SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO CREATE A WORKING GROUP TO DISCUSS AND IMPLEMENT INSTITUTIONAL CHANGES IN SUSPENSION POLICY AT THE SCHOOL-LEVEL.

WHEREAS, studies show that suspensions are not an effective 1 means of improving school functioning and school morale, but 2 have a profoundly negative impact on student behavior, 3 increasing drop-out rates, producing more aggressive behavior 4 because of higher stress levels, denying students valuable 5 education time and burdening the family with their care during 6 school time resulting in job difficulties for parents, and a 7 lack of supervision for the suspended student raising the 8 9 possibility of the child ending up in the juvenile justice system and fueling the school-to-prison pipeline; and 10 11

WHEREAS, the Department of Education reported to the 12 federal government in its Civil Rights Data Collection 13 (2015-2016) suspension numbers which show that Hawaii has the 14 highest rate in the nation for suspending students with 15 disabilities, and very high rates of suspending Native 16 Hawaiians, which has been shown to affect all students by 17 creating perceptions that their disciplinary environment is less 18 favorable; and 19

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21 WHEREAS, the Department of Education says its reporting was 22 inaccurate but has continuously refused and failed to produce 23 new statistics in a way that allows it to state what its actual 24 rate of suspension is for students with disabilities and they 25 have refused to explain why it will not provide this information 26 required by federal law; and

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28 WHEREAS, there are multiple reports that students with 29 disabilities are sent home from school for a variety of reasons wherein the Department of Education does not call it a 30 suspension and probably does not report it as a suspension -31 these circumstances include situations where parents are 32 33 encouraged and pressured to sign the child out as sick although that is not true - which suggests that Department of Education's 34 true suspension rates may be much higher than reported; and 35



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1 WHEREAS, the Department of Education has almost unfettered 2 discretion in suspending children from school for long periods 3 of time resulting in disproportionate suspensions of Native 4 Hawaiians and students with disabilities; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the Department of Education has shown opposition 7 towards the proposal of reducing the number of suspensions that 8 can be used, explaining that it would not be beneficial for 9 maintaining school safety and limit the administrator's ability 10 to uphold school policy; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii has often led the nation in 13 protecting the rights of children and minorities, such as 14 becoming the third state in the nation to ban corporal 15 16 punishment in schools, but is now leading the nation in allowing the suspension of students with disabilities and Native 17 18 Hawaiians; and 19 WHEREAS, the Department of Education needs to create a new 20 culture wherein suspensions are a last resort for serious safety 21 22 issues and all reasonable attempts are made to keep children in school, as seen in other states that have begun to utilize 23 restorative educational practices to mitigate group disparities 24 and juvenile delinguency; now, therefore; 25 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, that the 28 Department of Education is requested to create a working group 29 to discuss and implement institutional changes in school 30 suspension policy, looking at updated suspension data, and 31 drafting ideas for best practices; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Department of 34 35 Education is requested to convene a working group on suspensions and school exclusion to do the following: 36 37 Evaluate scientific research on the use of suspensions 38 (1) and exclusions of children from school and the effects 39 40 thereof; 41

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1 (12) Representative from the Center on Disability Studies, 2 3 University of Hawaii; and 4 Any other persons that may be invited by the working (13) 5 6 group; and 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group shall convene 8 no later than August 1, 2020; and 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the agenda of the first 11 convening of the working group shall include updated data 12 reporting from the 2015-2016 Civil Rights Data Collection and 13 14 applicable 2017-2018 reporting data; and 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 16 to submit a report to the Legislature of its findings and 17 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, no later 18 than 30 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 19 2021; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 22 Resolution shall be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board 23 of Education and Superintendent of Education. 24 25 26 27 OFFERED BY



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
