Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

My name is Charlene Tamanaha, and I am the Licensing Administrator of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Professional and Vocational Licensing Division. The Department supports this administration bill, which provides the Contractors License Board (Board) and the Real Estate Commission (Commission) with important new authority to more effectively regulate trust fund balances, as well as remove language that would have triggered expensive protocols that would be challenging to implement.

The Department recognizes the importance of maintaining reasonable and appropriate recovery and education trust fund balances, and it appreciates that Act 29, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019 (S.B. 812, S.D. 1, H.D. 2) has a partial delayed implementation date that gave the Department time to confer with the Board and the Commission and to draft the language contained in this measure.

Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

My name is Neal Arita, and I am the Legislative Committee Chairperson of the Contractors License Board (Board). The Board supports this administration bill, which provides it with important new authority to more effectively regulate balances in the Contractors Recovery Fund and Contractors Education Fund, as well as remove language that would have triggered expensive protocols that would be challenging to implement.

For the Committee's information, administration bill H.B. 2316 increases the monetary amount an injured homeowner may recover from the Contractors Recovery Fund. The Board will be evaluating the increased recovery amount's effect on this fund. In addition, the Board will be using the Contractors Education Fund to fund public service announcements that bring consumer awareness to resources that are available to verify, among other things, contractor license status and complaints history. Further, the Board's Investigative Committee has been exploring different options to equip consumers with knowledge to make sound decisions when hiring contractors; these projects will likewise be funded by the Contractors Education Fund. For these reasons, the bill repeals page 3, lines 1 to 9 and page 4, lines 5 to 14, to remove fund ceilings for the Contractors Recovery Fund and Contractors Education Fund.

The Board notes that the standing committee report by the House Committee on Intrastate Commerce adopts a calculation of "reasonable relation" that borrows heavily from the language of Act 29, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019. The Board believes the report's establishment of a fund ceiling may create uncertainty as to the ability of the Board to exercise its oversight authority.
