## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that opioid abuse is a
- 2 serious public health concern. According to the Center of
- 3 Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality, in 2016 an estimated
- 4 3,800,000 adults misused opioid medications. Studies show that
- 5 the most common reason for opioid use is to relieve physical
- 6 pain. Conventional pharmaceutical medications for treating
- 7 opioid addiction, such as methadone and buprenorphine, can be
- 8 similarly dangerous due to the substantial risks of lethal drug
- 9 interactions and overdose. Other medications aimed at reducing
- 10 the adverse symptoms of opioid withdrawal are not designed to
- 11 treat chronic pain.
- 12 The legislature also finds that the Centers for Disease
- 13 Control and Prevention recommends that most cases of chronic
- 14 pain be treated with non-opioid drugs. The legislature further
- 15 finds that cannabis is effective in treating chronic pain, both
- 16 as a supplement to and as a replacement for opioid medication.
- 17 Studies have indicated that cannabis users are more likely to



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- 1 adhere to a course of treatment for medication-assisted relapse
- 2 prevention, and are slower to develop opioid tolerance. Other
- 3 states have permitted the use of cannabis in coordination with
- 4 opioids and have experienced a drop in addiction and overdoses,
- 5 with opioid overdose rates falling by an average of twenty-five
- 6 per cent.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to include opioid use and
- 8 substance use disorders, or withdrawal symptoms resulting from
- 9 the treatment of these conditions to the existing definition of
- 10 "debilitating medical condition" as used in the medical use of
- 11 cannabis law.
- 12 SECTION 2. Section 329-121, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by amending the definition of "debilitating medical
- 14 condition" to read as follows:
- ""Debilitating medical condition" means:
- 16 (1) Cancer, glaucoma, lupus, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis,
- 17 rheumatoid arthritis, positive status for human
- immunodeficiency virus, acquired immune deficiency
- syndrome, or the treatment of these conditions;

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1	(2)	A chronic or debilitating disease or medical condition
2		or its treatment that produces one or more of the
3		following:
4		(A) Cachexia or wasting syndrome;
5		(B) Severe pain;
6		(C) Severe nausea;
7		(D) Seizures, including those characteristic of
8		epilepsy;
9		(E) Severe and persistent muscle spasms, including
10		those characteristic of multiple sclerosis or
11		Crohn's disease; or
12		(F) Post-traumatic stress disorder; [or]
13	(3)	Opioid use and substance use disorders, or withdrawal
14		symptoms resulting from the treatment of these
15		conditions; or
16	[ <del>(3)</del> ]	(4) Any other medical condition approved by the
17		department of health pursuant to administrative rules
18		in response to a request from a physician or advanced
19		practice registered nurse or potentially qualifying
20	,	patient."

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- 1 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 3 begun before its effective date.
- 4 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

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#### Report Title:

Medical Cannabis; Opioid Addiction; Substance Abuse; Debilitating Medical Condition

### Description:

Allows the use of medical cannabis to treat opioid use and substance use disorders, or withdrawal symptoms resulting from the treatment of those conditions.

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
