SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO AUTHORIZE THE NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION SAFETY BOARD TO ADOPT AND ENFORCE REGULATIONS FOR INCREASED SAFETY STANDARDS FOR HELICOPTERS AND SMALL AIRCRAFT THAT CHARGE FEES FOR CARRYING PASSENGERS ON RECREATIONAL FLIGHTS.

WHEREAS, there have been two fatal aircraft crashes in 1 Hawaii since April 2019; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, on April 29, 2019, the pilot and two passengers 5 were killed when a tour helicopter crashed on Oneawa Street, a 6 busy residential roadway in Kailua, Oahu, Hawaii; and 7 8 WHEREAS, on June 21, 2019, the pilot and ten passengers 9 were killed when an airplane used for skydiving crashed at Dillingham Airfield in Mokuleia, Oahu, Hawaii; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) 12 reports that there have been eighty accidents and nineteen 13 14 deaths involving skydiving flights since 2008; and 15 WHEREAS, under federal law, the Federal Aviation 16 Administration (FAA) has the authority to prescribe regulations 17 on the flight of aircraft, including protecting individuals and 18 19 property on the ground and preventing collisions; and 20 WHEREAS, under Federal Aviation Regulations, aircraft 21 22 operators are categorized depending on the type of service they provide: Part 121, Part 135, and Part 91; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, major passenger airlines operate under Part 121, the strictest category of regulations; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Part 135 governs business and charter flights that 28 operate for compensation or hire, including air taxis, air 29 30 tours, and certain helicopters, and includes specific



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1 requirements for aircraft maintenance and safety; however, Part 135 requirements are not as stringent as Part 121 requirements; 2 3 and 4 WHEREAS, Part 91 regulations, which governs privately-owned 5 6 aircraft, including certain helicopter operators and all parachuting service operators, are far more lenient than Part 7 8 121 or Part 135 regulations and operators under Part 91 do not 9 have to comply with manufacturer bulletins and other safety 10 regulations; and 11 12 WHEREAS, following the crashes in Hawaii, the NTSB urged 13 the FAA to increase regulations for aircraft and air tour 14 operators that operate under Part 135 and Part 91 of the Federal 15 Aviation Regulations; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the NTSB has urged the FAA to implement NTSB 18 recommendations to improve the safety of for-hire charter 19 flights and parachuting service operations for years; and 20 21 WHEREAS, however, the FAA has declined to make changes to 22 improve the safety of charter flights and parachuting service 23 operations as recommended by the NTSB, especially with respect 24 to pilot training, maintenance of aircraft, and FAA oversight; 25 and 26 27 WHEREAS, Congress made the NTSB responsible for 28 investigating all civil aviation accidents and certain accidents 29 in other modes of transportation, with the intent of identifying 30 safety improvements to prevent future accidents; and 31 32 WHEREAS, however, the NTSB has no authority to require 33 implementation of its recommendations or change safety 34 regulations and practices; and 35 36 WHEREAS, this body finds that NTSB-recommended regulations for charter flights and parachuting service operations are 37 38 necessary to address the increasing safety risks and fatalities 39 caused by these types of for-hire tour operations; however, only 40 Congress may grant authority to the NTSB to adopt and enforce safety regulations; now, therefore, 41 42



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BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, the House of Representatives concurring, that the United States Congress is respectfully requested to authorize the NTSB to adopt and enforce regulations for increased safety standards for helicopters and small aircraft that charge fees for carrying passengers on recreational flights; and

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President Pro Tempore of the United States Senate, Speaker of the United 11 States House of Representatives, Majority Leader of the United 12 13 States Senate, Minority Leader of the United States Senate, 14 Majority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, 15 Minority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, Hawaii's congressional delegation, Administrator of the Federal 16 17 Aviation Administration, Chairman of the National Transportation 18 Safety Board, Governor, and Director of Transportation. 19
