#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII HEALTH AUTHORITY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. (a) The legislature finds that the human-
- 2 induced global climate crisis requires thoughtful but bold
- 3 response on many fronts to make Hawaii communities resilient to
- 4 the impacts of climate change that threaten the very
- 5 survivability of the State. Lest Hawaii lose its leadership
- 6 position in meeting the future of labor, justice and equity, the
- 7 legislature embraces aloha 'āina as a Green New Deal to
- 8 decarbonize Hawaii's systems of food, energy, and transportation
- 9 and sequester carbon through systems of agriculture, waste
- 10 management and ecosystem restoration. This solid foundation
- 11 finds synergies with expanded access to health care, housing and
- 12 education, multiplying good jobs and ensuring justice and equity
- 13 for Hawaii's citizens. The following measure represents a
- 14 forward step in mitigating and adapting Hawaii to inevitable
- 15 change.
- 16 (b) The legislature further finds that the Hawaii health
- 17 authority was established in 2009 as an autonomous body



1	responsible for the overall health planning for the State and
2	for advising the State on the future capacity needs of the
3	people of Hawaii for health providers, facilities, equipment,
4	and support service providers. However, the legislature finds
5	that the authority has been deprived of resources since late
6	2014 and needs to be reinvigorated and provided with necessary
7	funding to carry out its duties and responsibilities. This
8	includes developing a comprehensive plan for all individuals in
9	Hawaii.
10	In developing a comprehensive health plan, the legislature
11	asks the Hawaii health authority to consider including in the
12	comprehensive health plan the use of the all-payer healthcare
13	model as adopted in the State of Maryland for hospitals. An
14	all-payer health care model:
15	(1) Requires the same price for the same service
16	regardless of the source of funding for a given
17	patient, thereby achieving substantial administrative
18	savings and eliminating a major cause of
19	discrimination against sicker, poorer patients,

including those covered by medicaid;

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1	(2)	Establishes a standardized, simplified fee schedule
2		for independent professionals that is negotiated
3		between the State and associations representing health
4		professionals, and applies to all payers doing
5		business in the State of Hawaii;

- 6 (3) Pools hospital funding from all payers so as to pay 7 hospitals with global operating budgets, instead of 8 fee-for-service, eliminating most billing and collection costs, cost-shifting due to losses from 9 10 uncompensated and under-compensated care, and substantially reducing other hospital administrative 11 12 Incentives for hospitals shall also be 13 eliminated, allowing for resources to be focused on 14 services that are profitable under fee-for-service, at 15 the expense of needed services that are generally not 16 profitable under fee-for-service, including emergency 17 services, psychiatric services, and geriatric care; 18 and
  - (4) Outlines actions needed for acquiring medicare and medicaid waivers from the federal government to implement an all-payer health payment system.

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1	(c)	The legislature further finds that the unfunded
2	liabiliti	es of the Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust
3	fund must	be addressed to avoid potentially millions of dollars
4	in unfund	ed liabilities in later years and can be done so in the
5	comprehen	sive health plan. A plan and structure that best
6	address t	he liabilities that are currently unfunded have the
7	following	features:
8	(1)	Provide health benefits to state and county employees
9		and retirees using a self-funding model in which the
10		state retains insurance risk, eliminating the need to
11		pre-fund health benefits as required when contracting
12		health benefits through fully insured health plans;
13	(2)	Cap public employer prefunding through the Hawaii
14		employer-union health benefits trust fund and other
15		post-employment benefits trust fund once the separate
16		accounts for each public-employer have a combined
17		balance of at least \$2,000,000,000;
18	(3)	Thereafter, transfer any investment income and
19		interest from the Hawaii employer-union health
20		benefits trust fund and other post-employment benefits

trust fund to a newly established rate stabilization

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1		reserve fund, which will provide reserve funding to
2		stabilize the Hawaii employer-union health benefits
3		trust fund when the trust fund has insufficient moneys
4		to cover the costs of providing health and other
5		benefits plans for active employees and retirees and
6	•	their beneficiaries; and
7	(4)	Continue to provide for the use of a portion of
8		transient accommodations tax revenues to supplement
9		deficient county public employer contribution amounts
10		if necessary.
11	(d)	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to enable the
12	Hawaii he	alth authority to fulfill its duties and
13	responsib	ilities, which include developing a comprehensive
14	health pl	an for all individuals in Hawaii, by:
15	(1)	Directing the Hawaii health authority to submit a
16		comprehensive health plan that includes an all-payer
17		model and a funding source for the unfunded
18		liabilities of the Hawaii employer-union health
19		benefits trust fund; and

1	(2) Appropriating funds to the Hawaii health authority for
2	the hiring of an executive director and other staff
3	and expenses necessary for the authority.
4	SECTION 2. Section 322H-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended to read as follows:
6	"[+]§322H-1[+] Hawaii health authority; establishment.
7	(a) There is established within the department of budget and
8	finance for administrative purposes the Hawaii health authority.
9	The authority shall be an autonomous public body corporate and
10	politic and an instrumentality of the State.
11	(b) The authority shall be composed of nine members
12	appointed by the governor as provided in section 26-34; provided
13	that three members shall be appointed from a list of nominees
14	submitted by the speaker of the house of representatives and
15	three members shall be appointed from a list of nominees
16	submitted by the president of the senate[. All]; provided
17	further that beginning July 1, 2020, the governor shall provide
18	for staggered terms. Thereafter, all members shall be appointed
19	for terms of four years each. The majority of the members shall
20	be health care professionals with direct patient care
21	experience. All members must share a commitment to the goal of

- 1 an integrated universal health care system covering all
- 2 residents of Hawaii, and the members shall be representative of
- 3 the diversity of the citizens of the State.
- 4 (c) [One member shall be selected to be the executive
- 5 director and confirmed by a majority vote of a quorum of the
- 6 members of the Hawaii health authority.] The authority shall
- 7 hire an executive director who shall be exempt from chapter 76
- 8 and such other staff as necessary to assist in the performance
- 9 of the authority's duties and responsibilities. The staff of
- 10 the authority shall be hired without regard to chapter 76;
- 11 provided that the executive director and staff shall be eligible
- 12 to participate in state employee benefit plans.
- (d) Each member shall hold office until the member's
- 14 successor is appointed and qualified.
- (e) Five members shall constitute a quorum, whose
- 16 affirmative vote shall be necessary for all valid actions by the
- 17 authority.
- 18 (f) The authority may incur expenses as it finds necessary
- 19 to perform its duties and responsibilities. The authority shall
- 20 submit an annual report accounting for its spending to the

1 director of finance and to the legislature no later than twenty 2 days prior to the convening of each regular session." 3 SECTION 3. Section 322H-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by amending subsection (e) to read as follows: 5 "(e) The authority shall submit [a comprehensive health 6 plan for all individuals in the State, including its findings 7 and recommendations, to the legislature no later than twenty 8 days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2012.] an 9 updated comprehensive plan using an all-payer healthcare model 10 and resolving unfunded liabilities of the Hawaii employer-union 11 health benefits trust fund to the legislature no later than 12 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 13 2021. The authority shall additionally survey matters relating 14 to healthcare in the State of Hawaii, including findings and 15 recommendations regarding such matters, and shall submit annual 16 reports to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to 17 the convening of each regular session." 18 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$250,000 or so much 20 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to the 21 Hawaii health authority for the hiring of an executive director

- 1 and other staff expenses necessary to carry out its duties and
- 2 responsibilities.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii health
- 4 authority for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

#### Report Title:

Hawaii Health Authority; Comprehensive Health Plan; Unfunded Liabilities; Appropriation

#### Description:

Directs HHA to submit to the legislature a comprehensive health plan that includes an all-payer model and a funding source for the unfunded liabilities of the employer-union health benefits trust fund. Amends the requirements for appointment to HHA. Appropriates funds to HHA for the hiring of an executive director and other staff and expenses necessary for the authority.

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
