A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is vulnerable 2 to catastrophic natural disasters such as earthquakes, tsunami, 3 floods, volcanic eruptions, and high winds that can devastate 4 communities. The legislature also finds that there is a need 5 for all sectors of communities throughout the State to prepare 6 for and perform relief activities after disasters. As community 7 members are often the first at the scene of a disaster, the 8 incorporation of multisector preparation programs and community 9 groups into disaster preparedness plans increases the scope and 10 efficacy of disaster relief activities, manages the risks 11 associated with disasters, and mitigates the hardship of these 12 crises.

13 The purpose of this Act is to improve the State's
14 preparedness for and response to communities affected by
15 disasters.

16 SECTION 2. Section 107-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17 amended to read as follows:

(d) All public buildings constructed after January 2021 1 2 shall be designed to withstand category four and higher 3 hurricanes and to be used as shelters in the event of an 4 emergency." 5 SECTION 3. Section 127A-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 6 7 "[4] §127A-3 [] Hawaii emergency management agency. (a) 8 There is established within the department of defense the Hawaii 9 emergency management agency. The adjutant general shall serve 10 as the director of Hawaii emergency management and, subject to 11 the direction and control of the governor, shall oversee the 12 agency. 13 (b) There shall be an administrator of emergency 14 management who shall be appointed, and may be removed, by the 15 director, and who shall have at least three years of experience 16 leading emergency management efforts at the local, state, or 17 federal level. The administrator of emergency management shall 18 be the civilian head of and responsible for the day-to-day 19 operations of the agency. The administrator of emergency 20 management shall report to the director. The administrator of

emergency management shall, in the absence of the director, have
 all the duties and responsibilities of the director, and shall
 report directly to the governor. The administrator of emergency
 management shall not be subject to chapter 76.

5 (c) The administrator may, from funds allotted therefor,
6 employ technical, clerical, administrative, and other personnel
7 and make such expenditures as may be necessary.

The administrator shall coordinate the activities of 8 (d) 9 the agency with all county emergency management agencies, other 10 state agencies, other states, or federal agencies involved in emergency management activities, and all organizations for 11 12 emergency management within the State, whether public or 13 private, and shall maintain liaison and cooperate with all 14 county emergency management agencies, other state agencies, 15 other states, or federal agencies involved in emergency 16 management activities as provided in this chapter.

17 In addition:

18 (1) The department of health shall establish a statewide 19 inventory of:

The plan shall contain provisions 1 2 to ensure that the State is prepared for emergencies and minor, major, and catastrophic disasters. 3 In preparing and maintaining the plan, the agency shall 4 5 work closely with agencies and organizations with emergency management responsibilities; 6 7 Assign lead and support responsibilities to state (2)8 agencies and personnel for emergency functions and 9 other support activities; 10 Adopt standards and requirements for county emergency (3) 11 management plans. The standards and requirements 12 shall ensure that county plans are coordinated and 13 consistent with the state comprehensive emergency 14 management plan; (4) Make recommendations to the legislature, building code 15 organizations, and counties for zoning, building, and 16 17 other land use controls; and other preparedness, prevention, and mitigation measures designed to 18 19 eliminate emergencies or reduce their impact;

1 (5) Anticipate trends and promote innovations that will 2 enhance the emergency management system; 3 (6) Institute statewide public awareness programs. This 4 shall include intensive public educational campaigns 5 on emergency preparedness issues, including but not 6 limited to the personal responsibility of individual 7 citizens to be self-sufficient for up to fourteen days 8 following a natural or human-caused disaster; 9 Coordinate federal, state, and local emergency (7) 10 management activities and take all other steps, 11 including the partial or full mobilization of 12 emergency management forces and organizations in 13 advance of an actual emergency, to ensure the 14 availability of adequately trained and equipped forces 15 of emergency management personnel before, during, and 16 after emergencies and disasters; 17 (8) Implement training programs to improve the ability of 18 state and local emergency management personnel to 19 prepare and implement emergency management plans and 20 programs. This shall include a continuous training

program for agencies and individuals that will be 1 2 called on to perform key roles in state and local 3 post-disaster response and recovery efforts and for 4 local government personnel on federal and state post-5 disaster response and recovery strategies and 6 procedures; 7 (9) Adopt standards and requirements for state agency 8 emergency operating procedures and periodically review 9 emergency operating procedures of state agencies and 10 recommend revisions as needed to ensure consistency 11 with the state comprehensive emergency management plan 12 and program; and (10) Coordinate, in advance whenever possible, such 13 14 executive orders, proclamations, and rules for 15 issuance by the governor as are necessary or 16 appropriate for coping with emergencies and disasters. 17 (f) The agency shall establish a statewide inventory of twenty-four satellite phones for state and county agencies to 18 use during and after disasters." 19

1 SECTION 4. Section 127A-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (f) to read as follows: 3 "(f) For purposes of this section, "shelter" includes any 4 structure, excavation, or other facility or item used or useful 5 for the protection of persons [-,] and any public building 6 constructed after January 2021 that meets the requirements of 7 section 107-27(d)." 8 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for: 11 The hiring of four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE) (1)12 logistic planners and one full-time equivalent (1.0 13 FTE) grants manager, with employee competencies in 14 emergency response planning and allocation of 15 resources; and 16 (2) The Hawaii emergency management agency to review 17 shortages related to non-perishable food, water, 18 medicines, and other essential items in emergency 19 response planning and allocation of resources where

need is greatest or not sufficiently provided by the 1 2 Federal Emergency Management Agency. 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii 4 emergency management agency for the purposes of this Act. 5 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for 8 the department of agriculture to: 9 Procure and store enough non-perishable food to (1) 10 provide assistance for fourteen days to at least one 11 million individuals affected by natural disasters; and 12 (2) Ensure that food stocks are appropriately rotated to 13 preserve usable resources and dispose of surplus or 14 rotated food stocks by donation to the respective food 15 banks in each county, when appropriate. 16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 17 agriculture for the purposes of this Act. 18 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
