A: I would like to give back to the trade and participate in the vetting process of Hawaii State elevator mechanic's licensing and ensure stringency in the interest of public safety.

(2) What do you perceive are the roles and responsibilities of a member of the Elevator Mechanics Licensing Board?

A: To review license applications for completed requirements and provide input and feedback based on my expertise for possible revisions to the statutes regarding Elevator licensing.

(3) Given your understanding of the roles and responsibilities of a Elevator Mechanics Licensing Board member, why do you believe that you are qualified for the position? Please include a brief statement of your skills, expertise and knowledge that would aid you as a member of the Board.

A: I have been in the elevator trade since 2005, starting as an apprentice then as a mechanic upon acquiring my Hawaii State Elevator license in 2010. I have worked on repair and upgrades for older equipment as well as modernization to new control and drive systems to meet current installation code on both elevators and escalators. My experience on these different aspects as well as with different companies and equipment manufacturers allows me a greater understanding of the different aspects of the trade. This experience helps me to understand the importance of proper training and the responsibility of public safety that comes with an Elevator Mechanic's license.
