Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 2215, relating to workforce development. The bill establishes a Workforce Development Coordinator position within the Department of Agriculture; specifies duties of the Coordinator and P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group; and appropriates funds. The Department offers the following comments.

The Department believes the establishment of a coordinated framework of support for P-20 agriculture education in Hawaii by a workforce development coordinator and the P-20 agriculture education working group is an appropriate means to implement the recommendations of the working group. The Department, however, is concerned that a coordinator based within the Department may lack the necessary qualifications or expertise to effectively coordinate the effort. Much of the goals and objectives sought by this measure appear to be centered on education and curriculum development. The Department's purview and expertise do not include those matters and we believe other education-based institutions, such as the University of Hawaii's



College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources or College of Education, would be better suited to coordinate this important effort.

Additionally, the Department has extremely limited office space that is fully earmarked for key vacant positions that are under active recruitment to meet our core functions and fulfill our departmental mandates, duties, and priorities effectively. It would be very difficult for the Department to accommodate an additional staff member without jeopardizing our current recruitment priorities.

HB 2215 - RELATING TO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Chair Woodson, Vice Chairs Hashem and Quinlan, and members of the House Committee on Lower and Higher Education:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in strong <u>support</u> with amendments for HB 2215 that seeks to hire a Workforce Development Coordinator in the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture (HDOA) with multiple, well-defined duties related to agriculture education and curriculum.

The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources was part of the 3-year P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group that submitted their final report last year, and that recommended this position.

The need to get agriculture into the view of students of all ages will be important to the continued development of the agriculture workforce in the state. This bill addresses that need and, most importantly, takes advantage of the grassroots interest in this topic by attempting to coordinate the work of many engaged groups.

We suggest an amendment that changes the responsibility for the position from the HDOA to the Hawai'i Department of Education or the University of Hawai'i. The HDOA does not have responsibility for curriculum development and we believe it does not want to take on a task for which they are not prepared to handle.

Another question to be answered is whether this should be a permanent position or a time-limited position. We suggest that the position be established as time-limited with a 5-year re-evaluation to determine if the desired outcomes have been reached.

We strongly <u>support</u> the intent of HB 2215 and suggest that a discussion be had as to where this program, if funded, will reside.

Aloha Chair Woodson, Vice Chairs Hashem and Quinlan, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 2215, which establishes within the Department of Agriculture the Workforce Development Coordinator position.

It is commonly known that the average age of a farmer in Hawaii is approximately 60 years old. For agriculture to be sustainable, and to produce more local crops we, as a society, must cultivate the next generation of farmers and ranchers.

The Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations undertook a series of facilitated meetings with farmers, ranchers, educators and a diverse group of stakeholders across the state between 2007 and 2011 to address Ag Labor. The Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report was the result of the stakeholder meetings. The report made a number of recommendations, of which several common themes emerged. #1 of those themes was "Increasing youth education and training".

In 2013, the Hawaii State Legislature saw fit to establish the Agriculture Workforce Advisory Board. This Board convenes, in part, to execute the recommendations of the Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report. This board established a program by which educators and school administrators can be exposed and incentivized to adopt existing broad-based agricultural curriculums. This is an important step toward the future of agriculture in Hawaii.

In 2015, Hawaii State Senate Resolution No. 80 requested that the UH-Manoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) develop an "implementation strategy and recommendations for the creation of a statewide coordinated framework of support for P–20 agriculture education, including any proposed legislation." SR 80 sought to build upon the expertise of CTAHR and create a coordinated effort to address Ag education. It bears mentioning that CTAHR currently serves on the Ag Workforce Development Advisory Board.

Creating a Workforce Development Coordinator position within HDOA is needed to support P-20 agriculture education in Hawaii.

Aloha and thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of HB2215**, which establishes and funds the Workforce Development Coordinator position within the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture (HDOA) to carry forward and expand the work of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group.

The Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) works to advance policy and systems change to reduce disparities and improve the health of Hawai'i residents. HIPHI is home to the Obesity Prevention Task Force¹ and the Hawai'i Farm to School Hui².

Since the passage of Senate Resolution 80 in 2015, the Hawai'i Farm to School Hui has worked with the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (UH CTAHR) to convene the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group for the purposes developing a coordinated framework of support for preschool through post-secondary (P-20) agriculture education in Hawai'i.

Representatives from **nearly 40 public-private-non-profit partners** have assembled under this umbrella for the past 4 years with a common goal of increasing the depth, breadth, and scope of agriculture and food systems education in the state. HB2215 is based largely on the group's final report to the 2019 legislature (DC149).

As outlined in the final report and provided for in HB2215, **the Coordinator position is essential** for continuing and expanding this work to advance a coordinated statewide approach to regenerating Hawaii's community food systems through agriculture and food systems education.

We respectfully request that the bill be amended so that the Coordinator position is housed at UH CTAHR instead of HDOA, due to a primary focus on teacher development, curricular integration, and agriculture education. Central to the P-20 Agriculture Education Implementation Plan is the task of infusing agriculture and food systems education into pre-

service and in-service teacher development programs across the state. As part of our state's university system, and having overseen this work since 2015, we recommend UH CTAHR as the preferred home for the Coordinator position.

This bill addresses the pressing need for **immediate and sustained investment by the state in agriculture and food systems education** in order to advance Hawaii's food security and food self-sufficiency through the development of agriculture educators, future farmers, and a society that understands, supports, and actively participates in regenerating Hawaii's community food systems.

We respectfully ask that you please amend this measure as requested and pass it out of committee.

Aloha Chair Woodson, Vice Chair Hashem and Vice Chair Quinlan and members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Farmers Union United supports HB 2215, which establishes within the Department of Agriculture the Workforce Development Coordinator position and specifies duties of the Coordinator and P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group.

Senate President Ron Kouchi said this when he opened the 2019 legislative session:

"I am most passionate about a program the former lieutenant governor started, which is Farm to School... we sourced products from local farmers and ranchers...it's my desire to see our children who are going to school have the proper meal so that they can maximize and perform at their best... it should be something that they enjoy eating, something that will nurture their minds and bodies to have them perform at their optimum levels."

As Hawai'i State institutions strive to increase procurement of local food, it is imperative that procedures, programs, and infrastructure be developed to enable all of Hawai'i's farmers to participate in this tremendous opportunity. The members of Hawai'i Farmers Union United (HFUU) operate several community-based cooperatives and food hubs - defined by the USDA as "a centrally located facility with a business management structure facilitating the aggregation, storage, processing, distribution, and/or marketing of locally/regionally produced food products." HFUU represents approximately 1,000 family farmers in Hawai'i, which comprise about a third of producers who supply our local food for local consumption.

HFUU and its members are aligned with the state's vision for increased food security and agricultural self-sufficiency. We therefore support institutional purchasing from local food hubs and agricultural cooperatives - who represent a large portion of Hawai'i's producers currently supplying state markets. Linking local farms to institutions not only builds our collective capacity for food production, but connects our communities with the 'āina (land), improves public health, develops an educated agricultural workforce, and enriches the local food system and environment. Successful farm-to-state programs have potential to drive increased food production, fueling the evolution of our local farming sector to one of thriving small businesses generating commercial, food safe volumes while building our communities' capacity to create jobs and strengthen their resilience.
