RELATING TO MINIMUM WAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 387-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: 3 "§387-2 Minimum wages[+]; living wage. (a) Except as 4 provided in section 387-9 and this section, every employer shall 5 pay to each employee employed by the employer, wages at the rate 6 of not less than: 7 (1)\$6.25 per hour beginning January 1, 2003; 8 (2) \$6.75 per hour beginning January 1, 2006; 9 \$7.25 per hour beginning January 1, 2007; (3) 10 (4) \$7.75 per hour beginning January 1, 2015; 11 \$8.50 per hour beginning January 1, 2016; (5) 12 (6) \$9.25 per hour beginning January 1, 2017; [and] \$10.10 per hour beginning January 1, 2018[-]; 13 (7) 14 (8) \$11.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2020; 15 \$12.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2021; (9) 16 (10)\$13.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2022; 17 \$14.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2023; (11)

- 5 period for which data is available. The living wage rate shall
- 6 be increased by the percentage calculated by the department,
- 7 rounded to the nearest cent; provided that if, after conducting
- 8 the calculations required under this subsection, the
- 9 calculations for the current year lead to a lower living wage
- 10 than that of the previous year, the department shall set the
- 11 living wage for the current year at the same rate as the
- 12 previous year.
- (d) On January 1, 2026, and on January 1 of each year
- 14 thereafter, the minimum wage rate in paragraph (a) shall either
- 15 increase ten per cent or change to the new adjusted living wage

Report Title:

Labor; Minimum Wage; Living Wage; Department of Labor and Industrial Relations; Consumer Price Index

Description:

Establishes a living wage rate to be adjusted according to the consumer price index. Requires the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, on January 1, 2026, and each subsequent year, to increase the minimum wage rate by ten per cent or pursuant to the most recent adjusted living wage, whichever is lower.
