt was
- 4 obtained, including the name and address of the prior
- 5 registrant. If the firearm has been assembled from separate
- 6 parts and an unfinished firearm receiver, the entity that
- 7 registered the firearm receiver shall be recorded in the space
- 8 provided for the name of the manufacturer and importer, and the
- 9 phrase "assembled from parts" shall be recorded in the space
- 10 provided for designating the model. If the firearm has been
- 11 assembled from parts produced using a three-dimensional printer,
- 12 the entity that registered the firearm receiver shall be
- 13 recorded in the space provided for designating the name of the
- 14 manufacturer and importer, and the phrase "3-D printer" shall be
- 15 recorded in the space provided for designating the model. If
- 16 the firearm has no serial number, the [permit] registration
- 17 number shall be entered in the space provided for the serial
- 18 number, and the [permit] registration number shall be engraved
- 19 upon the receiver portion of the firearm before registration.
- 20 On firearms assembled from parts produced using a three-
- 21 dimensional printer, the serial number shall be engraved on

- 1 stainless steel and permanently embedded to the firearm receiver
- 2 during fabrication or construction. All registration data that
- 3 would identify the individual registering the firearm by name or
- 4 address shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed to
- 5 anyone, except as may be required:
- 6 (1) For processing the registration;
- 7 (2) For database management by the Hawaii criminal justice
- 8 data center;
- 9 (3) By a law enforcement agency for the lawful performance
- of its duties; or
- 11 (4) By order of a court.
- 12 (c) Dealers licensed under section 134-31 or dealers
- 13 licensed by the United States Department of Justice shall
- 14 register firearms pursuant to this section on registration forms
- 15 prescribed by the attorney general and shall not be required to
- 16 have the firearms physically inspected by the chief of police at
- 17 the time of registration. An authorized dealer, as provided in
- 18 section 134-31, or a dealer licensed by the United States
- 19 Department of Justice, who brings, assembles, or causes to be
- 20 brought into the State by any other means, separate parts and an
- 21 unfinished firearm receiver that when assembled create a

1	iirearm,	or parts produced by a three-dimensional printer that					
2	when assembled create a firearm, shall register the unfinished						
3	firearm receiver and receive a serial number before the assembly						
4	of the firearm or the sale or transfer of unassembled firearm						
5	parts or a receiver to a third party, in accordance with section						
6	134-3(b). Any sale or transfer of unfinished firearm receivers						
7	by an authorized dealer to a third party shall be conducted as						
8	if they were fully assembled firearms having serial numbers						
9	engraved	on the firearm receivers and in accordance with the					
10	firearms permitting process in section 134-2. All other						
11	firearms and firearm receivers registered under this section						
12	shall be physically inspected at the time of registration by the						
13	respectiv	e county chief of police or the chief's representative.					
14	(d)	Registration shall not be required for:					
15	(1)	Any device that is designed to fire loose black powder					
16		or that is a firearm manufactured before 1899;					
17	(2)	Any device not designed to fire or made incapable of					
18		being readily restored to a firing condition; or					
19	(3)	All unserviceable firearms and destructive devices					
20		registered with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, [and]					
21		Firearms, and Explosives of the United States					

1	Department of Justice pursuant to Title 27, Code of
2	Federal Regulations."
3	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
4	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
