A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOURISM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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PART I

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that tourism is the largest private sector industry in the State and that Hawaii is known globally for stunning natural beauty, unique culture, and the spirit of aloha. A successful tourism industry in Hawaii depends on the health of natural and cultural resources, communities, economy, and relationships with visitors.

8 The legislature further finds that the tourism industry has 9 a prominent role to play in protecting the State's natural 10 resources, perpetuating Hawaii's history, and preserving a high 11 quality of life for Hawaii's residents, by switching the focus 12 of the State's tourism industry from marketing Hawaii to helping 13 to manage Hawaii's resources. The legislature additionally finds that requiring sustainable practices and professional tour 14 15 quide certification from persons in the tourism industry will 16 advance this goal, in addition to enhancing visitor experiences 17 and protecting Hawaii's brand.



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1 The purpose of this Act is to: 2 Beginning July 1, 2022, require applicants for new or (1)3 renewal commercial use permits in state parks, small 4 boat harbors, and ocean recreation management areas; 5 instructor/operator permits; and common carrier 6 certificates and contract carrier permits covering the 7 transportation of passengers to hold and annually 8 maintain a sustainable tourism certificate from the 9 Hawaii Ecotourism Association, achieve and maintain 10 green business recognition by the Hawaii green 11 business program, and ensure that at least one-third of staff members employed by the applicant who have 12 13 direct contact with visitors are certified as 14 professional tour guides by the University of Hawaii; 15 (2)Require the University of Hawaii to update the 16 certification for professional tour guides curriculum 17 and examination, subject to approval by the aha moku advisory committee, by June 30, 2020, and every ten 18 19 years thereafter; and

20 (3) Require recertification and renewal of certification
21 for professional tour guides every two years.

20	ection shall be subject to a hearing in accordance with chapter

7	requirements. (a) Beginning July 1, 2022, no person may use a
8	trail for commercial purposes unless:
9	(1) The person holds a sustainable tourism certificate
10	issued by the Hawaii Ecotourism Association and
11	maintains certification annually;
12	(2) The person achieves and maintains green business
13	recognition by the Hawaii green business program; and
14	(3) At least one-third of staff employed by the person
15	whose duties include direct contact with visitors to
16	the State are certified as professional tour guides as
17	provided in section 304A
18	(b) For the purposes of this section, "person" shall have
19	the same meaning as in section 1-19."

9	amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
10	"(c) Subject to section 271-15, a certificate shall be
11	issued to any qualified applicant therefor, authorizing the
12	whole or any part of the operations covered by the application
13	if it is found that the applicant is fit, willing, and able
14	properly to perform the service proposed and to conform to this
15	chapter and the requirements, rules, and regulations of the
16	commission thereunder, and that the proposed service, to the
17	extent to be authorized by the certificate, is or will be
18	required by the present or future public convenience and
19	necessity; otherwise the application shall be denied. <u>Beginning</u>
20	July 1, 2022, the commission shall not issue a certificate

20	that the	applicant is fit, willing, and able properly to perform
21	the servi	ce of a contract carrier by motor vehicle, and to



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1	conform to this chapter and the lawful requirements, rules, and
2	regulations of the commission thereunder, and that the proposed
3	operation to the extent authorized by the permit will be
4	consistent with the public interest and the transportation
5	policy declared in this chapter; otherwise, the application
6	shall be denied. Beginning July 1, 2022, the commission shall
7	not issue a permit covering the transportation of passengers to
8	an applicant unless:
9	(1) The applicant holds a sustainable tourism certificate
10	issued by the Hawaii Ecotourism Association and
11	maintains certification annually;
12	(2) The applicant achieves and maintains green business
13	recognition by the Hawaii green business program; and
14	(3) At least one-third of staff employed by the applicant
15	whose duties include direct contact with visitors to
16	the State are certified as professional tour guides as

18	Beginning July 1, 2022, the commission shall revoke a permit
19	pursuant to section 271-19 if the holder fails to maintain the
20	requirements of paragraphs (1) through (3). In determining
21	whether issuance of a permit will be consistent with the public



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1 interest and the transportation policy, the commission shall 2 consider the number of shippers to be served by the applicant, 3 the nature of the service proposed, whether the proposed service 4 can be or is being properly performed by existing common 5 carriers, the effect which granting the permit would have upon 6 the services of the protesting carriers, the effect which 7 denying the permit would have upon the applicant's proposed 8 shipper or shippers, and the changing character of shipper 9 requirements; provided, however, that a permit shall not be 10 issued in any case where it has been established that an 11 existing common carrier is properly performing, the proposed 12 service. The commission shall specify in the permit the 13 business of the contract carrier covered thereby and the scope 14 thereof, and it shall attach to it at the time of issuance, and from time to time thereafter such reasonable terms, conditions, 15 16 and limitations consistent with the character of the holder of 17 the permit as a contract carrier, including terms, conditions, 18 and limitations respecting the person or persons, their names, the number or class thereof for which the contract carrier may 19 20 perform transportation service, as may be necessary to assure 21 that the business is that of a contract carrier and within the



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1 scope of the permit, and to carry out with respect to the 2 operation of the carrier the requirements established by the 3 commission under sections 271-9(a)(2) and 271-9(a)(4). Any 4 permit covering the transportation of passengers may include 5 authority to transport in the same vehicle with the passengers, 6 baggage of passengers, and also authority to transport baggage 7 of passengers in a separate vehicle; provided that within the 8 scope of the permit and any terms, conditions, or limitations 9 attached thereto, the carrier shall have the right to substitute 10 or add to its equipment and facilities as the development of its 11 business may require; and provided further that no motor carrier 12 shall commence operations under any contract carrier authority 13 granted under this section until it has filed with the 14 commission a certified copy of a written contract or contracts 15 executed with the shipper or shippers for whom the service is 16 authorized in the permit to be provided, the contract or 17 contracts to be bilateral and impose specific obligations upon 18 both carrier and shipper or shippers and to set forth all terms 19 and conditions of any transportation agreement obtaining between 20 the motor carrier and the shipper or shippers."



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1 SECTION 7. Section 271-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows: 3 "(d) Whenever a transaction is proposed under subsection 4 (b) or (c) [of this section], the motor carrier or motor 5 carriers, or person or persons, seeking approval thereof shall 6 present an application to the commission in such form as the 7 commission may require and the commission may thereupon act upon 8 the application with or without first holding a public hearing; 9 provided that if requested, it shall afford reasonable 10 opportunity for interested parties to be heard. If the 11 commission finds that subject to such terms and conditions as it 12 shall find to be just and reasonable the proposed transaction 13 will be consistent with the public interests, the commission 14 shall enter an order approving and authorizing the transaction, 15 upon the terms and conditions, and with the modifications, so 16 found to be just and reasonable [-]; provided that, beginning 17 July 1, 2022, the commission shall not approve or authorize a 18 transaction involving the transfer of an interest in a 19 certificate covering the transportation of passengers or permit 20 covering the transportation of passengers if the person to whom 21 the interest will be transferred does not meet the requirements



1 of section 271-13(c)(1) through (3). In passing upon any 2 transaction under subsection (b) or (c), the commission shall 3 give weight, among other considerations, to the effect of the 4 proposed transaction upon [(1)] adequate transportation service 5 to the public, $[\frac{(2)}{(2)}]$ other motor carriers, and $[\frac{(3)}{(3)}]$ the 6 employees of any transferring motor carrier." 7 PART III 8 SECTION 8. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 10 and to read as follows: 11 "§304A- Certification for professional tour guides; curriculum. (a) The university shall maintain within the 12 13 community college system a certification for professional tour 14 guides program sufficient to meet the demand for enrollment. 15 (b) By June 30, 2020, and every ten years thereafter, the certification for professional tour guides curriculum and 16 17 examination shall be revised and updated as necessary; provided 18 that updates to the certification for professional tour guides 19 curriculum shall be subject to the approval of the aha moku 20 advisory committee.



(c) Certification for professional tour guides shall 1 2 expire on June 30 of each even-numbered year and be subject to recertification before June 30 of each even-numbered year." 3 4 SECTION 9. Section 171-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "[{] §171-4.5[}] Aha moku advisory committee; established. There is established the aha moku advisory committee to be 7 (a) 8 placed within the department of land and natural resources for 9 administrative purposes. The committee may advise the 10 chairperson of the board of land and natural resources in 11 carrying out the purposes of this section. 12 (b) The committee shall consist of eight members appointed 13 by the governor and confirmed by the senate from a list of 14 nominations submitted by the aha moku councils of each island. 15 Oversight of the aha moku advisory committee shall be by the 16 chairperson of the board of land and natural resources. The committee members shall select the committee chairperson from 17 18 among the members. 19 (c) The members shall not receive compensation for their 20 service, but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses,

21 including travel expenses, incurred while participating in



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meetings and events approved in advance by the chairperson of
 the board of land and natural resources.

The aha moku advisory committee may hire an executive director who shall be exempt from chapter 76. The executive director may hire an administrative or executive assistant to assist the executive director in accomplishing the purposes of the aha moku advisory committee.

8 (d) The aha moku advisory committee may provide advice on9 the following:

- 10 (1) Integrating indigenous resource management practices
 11 with western management practices in each moku;
- 12 (2) Identifying a comprehensive set of indigenous
 13 practices for natural resource management;
- 14 (3) Fostering the understanding and practical use of
 15 native Hawaiian resource knowledge, methodology, and
- 16 expertise;
- 17 (4) Sustaining the State's marine, land, cultural,
- 18 agricultural, and natural resources;
- 19 (5) Providing community education and fostering cultural
 20 awareness on the benefits of the aha moku system;



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1	(6) Fostering protection and conservation of the State's
2	natural resources; and
3	(7) Developing an administrative structure that oversees
4	the aha moku system.
5	(e) The committee may provide advice to the University of
6	Hawaii on the certification for professional tour guides
7	curriculum, shall evaluate updates to the curriculum, and shall
8	notify the University in writing whether the committee approves
9	or does not approve of updates to the curriculum.
10	[(c)] <u>(f)</u> The committee shall submit an annual report in
11	English and Hawaiian to the legislature and the chairperson of
12	the board of land and natural resources no later than twenty
13	days prior to the convening of each regular legislative session.
14	The annual report shall include a list of all recommendations
15	made by the committee and the resulting action taken by the
16	department over the course of the prior year."

Tourism; Tour Guides; Department of Land and Natural Resources; Commercial Use Permits; State Parks; Na Ala Hele Trails; Commercial Instructor and Operator Permits; Ocean Recreation Management Areas; Motor Carriers; Certificates and Permits Covering Transportation of Persons; Hawaii Ecotourism Association; Sustainable Tourism Certificate; Hawaii Green Business Program; Green Business Recognition; University of Hawaii; Community College System; Certification for Professional Tour Guides

Description:

Beginning July 1, 2022, requires persons who use the Na Ala Hele trail system for commercial purposes and applicants for new and renewal commercial use permits in state parks, small boat harbors, and ocean recreation management areas; instructor/operator permits; and common carrier certificates and contract carrier permits covering the transportation of passengers to hold and annually maintain a sustainable tourism certificate from the Hawaii Ecotourism Association, achieve and maintain green business recognition by the Hawaii Green Business Program, and ensure that at least one-third of staff members employed by the applicant who have direct contact with visitors are certified as professional tour quides. Requires the University of Hawaii to update the certification for professional tour guides curriculum and examination, subject to approval by the aha moku advisory committee, by June 30, 2020, and every ten years thereafter. Requires recertification and renewal of certification for professional tour guides every two years.
