BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	(f) This chapter shall not apply to the forfeiture of an
2	animal prior to disposition of criminal charges
3	pursuant to section 711-1109.2."
4	SECTION 2. Section 712A-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by amending subsection (2) to read as follows:
6	"(2) All forfeited property and the sale proceeds thereof
7	up to a maximum of three million dollars per year, not
8	previously transferred pursuant to [+] subsection[+] (1)(a) of
9	this section, [shall,] after payment of expenses of
10	administration and sale, shall be distributed as follows:
11	[(a) One quarter shall be distributed to the unit or units
12	of state or local government [whose] officers or
13	employees conducted the investigation and caused the
14	arrest of the person whose property was forfeited or
15	seizure of the property for forfeiture;
16	(b) One quarter shall be distributed to the prosecuting
17	attorney who instituted the action producing the
18	forfeiture; and
19	(c) One half shall be deposited into the criminal
20	forfeiture fund-established by this chapter.]

4	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
5	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
6	begun before its effective date.
7	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
8	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Attorney General; Penal Code; Forfeiture; Civil Assets

Description:

Prohibits civil asset forfeiture by reason of the commission of a covered offense, to the extent of the property owner's interest, unless the covered offense is a felony for which the property owner has been convicted. Prohibits the forfeiture of an animal prior to the disposition of criminal charges. Requires the Attorney General to distribute one half of all forfeited property and the sale proceeds thereof to the Hawaii law enforcement assisted diversion program, with the remaining half to be distributed to the state general fund.
