<u>DEPARTMENT'S POSITION</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the intent of the bill and provides comments. DHS appreciates amendments made by the Committee on Human Services and Homelessness.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill establishes the Hawaii State Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus Commission. Appropriates funds. Effective 12/31/2059. (HD1).

DHS supports and recognizes the generosity and efforts of the different LGBT and LGBTQ advocacy groups, especially around the issues of bullying prevention and equity. The proposal is modeled after the statutes that establish the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women, which has long been successful in its promotion and advocacy to improve the status of women in Hawaii.

DHS comments that an appropriation for the executive director as well as an operational budget is necessary for the proposed Commission to function and implement its statutory mission. The Legislature should also know that office space within DHS is also lacking

so an appropriation may need to include funds to develop an office and to obtain necessary IT and other office systems.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) offers the following **COMMENTS** on HB2037 HD1, which would create a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trangender, Queer, Plus Commission. This measure would provide a meaningful and permanent way to ensure that our LGBTQ+ community members' unique issues and needs are documented, considered, and valued in policymaking and programmatic facilitation.

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender ("LGBT") people have deep roots in traditional Hawaiian society, and remain a significant but often unacknowledged part of Hawai'i's community today. Hawaiian culture has a rich history of gender diversity and acceptance of those who would now be considered lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or gender non-conforming. In pre-colonial Hawaiian culture and society, aikāne and māhū were even revered and maintained special roles in society and in certain cultural practices.¹

Unfortunately, our community today does not meaningfully acknowledge and accommodate our lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and gender non-conforming communities, resulting in various forms of systemic and invidious discrimination not reflective of Hawai'i's cultural history and traditional values. Currently, over 1 in 10 public high school students in the state identify as LGBQ (including youth who are "questioning" their sexuality), with 22% of these youth being Native Hawaiian,² over 3% of adults in Hawai'i also identify as LGB, with approximately 18% of the adult LGB population being Native Hawaiian.³ Moreover, Hawai'i ranks first in the nation with the highest proportion of its population composed of transgender adults,⁴ and three percent of Hawai'i's high-school-aged youth identify as transgender, with 25% of these youth being Native Hawaiian.⁵ Unfortunately, Hawai'i's LGBTQ youth suffer from poor access to healthcare and health outcomes,⁶ high incidence of substance abuse,⁷ high incidence

of sexual and emotional abuse by a partner,⁸ bullying in schools and poor educational outcomes,⁹ and poor mental health with high rates of self-harm and suicidal ideation.¹⁰ Despite a notable presence in Hawai'i, nearly half of all transgender youth live in unstable housing situations compared to only 6 percent of cisgender youth.¹¹ And Hawai'i's LGB adults report similarly dismal experiences:¹² Hawai'i's LGB adults, especially women, experience health disparities, particularly in rates of chronic diseases and conditions; ¹³ poor mental health;¹⁴ high rates of physical and sexual violence;¹⁵ and higher incidence of risky behavior.¹⁶ Although more than half of LGB adults have received higher education, they also earn much less than heterosexual adults overall.¹⁷

Despite being recognized and included in positions of reverence in the Hawaiian Kingdom and in pre-contact Hawai'i, LGBT people in Hawai'i face significant adversities today. Their exclusion from consideration or recognition in government policies and programs may not only perpetuate such adversities, but may also limit our society from realizing and benefiting from its members' true and full potential. By establishing a body to improve the State's policymaking and programming with respect to our LGBTQ+ community, this measure would take an important first step toward better supporting this segment of our community and improving their lives, and thereby benefitting our society overall.

To best protect and promote the needs of the Native Hawaiian LGBT community, OHA offers a friendly amendment, to be inserted on line 15 of page 5, to read as follows:

(4) Promote the diversity of cultural expressions of persons of all sexual orientations, gender identities, gender expressions, and sex characteristics and ensure the recognition of culturally-based sexual and gender identities specific to Hawai'i, such as māhū and aikāne;

Accordingly, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** HB2037 HD1. Mahalo piha for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i's laws prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, and access to state and state funded services (on the basis of disability). The HCRC carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5.

H.B. No. 2037, H.D. 1, amends the HRS to add a new chapter to establish the Hawai'i State Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus Commission..

The HCRC supports H.B. No. 2037, H.D. 1.

The purpose of this chapter to provide for a statewide program, on a permanent and continuing basis, on the status of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, plus people in Hawai'i.

The civil rights laws that the HCRC enforces prohibit discrimination based on sex, including gender identity or expression, and sexual orientation in employment (HRS chapter 378, part I), public accommodations (HRS chapter 489), and housing (HRS chapter 515). Indeed, the HCRC's statutory purpose reads: "§368-1 Purpose and intent. The legislature finds and declares that the practice of discrimination because of race, color, religion, age, sex, including gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, ancestry, or

disability in employment, housing, public accommodations, or access to services receiving state financial assistance is against public policy..."

Noting that the new HRS chapter proposed in the bill is modeled after HRS chapter 367 which established the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women, the HCRC supports H.B. No. 2037, H.D. 1.

Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair San Buenaventura and fellow committee members,

I am writing in STRONG SUPPORT for House Bill 2037 House Draft 1on behalf of the LGBT Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, Hawaii's oldest and largest policy and political LGBTQIA+ focused organization. HB 2037 HD 1 establishes the Hawai'i State Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus Commission and the Hawai'i State Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus Commission Trust Fund.

It has been 7 years since we passed Marriage Equality here in the Aloha State, while that was a huge milestone for Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community we have a lot more work to do to ensure Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community has full equality at every level government and society. We also need to remain vigilant to ensure there is no back sliding for all of the advancements we have made to the lofty goal of equality.

Even with all of the advances we have made here are just some of the difficulties facing Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community:

- LGBTQIA+ suicide rates are 3 to 4 times than that of their straight and/or cisgender peers
- 85% of LGBTQIA+ students have experienced verbal harassment
- When the State of Hawaii's Department of Health did do a study for Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community they only included lesbians, gays and bisexuals
- There is no federal law protecting employees from discrimination based on sexual orientation, gender identity and/or expression in the United States.
- Homophobia and transphobia are the most publicly accepted forms of bigotry, harassment and discrimination
- 80% of the transgender population who were employed experienced harassment or mistreatment on the job or took steps to avoid it
- When it comes to statistics about Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community we have to rely on studies done on the continent or Europe
- When the State of Hawaii's Department of Health did do a study for Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community they only included lesbians, gays and bisexuals

The LGBT Caucus understands that even when the Commission is established the Commission alone will not be able to solve all of these problems facing Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community. But just imagine having a Commission, with commissioners from every county, working with other community stakeholders and the ex-officio members representing the Department of Education,

University of Hawai'i, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Department of Human Services, Department of Human Resources Development, and Department of Health can do to start to address these and other difficulties facing Hawaii's LGBTQIA+ community.

For all these reasons the LGBT Caucus humbly asks that you support HB 2037 HD 1 as it is the right thing to do.
