In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 1922** RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES

House Bill 1922 proposes to appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) for the detection and management of invasive species in the county of Maui. **The** Department supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 1922, relating to invasive species. The bill appropriates funds from the general fund to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for efforts to substantially reduce and eradicate the problem of invasive species in Maui County. The Department supports this measure and offers a comment.

Invasive species are a primary threat to Hawai'i's agriculture and economy. Funding for control of invasive species, such as coqui frogs, little fire ants, coffee berry borer, rhinoceros beetles, and rat lungworm disease, is critical to ensure that appropriate responses can be implemented and maintained which mitigate negative impacts on the environment and economy. The Hawai'i Interagency Biosecurity Plan guides these efforts. However, the Department notes that currently there are no invasive rhinoceros beetles in Maui County.

Legislation with a similar purpose is included in the Maui County Legislative Package; however, the Maui County Council has not had the opportunity to take a formal position on this measure. Therefore, I am providing this testimony in my capacity as an individual member of the Maui County Council.

I support this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. Invasive species such as coqui frogs, miconia, and little fire ants continue to threaten watersheds, ecological resources, agriculture, native plant and animal species, and the residential quality of life in Maui County, and therefore, must be prevented, controlled, or eliminated.
- 2. Intrastate commerce and the interisland transportation of plants have resulted in a significant increase of invasive species that has grown to include new species such as coffee borer beetles, rhinoceros beetles, and rat lungworm disease.
- 3. Environmental protection through the reduction and eradication of invasive species is a statewide and partnership driven effort. The County of Maui works closely with Maui Invasive Species Committee and Molokai Invasive Species Committee to target invasive threats to Maui County. Appropriating statewide funds towards this effort is sorely needed to address this growing issue.

For the foregoing reasons, I support this measure.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in **FULL SUPPORT** of HB1922.

The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for efforts to substantially reduce and eradicate certain invasive species in the county of Maui. Environmental initiatives and grants are part of the Office of Economic Development and funding has substantial increased over the years. In the last two fiscal years, funding went from \$895,000 in FY2019 to \$3,650,000 in FY2020. The funding for coqui frogs is \$2,500,000 with the primary reason being lack of funds when the species was first detected on Maui. Early detection, control and eradication is essential to avoid these types of cost increases in the future.

I strongly urge you to pass this measure, HB1922.

Aloha Chair Creagan, Vice-Chair DeCoite, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

HFB is in strong support of HB 1922, which appropriates funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for efforts to substantially reduce and eradicate certain invasive species in the county of Maui.

Invasive species have become one of the most challenging problems impacting Hawaii. Many invasive species are damaging Hawaii's environment and the state's economy. Agriculture has a vested interest in this matter. Agriculture is one of the major casualties when invasive species are introduced. Every year, numerous new pests are introduced into the State, such as the coqui frog, coffee berry borer, axis deer, macadamia felted coccid, little fire ant, coconut rhinoceros beetle, small hive beetle, and varroa mite, to name a few.

In the 2002 LRB study on invasive species, it was reported that the estimated cost of financing all invasive species programs was \$50 million. The report estimated that the lost revenue to agriculture was \$300 million per year. It also states that the invasion of unwanted pests has the potential to economically devastate the State by keeping tourists away from the island and that invasive species can affect tourism indirectly by altering or displacing Hawaii's environmental assets.

HFB strongly supports this measure which seeks to protect the people, environment, and agriculture in Maui County. We respectfully request that all Counties receive funding to combat invasive species.
