SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, IN COLLABORATION WITH UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII ECONOMIC RESEARCH ORGANIZATION, TO CONDUCT AN ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY TO ASSESS THE IMPACT OF POTENTIAL CHANGES TO COFFEE LABELING REQUIREMENTS ON THE LOCAL COFFEE INDUSTRY.

WHEREAS, Hawaii-grown coffee is widely recognized as one of 1 the distinctive products of our islands, and the production and 2 sale of coffee is a major industry in the State; and 3 4 WHEREAS, there are two main types of Hawaii-grown coffee: 5 pure and blends; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Act 289, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, established 8 a standard for Kona coffee blends; specifically, this Act 9 established that a coffee blend must contain a minimum of ten 10 percent of Kona coffee, by weight, to be considered a Kona 11 blend; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the origin and percentage of the other coffees contained in the package of blended coffee is not required to be 15 listed on the package label or advertisement; and 16 17 WHEREAS, a package of blended coffee could be labeled as 18 "Kona coffee", even though it may only contain ten percent of 19 Kona coffee and ninety percent of coffee grown in foreign 20 countries; and 21 22 WHEREAS, for over 25 years, Hawaii has been the only region 23 in the world that statutorily regulates the uses of its 24 geographic names, such as "Kona", "Maui", "Molokai", and "Ka'ū", 25 on labels of its specialty agricultural products with as little 26 as ten percent of the product originating from the geographic 27 area indicated; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Legislature, through Senate Concurrent 30 Resolution No. 102, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 (2007), found that 31 "[e]xisting labeling requirements for Kona coffee causes 32

consumer fraud and confusion and degrades the 'Kona coffee' 1 2 name"; and 3 WHEREAS, furthermore, coffee roasters from the continental 4 United States are not bound by any labeling requirements 5 relating to the use of Kona coffee or the "Kona coffee" name, 6 which adds to consumer confusion; and 7 8 WHEREAS, there has been a continuous and contentious debate 9 on raising the minimum percentage of Kona coffee beans that 10 should be contained in a blend of Kona beans and other coffee 11 beans, which may be labeled as a "Kona coffee blend" or similar 12 13 terms; and 14 WHEREAS, the local coffee industry remains divided on 15 changing the labeling requirements for Hawaii-grown coffee; 16 specifically, whether changing the State's labeling requirements 17 will have a serious economic impact on Hawaii's coffee farmers 18 and industry; and 19 20 WHEREAS, it is critical that the integrity of Hawaii coffee 21 industry be maintained; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, an economic impact study performed by a neutral entity should be completed to fully understand what economic 25 impacts, if any, will result from any changes to Hawaii's coffee 26 labeling requirements; now, therefore, 27 28 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature 29 of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, that the 30 Department of Agriculture, in collaboration with the University 31 of Hawaii Economic Research Organization is requested to conduct 32 a study to assess the economic impact on the local coffee 33 industry from potential changes to Hawaii's coffee labeling 34 laws; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 37 shall consult with stakeholders in the coffee industry to 38 establish the protocols to be used and factors to be addressed 39 in the study; and 40 41

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 1 shall complete the study no later than January 1, 2021; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 4 shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations, 5 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature, no later 6 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session 7 of 2021; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 Resolution be transmitted to the Board of the Department of 11 12 Agriculture, President of the University of Hawaii, and Executive Director of the University of Hawaii Economic Research 13 Organization. 14 15 16 17 OFFERED BY:
