A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1

PART I

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that properly licensed 3 school psychologists provide effective services to help children and youth succeed academically, socially, behaviorally, and 4 5 emotionally by providing direct educational and mental health services for children and youth. Additionally, they work with 6 parents, educators, and other professionals to create supportive 7 learning and social environments for all children. School 8 psychologists have a particularly critical role in supporting 9 10 the most vulnerable children, including those struggling with issues like gender identity or sexual orientation, integrating 11 from another place of origin, autism, or fetal alcohol spectrum 12 13 disorders.

14 Currently, Hawaii is the only state without certification 15 or licensure for school psychologists. In fiscal year 2018, the 16 department of education employed forty-six school psychologists. 17 Without requiring licensure, the State cannot ensure that its



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1 school psychologists are uniformly qualified to deliver the 2 appropriate standard of services. Significantly, the State's 3 failure to require licensure of its school psychologists means 4 that, by law, the State is unable to seek warranted 5 reimbursements from the federal medicaid program for the 6 services provided by school psychologists in an educational 7 setting.

8 The legislature finds that accredited school psychologists 9 should be licensed by and registered with the board of 10 psychology to ensure delivery of quality service to students and 11 the community. The legislature additionally finds that school 12 psychologists and the practice of school psychology should be subject to regulation and control to protect the public from the 13 unqualified practice of school psychology and from 14 15 unprofessional conduct by persons licensed to practice school 16 psychology.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to have the board of psychology license school psychologists and to establish the recommended criteria for the licensure of school psychologists, including graduate coursework, practica, and internship requirements based in part on the National Association of School



Psychologists' Standards for the Credentialing of School
 Psychologists.

3 SECTION 2. Chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
5 to read as follows:

6 "PART . SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS 7 §465-A Findings and declaration of necessity. It is the intent of the legislature to establish standards for the 8 9 licensing of school psychologists to address the present and critical need to ensure that individuals requiring the services 10 of a licensed school psychologist receive appropriate services 11 12 by highly qualified and licensed professionals. The special 13 state interest in creating this part is recognized, notwithstanding the requirements of section 26H-6. 14

15 §465-B Definitions. As used in this part:

16 "Practice of school psychology" means the application of 17 principles, methods, and procedures of measurement, prediction, 18 evaluation, testing, counseling, consultation, and instruction 19 related to and consistent with the national standards 20 articulated by the most current Model for Comprehensive and 21 Integrated School Psychological Services as published by the



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National Association of School Psychologists or its successor
 organization in a school setting. "Practice of school
 psychology" does not include private practice.

"School psychologist" means a person licensed by the board 4 who engages in the practice of school psychology consistent with 5 the national standards articulated by the most current Model for 6 Comprehensive and Integrated School Psychological Services as 7 8 published by the National Association of School Psychologists or its successor organization. "School psychologist" includes a 9 10 school psychologist-specialist and a school psychologist-11 doctoral.

12 §465-C School psychologists; regulation; qualifications.
13 (a) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, school
14 psychologists in the State shall be licensed by the board and
15 regulated pursuant to this part. School psychologists shall be
16 licensed as a school psychologist-specialist or a school
17 psychologist-doctoral.

18 (b) Every applicant for a license as a school
19 psychologist-specialist shall submit evidence satisfactory to
20 the board that the applicant for licensure has:



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1	(1)	Earned a graduate-level degree from an organized
2		program of study in school psychology within an
3		institution of higher education comprising a minimum
4		of sixty graduate semester hours or the equivalent
5		number of graduate quarter hours, with at least fifty-
6		four hours exclusive of credit for the supervised
7		specialist-level internship experience;
8	(2)	Completed one thousand two hundred hours of a
9		supervised internship in school psychology with no
10		less than six hundred hours of the internship
11		completed within a school setting; and
12	(3)	Either:
13		(A) Passed the Praxis School Psychologist examination
14		with a minimum score of one hundred forty-seven
15		or the most current standard of the National
16		Association of School Psychologists; or
17		(B) Possesses a current, unencumbered certification
18		as a nationally certified school psychologist or
19		a valid license or credential in school
20		psychology in another state or United States
21		territory prior to July 1, 2019; provided that



1		for a person employed as a school psychologist in
2		Hawaii as of July 1, 2019, an out of state
3		license or credential that has been expired for
4		no more than ten years from July 1, 2019, shall
5		be accepted.
6	(c)	Every applicant for a license as a school
7	psycholog	ist-doctoral shall submit evidence satisfactory to the
8	board tha	t the applicant for licensure has:
9	(1)	Earned a doctoral-level degree from an organized
10		program of study in school psychology within an
11		institution of higher education comprising a minimum
12		of ninety graduate semester hours or the equivalent
13		number of graduate quarter hours, with at least
14		seventy-eight hours exclusive of credit for the
15		supervised doctoral-level internship experience and
16		any terminal doctoral project like a dissertation;
17	(2)	Completed one thousand five hundred hours of a
18		supervised internship in school psychology with no
19		less than six hundred hours of the internship
20		completed within a school setting; and

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1 (3) Either:

2 Passed the Praxis School Psychologist examination (A) with a minimum score of one hundred forty-seven 3 or the most current standard of the National 4 5 Association of School Psychologists; or Possesses a current, unencumbered certification 6 (B) 7 as a nationally certified school psychologist or 8 a valid license or credential in school 9 psychology in another state or United States territory prior to July 1, 2019; provided that 10 11 for a person employed as a school psychologist in 12 Hawaii as of July 1, 2019, an out of state license or credential that has been expired for 13 no more than ten years from July 1, 2019, shall 14 15 be accepted.

(d) Before any applicant shall be eligible for licensure
under this part, the applicant shall file an application in a
form prescribed by the board and pay an application fee and all
other applicable fees.

20 §465-D Fees; disposition. Upon application for a new
21 license and at each renewal, each applicant shall pay a license



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fee of \$ and a compliance resolution fund fee of
 \$. Application fees paid pursuant to this part shall
 not be refundable. Fees collected pursuant to this section
 shall be deposited into the compliance resolution fund
 established pursuant to section 26-9(0).

6 §465-E Renewals; continuing education. (a) Every license 7 issued pursuant to this part shall be renewed biennially on or 8 before June 30 of each even-numbered year. Every licensee shall 9 pay a nonrefundable renewal fee and comply with the continuing 10 education requirements provided in rules that shall be adopted 11 by the board pursuant to chapter 91.

12 (b) A school psychologist shall meet the continuing 13 education requirements by obtaining credit hours accredited 14 Association as provided in the board's rules. by the То 15 determine compliance, the board may conduct a random audit of 16 licensees. A licensee selected for audit shall be notified by 17 the board. Within sixty days of notification, the school 18 psychologist shall provide to the board documentation to verify 19 compliance with the continuing education requirements.

20 (c) Failure to renew, pay the renewal fee, and in the21 cause of audited school psychologists, provide documentation of



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compliance, shall constitute a forfeiture of license. A school
 psychologist whose license has been suspended pursuant to this
 section may reinstate the license by submitting to the board a
 written application, a nonrefundable restoration fee payment,
 and in the case of audited school psychologists, documentation
 of compliance.

§465-F Description of services. (a) A person practices 7 8 as a school psychologist if the person provides services to children and students from birth through college who are 9 eligible to be enrolled in educational and intermediate 10 educational units, special education programs, universities and 11 12 colleges, early intervention programs, developmental centers, and approved private schools. School psychologists shall be 13 14 limited to practicing within these settings, and licensure as a 15 school psychologist shall not allow for private practice.

(b) Services provided by a school psychologist licensed pursuant to this part shall conform to standards articulated in the National Association for School Psychologists' Model for Comprehensive and Integrated School Psychological Services, as may be amended.



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§465-G Practice of school psychology; license required. 1 Beginning on July 1, 2021, no person in the State shall 2 (a) engage in the practice of school psychology or represent, 3 announce, or advertise oneself, publicly or privately, as a 4 "licensed school psychologist" or "school psychologist" or affix 5 any other words, letters, abbreviations, or insignia to the 6 7 person's name indicating or implying that the person is engaged in the practice of school psychology, without having first 8 9 obtained a license as provided in this part.

(b) A person who is a student in an accredited school
psychology program may use the title of "school psychology
intern" or "school psychology practicum student" to indicate the
person's training status; provided that the person shall not
identify as a "licensed school psychologist" or "school
psychologist" or imply that the person is licensed to practice
school psychology.

17 (c) Any person who violates this section shall be subject
18 to a fine of up to \$1,000 for each separate offense. Each day
19 of each violation shall constitute a separate offense.

20 §465-H Advising the board of psychology. The board shall
21 receive advice and review proposals from the Hawaii Association



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1 of School Psychologists regarding issues relating to school 2 psychologists and the practice of school psychology. §465-I Grounds for refusal to renew, reinstate, or restore 3 4 a license and for denial, revocation, suspension, or condition of licenses. (a) In addition to other acts or conditions 5 authorized by law, the board shall refuse to renew, reinstate, 6 7 or restore and shall deny, revoke, suspend, or condition in any manner any school psychologist license for any cause authorized 8 9 by law including but not limited to the following: 10 (1) Failure to meet or maintain the conditions and 11 requirements necessary to qualify for the granting of 12 a license;

13 (2) Engaging in false, fraudulent, or deceptive
14 advertising, or making untruthful or improbable
15 statements that are substantially related to the
16 qualifications, functions, or duties of a school
17 psychologist;

18 (3) Engaging in the practice of school psychology while
19 impaired by alcohol, drugs, physical disability, or
20 mental instability;



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1	(4)	Procuring a license for the practice of school
2		psychology through fraud, misrepresentation, or
3		deceit;
4	(5)	Aiding and abetting an unlicensed person to directly
5		or indirectly perform activities requiring a license
6		for the practice of school psychology;
7	(6)	Engaging in professional misconduct, incompetence,
8		gross negligence, or manifest incapacity in the
9		practice of school psychology;
10	(7)	Engaging in conduct or practice contrary to recognized
11		standards of ethics for the practice of school
12		psychology;
13	(8)	Violating any condition or limitation imposed on a
14		license for the practice of school psychology by the
15		board;
16	(9)	Engaging in the practice of school psychology in a
17		manner that causes injury to one or more members of
18		the public;
19	(10)	Failure to comply, observe, or adhere to any law in a
20		manner such that the board deems the applicant or

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holder to be an unfit or improper person to hold a 1 2 license; Revocation, suspension, or other disciplinary action 3 (11)4 by another state or federal agency against a licensee or applicant for any reason provided by the licensing • 5 laws or this section; 6 Criminal conviction, whether by nolo contendere or 7 (12)8 otherwise, of a penal crime directly related to the 9 qualifications, functions, or duties of a school 10 psychologist, notwithstanding any statutory provision 11 to the contrary; 12 Failure to report to the board, in writing, any (13)13 disciplinary decision issued against the licensee or 14 the applicant in another jurisdiction within thirty 15 days after the disciplinary decision is issued; 16 (14)Employing, utilizing, or attempting to employ or 17 utilize at any time any person not licensed under this 18 part where licensure is required; or Violating this part, chapter 436B, or any rule or 19 (15) order of the board. 20



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(b) The board at its discretion shall order any licensee
 who is placed on probation or whose license is suspended
 pursuant to this section to obtain additional training and to
 take an examination as prescribed by the board.

§465-J Exemption. This chapter shall not restrict the 5 practice of other licensed or credentialed practitioners 6 practicing within their own recognized scopes of practice in 7 educational settings. This chapter shall not apply to any 8 person working within the scope of practice or duties of another 9 10 licensed profession that overlaps with the practice of school psychology, provided that the person does not use the title 11 12 "school psychologist" or "licensed school psychologist"." SECTION 3. Chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13

14 amended by designating sections 465-1 to 465-15 as part I and 15 inserting a title before section 465-1 to read as follows:

"PART I. GENERAL PROVISIONS"

SECTION 4. Section 465-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, isamended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

19 "(a) This chapter shall not apply to:

20 (1) Any person teaching, lecturing, consulting, or
21 engaging in research in psychology insofar as the



1 activities are performed as part of or are dependent 2 upon employment in a college or university; provided 3 that the person shall not engage in the practice of 4 psychology outside the responsibilities of the 5 person's employment;

- Any person who performs any, or any combination of the 6 (2)professional services defined as the practice of 7 8 psychology under the direction of a licensed psychologist in accordance with rules adopted by the 9 board; provided that the person may use the term 10 "psychological assistant", but shall not identify the 11 12 person's self as a psychologist or imply that the person is licensed to practice psychology; 13
- 14 (3) Any person employed by a local, state, or federal
 15 government agency in a [school psychologist or]
 16 psychological examiner position[7] or a position that
 17 does not involve diagnostic or treatment services, but
 18 only at those times when that person is carrying out
 19 the functions of such government employment;
- 20 (4) Any person who is a student of psychology, a
 21 psychological intern, or a resident in psychology



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preparing for the profession of psychology under 1 supervision in a training institution or facility and 2 who is designated by a title as "psychology trainee", 3 "psychology student", "psychology intern", or 4 "psychology resident", that indicates the person's 5 training status; provided that the person shall not 6 7 identify the person's self as a psychologist or imply that the person is licensed to practice psychology; 8 9 Any person who is a member of another profession (5) licensed under the laws of this jurisdiction to render 10 11 or advertise services, including psychotherapy, within the scope of practice as defined in the statutes or 12 13 rules regulating the person's professional practice; provided that, notwithstanding section 465-1, the 14 person does not represent the person's self to be a 15 16 psychologist or does not represent that the person is 17 licensed to practice psychology; (6) Any person who is a member of a mental health 18 19 profession not requiring licensure; provided that the

3	(7)	Any person who is a duly recognized member of the
4		clergy; provided that the person functions only within

9	(8)	Any psychologist employed by the United States
10		Department of Defense, while engaged in the discharge
11		of the psychologist's official duty and providing
12		direct telehealth support or services, as defined in
13		section 431:10A-116.3, to neighbor island
14		beneficiaries within a Hawaii National Guard armory on
15		the island of Kauai, Hawaii, Molokai, or Maui;
16		provided that the psychologist employed by the United
17		States Department of Defense is credentialed by
18		Tripler Army Medical Center; or
19	(9)	Any supervisee of a licensed psychologist as defined
20		in section 465D-7."



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SECTION 5. Section 465-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended to read as follows:

"§465-4 Board of psychology; appointment, qualifications, 3 4 term, expenses. There is created a board of psychology 5 consisting of [seven] nine members. There shall be five members 6 representing varied specialties of the profession, each of whom shall be licensed to practice psychology under this chapter and 7 8 have a minimum of five years of post-doctoral professional 9 experience, two members who are licensed to practice school 10 psychology under this chapter, and two lay members from the community at large. A lay member shall not be a psychologist, 11 an applicant, or former applicant for licensure as a 12 13 psychologist."

14 SECTION 6. Section 465-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

16 "(a) Every license issued [under] pursuant to this
17 [chapter] part shall be renewed biennially on or before June 30
18 of each even-numbered year. Failure to renew a license shall
19 result in forfeiture of the license; provided that a
20 psychologist whose license has been forfeited for one year or
21 less for failure to renew may restore the license by payment of



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the renewal fee and, in the case of a psychologist who is 1 2 audited, pursuant to subsection (g), submission of documentation 3 of continuing education compliance, for the biennium in which the failure occurred. If licensing has lapsed for more than one 4 year, the person may reapply for a license in the manner 5 prescribed in this chapter." 6 7 PART II 8 SECTION 7. Section 26H-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended to read as follows: 10 "§26H-4 Repeal dates for newly enacted professional and 11 vocational regulatory programs. (a) Any professional or 12 vocational regulatory program enacted after January 1, 1994, and listed in this section shall be repealed as specified in this 13 section. The auditor shall perform an evaluation of the 14 program, pursuant to section 26H-5, prior to its repeal date. 15 16 (b) Chapter 465D (behavior analysts) shall be repealed on 17 June 30, 2021. (c) Chapter 466L (appraisal management companies) shall be 18 19 repealed on June 30, 2023. 20 (d) Chapter 457J (midwives) shall be repealed on 21 June 30, 2025.



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1	(e) Part of chapter 465 (school psychologists) shall
2	be repealed on June 30, 2025."
3	PART III
4	SECTION 8. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
5	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
6	begun before its effective date.
7	SECTION 9. In codifying the new sections added by
8	section 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
9	appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
10	the new sections in this Act.
11	SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020;
14	provided that:
15	(1) The amendments made to sections 465-3, 465-4, and
16	465-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by this Act shall be
17	repealed on June 30, 2025, and those sections shall be
18	reenacted in the form in which they read on the day
19	prior to the effective date of this Act; and

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
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(2) The amendments to titles within chapter 465, Hawaii
