- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** None.
- 2 **Department Testimony:** The Department SUPPORTS this HD1 and appreciates the
- 3 Legislature's support in our mutual aim to safeguard the public, protect aged and vulnerable
- 4 persons, and ensure quality of care by requiring and enforcing that all residential care homes and
- 5 other health care facilities, agencies and organizations are licensed pursuant to state law.
- The Department is actively investigating approximately 76 complaints and, to date, has
- 7 initiated or completed enforcement action on more than a half dozen unlicensed facilities, with
- 8 more to follow. Enforcement includes immediate cease and desist orders, the required discharge
- 9 or transfer of residents to licensed care homes or facilities, and issuing administrative penalties.
- To date, the Department has closed five (5) homes or facilities, and \$40,000 in fines were
- 11 collected or are in the process of being collected. Enforcement activities include long and
- arduous hours from the Department's registered nurses, professional investigators, and deputy
- attorney general. This time is expensive and could be used on the Department's other licensing
- activities such as on unannounced annual inspections and implementation of other licensing

- 1 programs. However, these enforcement activities are a critical component of the state's efforts to
- 2 ensure the health, safety and welfare of our *kupuna*, and such actions deserve all of our support.
- The Department SUPPORTS this HD1 as follows:
- 1. Enforcement Actions: HD1 includes the Department's requested amendments for consistency between Section 321-487 HRS and Section 321-486 HRS. This language helps to avoid inadvertently omitting professions that are in the business of referring vulnerable persons or families.
- Delete Exclusion Language: The Department supports this deletion to avoid
 confusion.
- On a housekeeping note, there is a duplicated word on page 1 line 8. Please delete the word "any" from the draft bill.
- Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill.

STATEMENT OF THE LWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 2110, HD1 RELATING TO HEALTH

The ILWU Local 142 <u>supports</u> H.B. 2110, HD1, which clarifies the group of professionals who are prohibited from knowingly referring or transferring patients to an uncertified or unlicensed care facility and repeals the landlord exclusion

Individuals needing the care of someone else to subsist and survive are among the most vulnerable in our society, whether they are elderly, disabled, or minors. If the care is provided by non-family members, government should step in to ensure that the care is properly and diligently provided, that the facility meets safety and health requirements, that the individuals needing care are treated appropriately, respectfully, and competently. Toward that end, care providers must be certified and/or licensed and regularly monitored by government entities.

Yet within our communities, many elderly and disabled individuals who need long-term services and supports are living in homes that are unlicensed and are sometimes little more than rooming houses. Most of these arrangements are likely run by caring individuals who mean well. Most, in fact, would like to be licensed but have been thwarted by long wait times. But the bottom line is that they should be licensed and undergo regular governmental review.

While the ILWU supports this measure in concept, we suggest that the process to license care homes and the like should be speeded up considerably. Given the need, it does not make sense for applicants to be waiting years for the licensing process to be completed.

Furthermore, as intended in the original bill, we believe HD1 should be amended to <u>require</u> the Department of Health to conduct investigations of complaints of unlicensed, uncertified care facilities. If the law allows action to be permissive ("may" rather than "shall"), these facilities will likely continue to remain unchecked, thus potentially leaving vulnerable adults at risk.

The ILWU urges passage of H.B. 2110, HD1, but hopes that efforts will be stepped up to allow for more professionals and their homes to be licensed so they will be under government oversight and operating lawfully and to <u>require</u> the Department of Health to investigate complaints of unlicensed care facilities. Please support HB 2692 HD2 that will increase the number of hours the primary caregivers may be absent from the community care foster family home, provided that a substiture caregiver is present.

Primary Caregivers rely on their substitutes to cover for them to attend continuing education events required to maintain our license and certification, bring clients to their doctor and other appointments which often takes longer than 5 hours. There are many times clients must wait to be seen by the doctor or may be delayed due to transport not being on time. Caring for our clients 24/7 is very exhausting and stressful, as primary caregivers we do need down time in order to maintain a healthy lifestyle so we can provide quality care for our clients. By allowing nurses aids to substitute for up to 50 hours a week will allow us more options when needing time off from our caregiving duties.

Currently, a Nurses Aid can work for only five (5) hours a day as a substitute for a primary caregiver in an adult foster care home, but yet may obtain a license from the state to open their own adult foster care home with two (2) clients. If a nurse's aid can open their own care home and care for 2 clients 24/7 then why are they restricted to 5 hours a day as a substitute? Approved Substitute Nurses Aids have the same training and qualifications as a nurse's aid wishing to open their own foster care home with 2 clients. It is very unfair that with the same training and qualification one may open their own care home yet on the other side is restricted to just 5 hours a day as a substitute.

Please help us ensure that caregivers can maintain a healthy lifestyle so they may continue to provide quality care for their clients by allowing the increase in nurses aid hours to fifty (50) hours per week.
