SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENDORSING AND ADOPTING OF THE TREATY ON THE PROHIBITION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS TO SUPPORT UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOAL 16 FOR PEACE, JUSTICE, AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS AND URGING THE UNITED STATES TO TAKE LIKE ACTION.

WHEREAS, Hawaii is a place of peace in the Pacific and its 1 people believe in creating a better world for all; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, Hawaii supports the United Nations sustainable 5 development goals and recognizes the interconnectedness of all goals to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development 6 7 around the globe; and 8 9 WHEREAS, since the height of the Cold War, the United States and Russia have dismantled more than fifty thousand 10 nuclear warheads, but approximately thirteen thousand eight 11 hundred of these weapons still exist and pose an intolerable 12 13 risk to human survival; and 14 15 WHEREAS, over ninety percent of these weapons are in the 16 hands of the United States and Russia and the rest are held by 17 seven other countries: China, France, India, Israel, North Korea, Pakistan, and the United Kingdom; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, Hawaii witnessed how the chaos and harm even a missile threat lasting for only thirty minutes can impact the 21 islands; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, the use of even a tiny fraction of these weapons could cause worldwide climate disruption and global famine; for 25 example, as few as one hundred Hiroshima-sized bombs, small by 26 modern standards, would put at least five million tons of soot 27 into the upper atmosphere and cause climate disruption across 28 29 the planet, cutting food production and putting two billion people at risk of starvation; and 30

1 2 WHEREAS, a large-scale nuclear war would kill hundreds of 3 millions of people directly and cause unimaginable environmental 4 damage and catastrophic climate disruption by dropping 5 temperatures across the planet to levels not seen since the last ice age; under these conditions the vast majority of the human 6 7 race would starve and could lead to human extinction as a 8 species; and 9 10 WHEREAS, despite assurances that these arsenals exist solely to guarantee that they are never used, there have been 11 12 many occasions when nuclear armed states have prepared to use these weapons, and war has been averted only at the last minute; 13 14 and 15 WHEREAS, nuclear weapons do not possess some magical 16 17 quality that prevents their use; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the former Defense Secretary said, speaking about 20 the Cuban Missile Crisis, "[i]t was luck that prevented nuclear war," yet the United States' nuclear policy cannot be the hope 21 22 that luck will continue; and 23 24 WHEREAS, as the effects of climate change place increased 25 stress on communities around the world and intensify the 26 likelihood of conflict, the danger of nuclear war will grow; and 27 28 WHEREAS, Hawaii is home to a significant population of 29 Marshall Islanders, whose homeland was the site of sixty-seven atmospheric nuclear weapons tests during the Cold War, and who 30 31 have not been adequately compensated for the catastrophic environmental and health consequences of such horrific testing; 32 33 and 34 35 WHEREAS, the planned expenditure of more than \$1,000,000,000,000 to enhance the United States' nuclear arsenal 36 37 will not only increase the risk of nuclear disaster but fuel a global arms race and divert crucial resources needed to assure 38 39 the well-being of the American people and people all over the 40 world; and 41

WHEREAS, there is an alternative to this march toward 1 2 nuclear war: in July 2017, one hundred twenty-two nations called for the elimination of all nuclear weapons by adopting 3 the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons; now, 4 5 therefore, 6 7 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature 8 of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, the House of 9 Representatives concurring, that this body endorses and adopts the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons to support the 10 United Nations sustainable goal 16 for peace, justice, and 11 strong intuitions; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that federal leaders and the nation 14 15 are urged to endorse the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons and make nuclear disarmament the centerpiece of the 16 United States' national security policy; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body calls upon federal 20 leaders and the nation to spearhead a global effort to prevent 21 nuclear war by renouncing the option of using nuclear weapons 22 first; ending the President's sole, unchecked authority to launch a nuclear attack; taking United States nuclear weapons 23 off hair-trigger alert; canceling the plan to replace its entire 24 arsenal with enhanced weapons; and actively pursuing a 25 26 verifiable agreement among nuclear-armed states to eliminate 27 their nuclear arsenals; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 30 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, President Pro Tempore of the United States 31 32 Senate, Majority Leader of the United States Senate, Minority 33 Leader of the United States Senate, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, Minority Leader of the United States 34 House of Representatives, Secretary-General of the United 35 Nations, United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, 36 37 members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, Governor of the State of Hawaii, and each mayor of the several counties. 38 39 40 41 helle N.
