TESTIMONY TO THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

House Bill 1153, HD1 - Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports and offers comments on House Bill 1153, HD1 Relating to the Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings which requires both chambers of the Legislature to establish rules for livestreaming public hearings and informational briefings at the State Capitol to the public through remote testimony.

This bill would allow more ways for individuals, including individuals with disabilities to be included in the Legislative process. Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) livestreaming public hearings and informational briefings need to be accessible to individuals with disabilities. This bill does not specify that the rules will include procedures to address the inclusion of people of people with disabilities. Livestreaming will need to include captioning for people who are deaf or hard of hearing. Is the current network or system at the Capitol equipped to provide the service?

We suggest including an advisory group of individuals with a variety of disabilities to collaborate by offering suggests to the rules for presenting accessible livestreaming of public hearings and informational briefings. We are willing to assist with suggesting names of individuals who may be willing to participate on such an advisory group. There are also other service providers and agencies serving people with disabilities who may be able to suggest individuals with disabilities to assist in the development of remote technology. Including people with disabilities at the planning phase will allow for the development of a more holistic approach that will work for the entire community.

Funding to pay for equipment or means to provide real time captioning of the livestreamed public hearings and informational briefings, as well as auxiliary aids and services (sign language interpreters and/or notetakers) for individuals with disabilities to participate in an advisory group should be included in the appropriation of this bill. The amount is dependent on the cost for live captioning services of the hearings and informational briefings and how many times the advisory group meets and the length of the meetings.

RE: HB 1153, HD1 Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings

Article I, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i provides that "All political power of this State is inherent in the people and the responsibility for the exercise thereof rests with the people." In that spirit, and over the course of its history, the Hawai'i State Legislature has been dedicated to assuring citizen participation in its activities, and has often been at the forefront of innovations that enhance that participation and make it more effective.

Technology has now reached the point where persons with disabilities, residents of rural Oahu, and neighbor island residents, can be enabled to more fully participate in the legislative process without experiencing inconvenient, expensive and/or time-consuming travel to the Capitol. Exactly how that should be done, without jeopardizing the need for an expeditious legislative process, may require further thought and deliberations, and that is exactly what HB 1153, HD1 would allow. HB 1153, HD1 does not presuppose a method, but neither is it just another "study." Truly action oriented, it mandates the outcome that remote testimony shall be allowed, and then leaves it to each house to figure out the details. That is the kind of balance that this Legislature is known for and can be proud of.

An earlier generation of Hawai'i leaders recognized that all residents of the State deserve equal educational opportunities, regardless of where they live. Now today's generation of leaders is better assuring that all have equal access to their government. Thank you for taking this next step.

I hope you will approve HB 1153, HD1.

H.B. 1153, H.D. 1 – RELATING TO THE LEGISLATURE

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO strongly supports the purpose and intent of H.B. 1153, H.D. 1 which requires each chamber of the Legislature to establish procedures for the public to present oral testimony at legislative committee hearings via remote testimony.

Due to the fast-paced legislative timetable, it is often a severe financial hardship for neighbor island residents to actively participate in our democratic process. For example, when the Legislature was considering the privatization of the Maui Region of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, employees had to take time off of work, purchase airline tickets — often with only 48-hours notice, and arrange ground transportation to attend and testify in committee hearings. Many of our members chose to expend their valuable time and money to share their expertise and ensure their voices were heard, but we firmly believe many more would have taken advantage of remote testimony technology. We are confident that this same situation is all too familiar for too many neighbor island residents, regardless of the issue at hand. The establishment of a Remote Legislative Access Program ensures equal access to committee hearings no matter where a Hawaii resident resides.

House Bill 1153 HD1 Testifying in Support

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Members of the Committee on Finance,

The Democratic Party of Hawaii (The Party) stands in **support of HB1153 HD1 Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings**, which establishes a Remote Legislative Access Program to allow for the submission of testimony remotely and appropriates funds.

The Party understands that in order to have a more engaged public, we must ensure that everyone has access to the legislative process. While it is true that any member of the public can theoretically submit testimony in writing, that is not always the case. It requires computer and internet access, the capacity to follow directions, the ability to read and write, and various other supports. We also know that oftentimes the most compelling testimony is that which is given in person, sitting across from their Representatives and Senators.

Beyond just the written testimony, the ability for members of the public to testify face to face and voice to voice should be the guiding principle for public hearings. Yet for too long this has not been the case. Individuals living on islands other than Oahu face steep time and financial challenges to make their cases heard. This, on top of potentially having to take time off from work, those separated by an ocean from their state elected officials presents immense challenges to fair and equal access.

And those with disabilities face more daunting impediments to equal access to provide in-person testimony.

According to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), a "qualified individual with a disability" means an individual with a disability who, with or without reasonable modifications to rules, policies, or practices, the removal of architectural, communication, or transportation barriers, or the provision of auxiliary aids and services, meets the essential eligibility requirements for the receipt of services or the participation in programs or activities provided by a public entity."

Also from the ADA; "subject to the provisions of this subchapter, no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason or such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity."

Persons with disabilities are guaranteed the right against discrimination.

Insurance companies in Hawaii, including MedQuest, recognize that when a neighbor island resident is required to fly for treatment to an island on which they don't reside, that it can be stressful. This is why the insurance companies pay for a companion or caregiver plane ticket so that the person has support during the process.

It is an undue hardship for many residents of Hawaii to attend Public Hearings in person. This is why creating and funding a Remote Legislative Access Program is a priority for the Party. It is time to truly create access for all.

When it comes to discerning the best ways to spend our state's limited finances, we hope that creating equal access for all people to participate in their democracy, is high on the priority list.

For these reasons we urge to vote favorably on this bill.

The members of **PWT** would very much like the opportunity to address lawmakers directly, about Hawaii's inequity in the application of the Federal Schedule of Controlled Substances, and the state placing commercial cannabis sales to tourists, above the needs of some of our most vulnerable citizens.

In 2000, Hawaii's lawmakers, (in blatant violation of federal Schedule), passed compassionate medical marijuana laws. Then Hawaii issued commercial licenses to the "BIG 8 DISPENSARY/Monopoly System (again in blatant violation of federal Schedule),

In 2019, almost two decades later, thousands of Hawaii's registered cannabis patients, and tens of thousands of unregistered (angry, fearful and confused) patients, are still being criminalized (in obedience to the federal Schedule)! This is NOT equal justice for all.

Furthermore; Hawaii's seriously ill registered medical cannabis patients still do not have legal access to cannabis seeds, clones, and/or plants.

Twenty years of written testimony has not moved lawmakers to take action to end the racial prejudice, and economic discrimination, and needless suffering wrought by the federal marijuana prohibition, perhaps our personal pleas will be heard.
